St. Cloud State earned the No. 1 playoff seed by virtue of more league wins over Minnesota and the No. 8-ranked Huskies (21-4-1) will host No. 12 seed Alaska Anchorage (4-23-7) at the National Hockey and Event Center (5,371) Games times are 7:37 pm CT on Friday, 7:07 pm CT on Saturday and 7:07 pm CT on Sunday, if necessary. St. Cloud State split with the Seawolves in the only two-game regular season series on Nov. 30 and Dec. 1 in Anchorage, winning 4-3 (ot) and losing 3-1.

No. 2 seed Minnesota (24-7-5) will entertain No. 11 seed Bemidji State (6-20-8) at Mariucci Arena (10,000), with all playoff games getting underway at 7:07 pm CT. The No. 2-ranked Golden Gophers swept the Beavers just last weekend (March 8-9) in Bemidji by 4-3 and 5-1 counts.

No. 3 seed and three-time defending WCHA playoff champion North Dakota (19-10-7) will host No. 10 seed Michigan Tech (12-18-4) this weekend at Ralph Engelstad Arena (11,634). Start times in Grand Forks are 7:37 pm CT Friday, 7:07 pm CT Saturday and 7:07 pm CT on Sunday, if necessary. No. 3-ranked North Dakota went 2-0 against the Huskies during the regular season, claiming 6-1 and 4-1 road victories in Houghton on Dec. 14-15.

No. 4 seed Wisconsin (17-12-7) welcomes No. 9 seed Minnesota Duluth (14-17-5) to the Kohl Center (15,325) Friday through Sunday (if necessary) for their best-of-three playoff series, with all games facing-off at 7:07 pm CT. The No. 14/15-ranked Badgers went 1-0-1 against the Bulldogs during the regular season, taking home three points after a 2-0 victory and 2-2 (ot) tie back on Oct. 26-27.

No. 5 seed Denver (19-11-5) will take on visiting No. 8 seed and arch-rival Colorado College (14-17-5) in first round playoff match ups at Magness Arena (6,205). Puck drops in the Mile High City are 7:37 pm MT Friday night, 7:07 pm MT Saturday evening and 7:07 pm MT Sunday (if necessary). The No. 10/11-ranked Pioneers claimed the four-game regular season series from the Tigers, 2-1-1, with a 6-5 win at CC on Nov. 16, a 6-2 win at DU on Nov. 17, a 1-1 (ot) tie at DU on Feb. 8 and a 6-5 (ot) loss at CC on Feb. 9.

And No. 6 seed and host Minnesota State (22-11-3) will go up against No. 7 seed Nebraska Omaha (18-16-2) March 15, 16 and 17 (if necessary) at Verizon Wireless Center (4,832) in Mankato. Game times are 7:07 pm CT Friday, Saturday and Sunday (if necessary). Minnesota State, ranked No. 10/11 nationally this week, and Nebraska Omaha ranked 20th, split their only regular season series on Dec. 14-15 in Omaha, with MSU prevailing 6-3 in game one and UNO taking game two 5-1.

After the first round of league playoffs, the six winning teams will be re-seeded No. 1 through No. 6, according to their regular season finish, and advance to the 2013 Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five, which

will be contested Thursday, March 21 through Saturday, March 23 at Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul, Minn. At the Final Five, the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds will receive a first-day bye. There will be two semifinals on Thursday featuring the No. 5 seed vs the No. 4 seed at 2:07 pm CT and the No. 6 seed vs the No. 3 seed at 7:07 pm CT. There will be two semifinal match ups on Friday at 2:07 pm CT and 7:07 pm CT, followed by the championship game on Saturday at 7:07 pm CT. The winner of the Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five receives the Broadmoor Trophy and earns the WCHA's automatic berth into the NCAA tournament.

On the final weekend of the 2012-13 regular season (March 8-10), Minnesota, Denver and Minnesota Duluth each recorded sweeps, while three series ended in splits. The Gophers won 4-3 and 5-1 at Bemidji State to earn a share of the regular season title, the host Pioneers defeated Alaska Anchorage by 7-1 and 6-1 counts, and the Bulldogs downed visiting Nebraska Omaha twice by 5-4 and 6-0 scores. St. Cloud State secured the program's first WCHA championship (co) with a 4-2 victory at Wisconsin last Friday before the Badgers secured home ice for the first round of playoffs with a 3-2 triumph last Saturday. In Mankato, visiting North Dakota defeated Minnesota State 4-3 in game one but the Mavericks came back on Saturday to fashion a 2-1 (ot) win and secure a home playoff berth. And up in Houghton, Michigan Tech downed visiting Colorado College 2-0 on March 8 before the Tigers rallied back for a 4-3 win on March 9.

Overall last weekend, home teams went 7-5 in their 12 WCHA games. For the entire 168-game 2012-13 conference schedule, home teams went 72-69-27 for just a .509 winning percentage.

In non-conference competition this regular season, WCHA-member teams combined for a 48-34-5 (.580) record in non-conference play. WCHA teams were 9-0-1 (.950) vs the Atlantic Hockey Association (AHA), 13-17-1 (.435) against the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA), 7-8-1 (.469) vs ECAC Hockey, 9-8-1 (.528) vs the Hockey East Association (HEA), and 10-1-1 (.875) vs independents.

In this week's USCHO.com Division 1 Men's College Hockey Poll issued March 11, seven WCHA-member teams continue to be ranked among the nation's top 20. Minnesota is at No. 2, North Dakota is up to No. 4, St. Cloud State is No. 8, Minnesota State is No. 10, Denver is No. 11, Wisconsin is at No. 14 and Nebraska Omaha is at No. 20.

And in this week's USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine Division 1 Men's College Hockey Poll issued March 11, Minnesota is No. 2, North Dakota is No. 4, St. Cloud State is No. 8, Denver is No. 10, Minnesota State is No. 11, and Wisconsin is No. 15.

WCHA ANNOUNCES RECORD 115 MEN'S AND WOMEN'S SCHOLAR-ATHLETES FOR 2012-13 8TH ANNUAL CLASS INCLUDES 54 REPEAT HONOREES; SCSU'S ANNA DONLAN, DREW LEBLANC ARE FOUR-TIME RECIPIENTS

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, through Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod, Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, Michigan Technological University Athletic Director Suzanne Sanregret (Chair, men's league) and University of Minnesota Duluth Faculty Representative Al Mensinger (Chair, women's league) has announced a record total of 115 men's and women's student-athletes that make up the eighth annual group of WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award recipients for 2012-13. The previous record for honorees in one season was 110 in 2011-12.

"The announcement of our annual WCHA Scholar-Athletes is always a very special time of the year," said McLeod, Martin, Sanregret and Mensinger in a joint statement. "It is an opportunity for both the Association and our member teams to publically acknowledge the outstanding accomplishments of these young men and women and pay tribute to the amount of time, hard work and dedication each of them put into their already demanding schedules as student-athletes. Achieving this high honor is a remarkable tribute to every one of them and on behalf of the entire WCHA family, we wish them all the success in the world."

The WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award was developed through member team Faculty Representatives and approved by the conference membership beginning with the 2005-06 season. To earn recognition as a WCHA Scholar-Athlete, conference-member student-athletes must have completed at least one year of residency at their present institution prior to the current academic year and must also have a grade-point average of at least 3.50 on a 4.0 scale for the previous two semesters or three quarters, or may qualify if his/her overall GPA is at least 3.50 for all terms at his or her present institution.

Over the first eight years of the award, there have been 640 WCHA Scholar-Athlete honorees representing all 12 men's- and all eight women's-member institutions. Fifty-four (54) of this season's 115 men's and women's WCHA Scholar-Athletes are repeat honorees, including two four-time recipients and 21 three-time honorees.

Earning the distinguished WCHA Scholar-Athlete honor for the fourth time are St. Cloud State's Anna Donlan (2009-10, '10-11, '11-12, '12-13) and Drew LeBlanc (2009-10, '10-11, '11-12, '12-13), who become only the sixth and seventh student-athletes to ever do so. LEGENDARY COACH JEFF SAUER NAMED HOBEY BAKER LEGEND OF HOCKEY

St. Paul, Minn. – The Hobey Baker Memorial Award Foundation is very pleased to announce its 2013 Legend of Hockey recipient is Jeff Sauer. A veteran of 31 years coaching at the elite Division 1 college level in the WCHA, Sauer is the only person in league annals to coach 30 seasons and is also the winningest coach.

Following his playing career at Colorado College in the mid-1960s, Sauer joined legendary coach Bob Johnson as an assistant at CC in 1966, then, followed Johnson to Wisconsin in a similar capacity in 1968. The head coaching job opened at Colorado College in 1971 and coach Sauer began his extensive career guiding the Tigers for the next 11 seasons until 1982. At that point, Badger Bob Johnson accepted the head coaching reigns with the NHL's Calgary Flames and Sauer was named the next Wisconsin head coach.

In his first season behind the Badger bench, coach Sauer claimed the NCAA tournament title in 1982-83, the first time in NCAA history a coach had won the title in his inaugural season. He added a second national championship with the Badgers in 1990. Sauer went on to coach Wisconsin for 20 years, retiring following the 2002 hockey season. In WCHA play at Wisconsin, Sauer's teams finished amongst the top three teams in 14 of his 20 seasons and won league titles in 1990 and 2000.

Jeff ranks fifth all-time in games coached at 1244 and is eighth overall in college hockey wins at 655 between his stints with Colorado College and Wisconsin. As one of the most respected coaches in the game, coach Sauer has continued to be the consummate diplomat to the sport. During the 1990s, Sauer has worked with USA Hockey with a variety of teams competing on the national and international stage.

Forty years ago, Jeff became involved with former Chicago Black Hawks star Stan Makita, assisting him with summer camps for the hearing-impaired. For the past half dozen years, Jeff has been working with the U.S. Deaflympics program, and is presently assembling a squad to participate in the World Deaf Hockey Championships to be held in Helsinki, Finland at the end of March. His work with the Deaflympics program led to another passion of his, coaching the U.S. Sled Hockey team the past three years since the 2010 Vancouver winter Olympics. Jeff will be taking a team comprised of handicapped sled

hockey players to Seoul, South Korea for the World Championships coming up in April.

If all that is not enough, Sauer serves as a disciplinary judge for the IIHF World Hockey Championships coming up in Helsinki in mid-May featuring some of the top pro and amateur players in the world. Jeff also continues in his role as an Assistant to the Commissioner in the WCHA. His legacy has not gone unnoticed as Jeff was honored by USA Hockey in 2000 with their Distinguished Achievement Award and by the NHL in 2011 as a recipient of their Lester Patrick Award for outstanding contributions to hockey in the U.S.

Sauer will be honored along with this year's Hobey Baker Award winner at the Hobey Baker Award banquet May 22 in St. Paul, Minn. Banquet tickets are available by visiting the Hobey website at hobeybakeraward.com. The Hobey Baker Memorial Award annually honors college hockey's top player and the 2013 recipient will be announced Friday, April 12 during the NCAA Frozen Four championship in Pittsburgh, Penn., and will be televised live at 6 pm ET.

MADISON, Wis. – The men's Western Collegiate Hockey Association's today released a 140-game conference schedule for the upcoming 2013-14 season that will continue the league's long-standing 28 games per team slate and feature all league series being played on the traditional hockey nights of Fridays and Saturdays.

Included in the schedule is the league's newest full-time member in University of Alabama Huntsville. Known as the 'Hockey Capital of the South', Alabama Huntsville was granted full-time membership into the WCHA family on January 17. The addition of Alabama Huntsville gives the WCHA a highly-competitive 10-team league beginning in 2013-14, with membership consisting of University of Alabama Huntsville (Chargers), University of Alaska Anchorage (Seawolves), University of Alaska Fairbanks (Nanooks), Bemidji State University (Beavers), Bowling Green State University (Falcons), Ferris State University (Bulldogs), Lake Superior State University (Lakers), Michigan Technological University (Huskies), Minnesota State University, Mankato (Mavericks) and Northern Michigan University (Wildcats).

"We are truly looking forward to a tremendous season in 2013-14 and all the excitement and interest that the new-look WCHA will generate," said Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod. "We are extremely pleased with the 28 games per team schedule that will give our fans what they most want, and that's a majority of league games.

"The WCHA promises to be as intense and competitive as ever across the board and with the addition of new and compelling rivalries to those we maintain, our fans across the country are in for a real treat. We also want to extend a warm welcome to all the fans, family, staff, friends and communities of our six newest teams and know they will enjoy the spirit of pride, passion and commitment that has always been a hallmark of the WCHA."

The 140-game conference slate for 2013-14 will have each of the 10 member teams playing 28 WCHA games, 14 at home and 14 away, with the regular season champion being awarded college hockey's most renowned and valuable trophy – the MacNaughton Cup. Each team will play five other league members four times each and four others two times each. The WCHA has had a 28 games per team conference schedule in place since 1997-98.

On the weekend of November 1-2, five more WCHA teams engage in their first conference series of 2013-14 as Alaska plays host to Northern Michigan, Alaska Anchorage travels to Bowling Green, Ferris State visits Alabama Huntsville and Minnesota State heads to

Bemidji State.

Then on November 8-9, Lake Superior skates in their 2013-14 WCHA opens when the Lakers entertain Alaska.

The first-half of WCHA play concludes the weekend of December 13-14 with second half conference action resuming just after New Year's on January 3-4.

WCHA GRANTS FULL-TIME MEMBERSHIP TO UNIVERSITY OF ALABAMA IN HUNTSVILLE CHARGERS TO BECOME 10TH MEMBER OF MEN'S LEAGUE

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association men's membership voted January 17 to admit the University of Alabama in Huntsville (UAH) as a full-time men's conference member. The vote of approval was taken after UAH submitted an application for membership and made a formal presentation to a WCHA group of member-team Presidents and Athletic Directors at a meeting held in conjunction with the NCAA Convention in Dallas, Tex.

The addition of University of Alabama in Huntsville into college hockey's most historic and successful conference will bring future men's league membership to 10 teams. Their membership will be effective as soon as 2013-14.

WCHA men's membership in 2013-14 currently consists of University of Alaska Anchorage, University of Alaska Fairbanks, Bemidji State University, Bowling Green State University, Ferris State University, Lake Superior State University, Michigan Technological University, Minnesota State University, Mankato and Northern Michigan University.

In issuing a joint statement on behalf of the Association, Dr. Richard Davenport, President of Minnesota State University, Mankato and Chair of the WCHA President's Group, and Bruce McLeod, Commissioner of the WCHA, said "The WCHA is delighted to have reached in principle an agreement to officially welcome University of Alabama in Huntsville into the Association family as a full-time men's member. This is a significant day for the Chargers, the community of Huntsville, the conference itself, and college hockey in general. Growing the game and assisting developing programs however possible has always been a charge of the WCHA and this is another positive evolution in our history.

"Each of our member institutions are 100% committed to keeping the WCHA among the premier conferences in all of collegiate athletics and our respective ice hockey programs both strong and vibrant. The University of Alabama in Huntsville is a dynamic, top-quality institution with an excellent academic and athletic reputation and without question the Chargers are going to be a great fit and a successful, contributing member.

"Just as the entire UAH campus and the Huntsville community are exhilarated to now have a welcoming home for their men's hockey program, the WCHA is also extremely proud and gratified to be providing that home."

Said University of Alabama in Huntsville President Robert Altkirch, "We're pleased that our ice hockey team is going to have the opportunity to compete and grow in a NCAA Division 1 conference. We believe that our affiliation with the Western Collegiate Hockey Association will be a tremendous boost to our recruiting, scheduling and our ability to be competitive on the ice."

"We want to thank the WCHA and its member institutions for their confidence in allowing us to be a part of their conference. Their affirmative vote will invigorate our ability to maintain our great hockey tradition."

UAH Director of Athletics Dr. E.J. Brophy said, "All athletic programs experience special defining moments, and our hockey program's acceptance today into the Western Collegiate Hockey Association is certainly one of those moments. The WCHA is a preeminent hockey conference in America, and I know that our student-athletes, coaches, fans, friends, alumni and the people of Huntsville are ecstatic and proud of this giant step for our ice hockey program."

"The last time we were in a conference, we won the conference tournament and advanced to the NCAA tournament, which will be our immediate and ambitious goal when we begin play in the WCHA. It is a banner day for the Chargers."

The men's Western Collegiate Hockey Association, home to a record 37 national championship teams since its founding in 1951, has been operating as a 12-team conference for the 2011-12 and 2012-13 seasons. Current members are University of Alaska Anchorage, Bemidji State University, Colorado College, University of Denver, Michigan Technological University, University of Minnesota, University of Minnesota Duluth, Minnesota State University, University of Nebraska Omaha, University of North Dakota, St. Cloud State University and University of Wisconsin.

On March 21, 2011, the Big Ten Conference announced the formation of a new Division 1 men's college hockey league that would include current WCHA members Minnesota and Wisconsin and begin play in 2013-14. On July 13, 2012, Colorado College, Denver, Minnesota Duluth, Nebraska Omaha and North Dakota announced they would be leaving the WCHA following the 2012-13 season to form another new league, known as the National Collegiate Hockey Conference, which also begins play in 2013-14. Then on Sept. 22, 2011, St. Cloud State announced they were leaving the WCHA for the NCHC.

ABOUT UAH HOCKEY

The University of Alabama in Huntsville hockey program has been playing as an NCAA Division I independent since the end of the 2009-10 season following the dissolution of the CHA (College Hockey America). The program was dropped back to club status for a brief stint in the spring of 2012, and then revived a short time later. The program struggled to fill a 2012-13 schedule, as previously scheduled teams dropped UAH upon the canceling of the program.

Known as the "Hockey Capital of the South," UAH has been playing NCAA hockey since 1985. The program won two NCAA Division II Championships in the mid-1990's, before Div. II hockey was dropped. The program has seen massive facility upgrades, as well as a new coaching staff with professional experience and high expectations. UAH has made an appearance in six NCAA Tournaments and is currently the only D1 hockey program without a home in 2013-14.

WCHA Men's Tie-Breaking Procedures - For Playoff Purposes Only

At the conclusion of the regular season, teams will be ranked by the number of points accumulated. If two teams are tied for first place, they will be declared co-WCHA champions.

The first round of the WCHA's post-season tournament will be a best-of-three games format at the home site of the teams ranked higher in the final regular season standings. All 12 teams participate in the first round of the tournament. First round playoff pairings will be: #1 rank vs #12 rank, #2 rank vs #11 rank, #3 vs #10, #4 vs #9, #5 vs #8, and #6 vs #7.

Following the six first round series, the six winning teams will be re-seeded #1 thru #6 according to their standings in the final WCHA in-season competition and will advance to the WCHA Final Five.

In the event that ties are encountered in the determination of WCHA ranking or designation of home teams for playoff purposes, the following procedures will be used in the order given to break the ties:

- If two or more teams are tied, head-to-head competition during the regular (conference) season will be used to break the tie.
- If two or more teams are still tied after (a), the highest seed will go to the team with the most WCHA (conference) wins during the regular season.
- If two or more teams played a four-game series during the regular season and the teams have the same win-loss records for those series and the same number of WCHA wins, the team having the least number of goals scored against it in the four-game series shall have the higher rank. If two or more teams played a two-game series during the regular season, proceed to tie-breaker d).
- If two or more teams are still tied after applying the provisions of (a), (b) and (c), the team having the greatest "winning margin" during the regular season will have the higher rank. Winning margin = WCHA goals for during the regular season minus WCHA goals against.
- Games played against WCHA opponents in holiday tournaments will not be counted in the determinations.

The Alaska Anchorage Seawolves will commence the postseason as the No. 12 seed in the WCHA First Round ... UAA will take on No. 1-seed St. Cloud State on March 15-16 and 17, if necessary ... the series will be the second meeting of the season for the teams after splitting a league series in Anchorage, Nov. 30 and Dec. 1 ... then No. 14-ranked SCSU defeated UAA 4-3 in overtime on Friday, before UAA retaliated with a 3-1 win on Saturday – just UAA's second conference win of the season ... UAA and SCSU have met once in the postseason – March 9-10, 2001, with SCSU sweeping 5-1, 8-2 ... in the playoffs, the Seawolves are 6-37 and 1-3 at the WCHA Final Five ... the Seawolves have only advanced to the WCHA Final Five twice, with the last coming in 2011 when they defeated Minnesota at Mariucci in the First Round (4-3, 2-0) ... SCSU leads the all-time series, 50-17-6 and at SCSU, 32-4-4 ... in the last eight games, the teams are tied, 4-4, while UAA leads in the last five, 3-2 ... UAA last win in St. Cloud came on Feb. 17, 2012 (3-2 ot) ... the Seawolves play the Huskies following a 7-1, 6-1 sweep at then-No. 11/12 Denver on March 8 & 10 ... UAA's lone goal last Friday night came by sophomore Scott Allen – his team-leading 12th of the season ... Allen (12-6=18), who was named to the Kendall Hockey Classic all-tournament team in October, has easily bypassed his goal total from his rookie campaign (3) ... assisting on Allen's goal were F Andrew Pettitt and UAA's point leader F Blake Tatchell ... Tatchell leads UAA with 16 assists and 24 points ... Tatchell's eight goals rank him tied for No. 22 on the all-time UAA rookie list and are the most for a UAA freshman since Matt Bailey posted 10 in 2010-11 ... Tatchell leads UAA by scoring at least one point in 17 of the 34 games this season ... UAA's goal on Sunday at Denver was scored by senior F Tyler Currier – his fourth of the season ... the Seawolves will be without freshman D Austin Sevalrud on Friday against SCSU after receiving a DQ on March 10 vs. Denver ... UAA completed the conference slate with a 2-20-6 record – the second fewest WCHA wins ever by UAA ... the worst WCHA season came in 2002-03 with no victories ... after the OT game on March 2, the Seawolves have played in 11 games that have gone into sudden death, going 0-2-8 ... the Seawolves currently have four shorthanded goals – the most since scoring 10 in 2010 ... currently, seven Seawolves have dressed in all 34 contests.

At 6-20-8 overall and 5-16-7 in league play, the Beavers have been seeded 11th and will travel to the second seed, Minnesota, for a best-of-three series at Mariucci Arena beginning Friday – potentially setting the teams up for five games in 10 days ... Bemidji State opened its previous two appearances in the WCHA post season on the road and earned a spot in the 2011 Final Five semifinal ... Bemidji State is 3-3 in the WCHA post season since joining the league prior to the 2010-11 season ... Cory Ward recorded his first collegiate multi-goal effort last Friday and his second multi-point game in BSU's last four ... Ward leads all BSU rookies in scoring with 14 points (8g, 6a) and has five points (3g, 2a) in BSU's last five games ... Defenseman Matt Prapavessis logged the first goal of his sophomore season and the second of his collegiate career last Friday ... He added his second of the season Saturday ... Ironically, he also scored the only goal of his freshman season in the final series of the 2011-12 regular season ... In four previous meetings with Minnesota, Matt Prapavessis has three points (2g, 1a) from his blue line post ... Danny Mattson added his 15th assist of the season last Friday ... He not only holds down BSU's top assist spot, he has more than doubled his scoring total from nine points (3g, 6a) as a freshman to 19 (4g, 15a) as a sophomore ... BSU's

leading scorer, Brance Orban (8g, 13a), has cast the game-winning goal in three of the Beavers' six wins (Oct. 20, Dec. 15 and Feb. 15) in 2012-13, while he also has an assist on David Boehm's game-winner Oct. 27 ... Jordan George posted an assist last Saturday ... With a career total of 61 helpers, the senior matched Ryan Huddy (2002-06) for sixth on BSU's Division I-era assists list ... He now needs one assist to tie Tyler Scofield (2005-09) for with on the list ... Jordan George now has 119 points (57g, 62a) in 146 games ... The senior needs two points this weekend to match Luke Erickson (2003-07) for second on BSU's D-I list ... With 57 goals to his credit, George sits second on BSU's Division I-era goal scoring list ... He remains eight short of Matt Read's (2008-11) record of 65 ... Senior Ben Kinne added two assists in the series versus Minnesota marking his first points in back-to-back games since assembling a six-game point scoring streak from Oct. 20-Nov. 16 ... On the season, the Beavers are now 17-for-96 (.177) on the man-advantage with 15 power-play goals coming during the WCHA regular season ... The Beavers are 15-for-77 (.195) in WCHA play to rank seventh the league in power-play efficiency ... BSU's penalty-kill unit allowed two Gopher power-play goals in five chances during the series with both coming last Friday night, marking the first time the Beavers surrendered multiple power-play goals since a Dec. 30 non-conference affair versus UMass (2-for-6) ... BSU is now 98-for-122 (.803) on the season, while it has stymied 81-of-99 opponent power-play chances in WCHA play to sit sixth in the league (.818) ... BSU has allowed five power-play goals in its last 13 games and 32 opponent chances, but three of those have come in the Beavers' last three games and seven opponent chances ... In BSU's first 34 games of 2012-13 it has been out scored 36-20 during the third period and 29-15 during the third period of WCHA play, which includes being out scored 4-1 versus Minnesota and 9-2 in its last five games ... BSU is 0-6-0 on the larger ice sheet this year and has not been victorious on Olympic ice since a 3-1 win at St. Cloud State's National Hockey Center Dec. 3, 2011 ... The Beavers are 1-12-1 all-time versus Minnesota and are 0-4-1 versus the Gophers in games played in Bemidji and 1-8-0 in games played at Mariucci Arena ... BSU and Minnesota have never met in the league's postseason.

COLORADO COLLEGE

The Tigers, who will meet archrival Denver in the opening round of the WCHA playoffs for the third time this week, have advanced on both previous occasions with two-game sweeps 1998 (3-2 in overtime, 6-4) at the World Arena and again in 2004 (4-3, 6-1) at Magness Arena ... Colorado College also eliminated the Pioneers in a two-game, total-goals format in 1987 (4-2, 3-2) at the old DU Arena ... CC, 5-9-3 away from home this season, plays a first-round series on the road for just the third time in the last 20 years ... With an assist on Mike Boivin's power-play goal in last Saturday's 4-3 victory at Michigan Tech, senior center Rylan Schwartz bumped his career total to 95 and moved into a tie with former All-America defenseman Calvin Elfring (1994-98) for 19th place on Colorado College's all-time chart ... Schwartz ranks 31st on the program's all-time points list with 149 (54g, 95a) ... The Tigers are 10-1-1 in their

The 4-3 victory at Tech was Howe's 50th between the pipes in four seasons at CC ... Senior right wing and team captain William Rapuzzi, whose 15th tally of the season late in the second period proved to be the difference last Saturday, now shares the team lead with junior forward Archie Skalbeck with three game-winners apiece ... Denver has hosted the opening round of the WCHA playoffs in each of the last 10 seasons and has advanced to the WCHA Final Five in six of those seasons including each of the last five overall ... Denver is 80-59-6 all-time in WCHA Tournament games and 58-19-5 on tournament games on its home ice ... This weekend's series will mark the first time that Denver and Colorado College have squared off in the WCHA playoffs since the 2005 season, when the Pioneers defeated the Tigers 1-0 to claim the WCHA title ... Denver last met CC in the opening round in 2004 and were defeated 2-0 by the Tigers ... Denver leads the all-time series with Colorado College 159-111-15 (.583), which began in 1949-1950 ... The Pioneers posted a 2-1-1 mark in the season series with Colorado College and reclaimed the Gold Pan Trophy after losing it to the Tigers in 2012.

The Pioneers are 9-19-5 all-time in games played against CC at Magness Arena ... Denver is 2-3-2 in its last seven meetings against the Tigers and 5-5-2 over the last 12 in the series ... Six of the last eight games in the Denver-Colorado College series have been decided by one goal or ended in a tie ... Denver out-scored Anchorage 13-2 in its two-game series last weekend and posted seven goals for the second time this season in Friday's 7-1 victory, which also marked the Pioneers' largest margin of victory this season ... Alex Petan (Delta, BC) finished as the WCHA's top-scoring rookie with 29 points in 28 league games ... The right wing posted 11 goals and 18 assists in conference action for a 1.04 points per game average ... In 34 overall games this season, Petan owns 15 goals and 18 assists in all games for a 33 points (0.97 per game) ... He is looking to become the first Tech player to average a point per game since Colin Murphy (53 points in 37 games) in 2004-05 ... Freshman Jamie Phillips (Caledonia, ON) started his second straight game in nets for Michigan Tech and earned his first career shutout when the Huskies defeated Colorado College last Friday (March 8) ... Phillips made 22 saves in helping Tech to its fourth shutout of 2012-13, with all four coming since Christmas ... Pheonix Copley (North Pole, AK) shut out Michigan (4-0) on Dec. 29, Western Michigan (4-0) on Dec. 30 and Bemidji State (4-0) on Jan. 18 ... Phillips, who has appeared in eight games this season, owns a .931 save percentage and 1.80 goals against average ... Tanner Kero (Hancock, MI) scored a goal in each game of the series with Colorado College ... The sophomore center has posted three goals in the last three contests and 10 for the season ... Kero has posted 23 total points – tied for fourth most on the team ... Defenseman Steven Seigo (Edenwold, SK) played in his 34th game of the season and 147th of his career last Saturday (March 9) ... The senior defenseman has played in every possible game since beginning his collegiate career at Tech in 2009-10 ... Seigo has been a consistent point producer for the Huskies with 19 goals and 56 assists for 75 total points ... This season, he owns 6-11=17, and will bring a four-game point streak into the playoffs after posting one assist in each of the last four games ... Minnesota also has the NCAA's top power play this season at .252 (39-for-155) ... the team also features the WCHA's leading defense (71 goals allowed, 1.97 goals per game, fourth nationally) and penalty-kill (.870, 94-108, seventh nationally) ... Minnesota leads the WCHA in all four categories and is the only team in the nation to be ranked in the top 10 in all four statistics ... Erik Haula leads the Gophers and ranks tied for fourth in the nation and tied for second in the WCHA this season with 46 points (16g, 30a) ... Haula's 30 assists rank third in the WCHA this season ... Nick Bjugstad is the Gophers' leading goal scorer and ranks fourth in the league with 20 goals this season ... Bjugstad ranks tied for third in the nation with 10 power-play goals and tallied both game winners this weekend ... Kyle Rau is tied for first nationally with six game-winning goals in 2012-13 ... Adam Wilcox improved to 23-6-5 in a 23-save performance on Saturday to move within two wins of Kellen Briggs' freshman school wins record, set in 2003-04 ... Wilcox ranks seventh in the nation this year with a 1.85 GAA and has a .924 save percentage ... the rookie is also on pace to compete for Minnesota single-season records for GAA and save percentage ... Alex Kangas has both records for the Gophers at 1.98 GAA and a .930 save percentage – both set in his freshman season with the Gophers (2007-08) ... Minnesota is 14-1-1 this season in games where Kyle Rau, Nick Bjugstad and Erik Haula (Minnesota's three leading scorers) tally a point ... the Gophers are 14-3-3 at Mariucci Arena and 31-9-3 on home ice since the start of the 2011-12 season ... Minnesota went 8-0-0 in non-conference play this season ... the Gophers have outshot opponents in all but three games this season ... Bjugstad has 10 career points against the Beavers in six games ... the Gophers are 21-1-1 when Kyle Rau tallies a point and 7-0-1 when Jake Parenteau notches a point ... Minnesota will host Bemidji State in the first round of the WCHA playoffs, the best-of-three series is set for this Friday-Sunday at Mariucci Arena with all three games set for 7 pm CT (Sunday if necessary) ... Minnesota is 12-1-1 all-time against the Beavers ... the 2012-13 WCHA campaign marks Minnesota's final season in the league after 61 years in the league ... Minnesota will transition to the Big Ten Conference next year after helping found the WCHA in 1951.

MINNESOTA DULUTH

After closing out the 2012-13 regular season last weekend on a five-game unbeaten streak, the University of Minnesota Duluth will now shift its focus on the Western Collegiate Hockey Association playoffs and a best-of-three first-round series at the University of Wisconsin beginning Friday night ... UMD will be looking to punch its ticket to a fifth straight WCHA Final Five event ... The Bulldogs have faced the Badgers seven times previously in WCHA postseason play, with the last coming in the third place game of the 1992 playoff championship in St. Paul (a 7-5 UMD win) and are 3-4-0 against them ... That includes an 0-4-0 mark in Madison and an 2-0-0 record in Duluth ... UMD and Wisconsin met twice earlier this season (Oct. 26-27) at AMSOIL Arena where the Badgers skated away with three of a possible four points via a 2-0 win and 2-2 overtime tie ... The Bulldogs posted their fourth series sweep of the year by dumping No. 16-ranked Nebraska-Omaha 5-4 last Friday and 6-0 the following evening evening at AMSOIL Arena ... In the opener, the Bulldogs rallied from a 3-1 first intermission deficit by striking for four unanswered goals in the second period, including a pair from senior left winger Mike Seidel (who also set

up one other score) ... Freshman left winger Austin Farley also scored once and added three assists while junior right winger Joe Basaraba, sophomore center Caleb Herbert and rookie center Tony Cameranesi each turned in two-point nights ... In the rematch on March 9, Basaraba scored twice, Herbert had three assists and junior goaltender Aaron Crandall rejected all 32 shots the Mavericks (who sported the nation's No 2 scoring offense coming into the weekend) sent his way ... The Bulldogs matched a school record with five power-play goals in recording its most lopsided victory in over two years (6-0 vs. Alaska Anchorage) ... The Bulldogs have now won four straight games (their most in a row since last winter) and are 4-0-1 going back to Feb. 23 ... That five-game unbeaten streak is the third longest in the nation at the moment ... UMD's rookie class is the 4th highest-scoring unit in the country, having collectively amassed 97 points on 37 goals and 60 assists ... Center Tony Cameranesi and his linemate, left winger Austin Farley, are both tied for second nationally in freshmen scoring (they share that spot with two others) with 34 points which is two back of leader Riley Barber of Miami ... Cameranesi and Farley have also each collected seven power-play goals, which lead all NCAA rookies while Cameranesi's 17 power-play points take a backseat to no other newcomer in the nation (Farley is next with 16 points) ... Farley will bring a six-game scoring streak into this Friday night's clash with Wisconsin and during that stretch, the Niles, Ill., product has racked up six goals and seven assists ... He and Cameranesi, who has points in four consecutive games (2=6=8), are the nation's top scoring rookie tandem ... Andy Welinski, one of seven Bulldogs who skated in all 36 regular season games, holds down the No. 2 slot in the WCHA first-year defensemen scoring race with four goals and 13 assists ... Those 17 points represent the second-highest single-season point harvest since the 1998-99 season (only first-round NHL draft pick Justin Faulk had more with 33 points two winters ago) ... Over the past six games, UMD has converted 14 of its 32 opportunities with the man-advantage (a sizzling 43.7%) and currently possesses the country's fourth most efficient power play at 24.1% ... Of the Bulldogs' 97 total goals this season, 41 have come on the power-play ... That figures out to be 42.3% – the highest total in the nation to date ... The Bulldogs are 3-6-2 when they've been held scoreless on the power-play this season and 10-3-3 when the opposition has failed to convert with the man-advantage ... In their 14 victories to date, the Bulldogs have killed 49 of 53 power-plays (92.4%) ... Senior left winger Mike Seidel, who contributed three goals and two assists to the Bulldog cause in their sweep over Nebraska Omaha has now eclipsed the 30-point barrier for the second straight season ... Seidel is eighth in the WCHA in goals with a career-high 17, is tied for 18th in in points with 33 (another personal best) and for third in power-play points (17) and power-play goals ... He also has nine power-play goals to his 2012-13 credit, a number bettered by only three other WCHA combatants (Minnesota State's Eriah Hayes with 12 and Minnesota's Nick Bjugstad with 10) ... Going back to a 5-4 home loss to Minnesota on Oct. 15, 2011, UMD is unbeaten (29-0-4) when it has scored four or more goals ... That includes a 9-0-2 record this season ... Matt McNeely, who is 10-11-3 on the year, has made 23 starts thus far ... The last Bulldog rookie goaltender to make more was Isaac Reichmuth, who accrued 32 starts in 2002-03 on his way to being just the second freshman ever to be voted UMD's Most Valuable Player ... UMD is 4-9-2 against nationally-ranked opponents this winter, with wins coming at then-No. 10 Notre Dame (3-1 on Oct. 18), against No. 12 St. Cloud State (2-1 on Nov. 23) and last weekend against No. 16 Nebraska-Omaha ... Junior goaltender Aaron Crandall's shut out over Nebraska Omaha last Saturday was his second in as many starts (he blanked Alabama Huntsville 4-0 on March 2) and the fourth of his career.

Minnesota State (22-11-3 overall, 16-11-1 WCHA), which has won 19 of its last 26 games, ended the 2012-13 regular season with a home split with North Dakota (4-3 loss and 2-1 overtime win) last weekend ... The Mavericks finished in a tie for fourth in the final WCHA standings and are seeded sixth for the first round of the league playoffs ... MSU will host Nebraska Omaha (18-16-2 overall, 14-12-2 WCHA) in the WCHA best-of-three series with the games played Friday (7:07 pm), Saturday (7:07 pm) and Sunday (7:07 pm, if necessary) ... This year's home WCHA playoff series will mark the fourth time the Mavericks have been at home for the first round of the league playoffs ... MSU defeated Alaska Anchorage 2-0 in 1999-00, defeated Wisconsin 2-0 in 2002-03 and lost a 2-1 series to Minnesota in 2007-08 ... MSU stands 5-2 all-time in home WCHA first-round games ... MSU owns an all-time WCHA playoff mark of 9-28 ... The Mavericks, who have participated in the WCHA postseason since the 1997-98 season (MSU participated as an affiliate member prior to joining the league on a full-time basis in 1999-2000), have played in 15 WCHA postseason tournaments and have won two first-round play-off series (1999-2000 and 2002-2003) ... With 15-26=41 on the year forward Matt Leitner stands atop MSU's scoring charts ... Leitner, who has 5-6=11 in the last seven games, is tied for tenth overall in the country in points and is tied for tenth in assists ... Leitner, who led the Mavericks in scoring last year as a freshman, ranks third in the country in power-play points with 24 and has not missed a game in his two-year MSU career with 73 straight appearances ... Senior forward Eriah Hayes stands second on MSU's scoring charts on the season with 19-15=34 ... Hayes stands as MSU's active career scoring leader with 51-43=94 in 148 career games and is 11th on the school's career scoring for the DI era ... Next on the list is Kurt Davis (10th with 21-78=96 in 150 GP from 2006-10) ... Hayes, who has 17-13=30 in the last 28 games, leads the Mavericks with 12 power-play goals, which ranks second in the nation and are the most PPGs by a MSU player since Cole Bassett had 12 in 2002-03 (Pat Carroll had 13 in 1982-83) ... His 24 career power-play goals rank fifth all-time at MSU and he ranks only behind Travis Morin (26 PPGs) and Shane Joseph (25 PPGs) for career PPGs during MSU's DI-era ... His 19 goals on the season are tied for eighth in the nation ... Sophomore forward J.P. Lafontaine, who has not missed a game in his two-year MSU career, has 8-21=29 on the year to rank third on MSU's scoring charts ... His 21 assists is tied for 33rd in the country ... A member of the 2011-12 WCHA All-Rookie Team, Lafontaine owns 21-36=57 in 74 career games ... Senior defenseman Evan Mosey has 4-4=8 in 23 games this year, with his four tallies representing a single-season career high ... Mosey, who ranks third on the team with a +10 on the year, has 9-21=30 in 106 career games ... Junior forward Zach Lehrke has played in all 36 games this year and has racked up 7-13=20 in the last 25 games ... He's fourth on the team's scoring charts with 8-15=23 on the season ... Junior forward Johnny McInnis has 9-6=15 in the last 24 games and is fifth on the team in scoring charts with 13-9=22 ... McInnis has five game-winning goals this year, which is tied for fourth on MSU's single-season list, is third on the team in goals (13) and is second in shots on goal (104) ... Zach Palmquist has 11-30=41 in 74 career games and is tied for 20th in the nation in scoring by defenseman with 5-17=22 ... Palmquist has 4-11=15 in the last 22 games, ranks second on the team with a +12 on the season and has not missed a game in his two-year MSU career ... The Mavericks stand 13-3-3 in games in which he generates a point this year ... Sophomore forward Max Gaede has reached career-highs for assists and points this year with 0-10=10 ... Gaede, who assisted on Dylan Margonari's game-tying goal last Saturday vs. North Dakota, has 0-4=4 in the last eight games ... The Mavericks own an 8-1-0 record when he registers a point this year ... Sophomore forward Chase Grant, who has 6-10=16 on the year, has 3-8=11 in the last 23 games ... His four power-play markers is tied for third on the team ... Freshman forward Teddy Blueger is tied for seventh on the Mavericks with 6-13=19 in 32 games played this season ... Blueger has 3-3=6 in the last eight games ... Freshman Stephon Williams, a two-time WCHA Rookie of the Week this year, stands 19-9-2 overall (t-11th in the

Knowles is tied for fourth on the Mavericks with a +9 on the year and he has 3-2=5 in the last five games played ... MSU stands 5-0-0 in games in which he scores a goal and are 9-2-1 in games in which he has a point ... Freshman forward Dylan Margonari, who has 5-2=7 in his last seven games played, has 10-9=19 to tie for seventh on the team scoring charts ... MSU owns a 13-3-0 mark in games in which he registers at least one point ... Freshman defenseman Jon Jutzi, who has played in all 36 MSU games in 2012-13, has 1-7=8 on the year and is tied for sixth on the Mavericks with a +6 ... Freshman forward Bryce Gervais, who has 1-5=6 in the last nine games, has 6-5=11 in his first year with the Mavericks ... Gervais has seen action in all 36 games in his maiden season and he's ninth on the team with 67 shots on goal ... MSU stands 9-1-1 when he records a point ... Freshman forward Taylor Herndon scored the first goal of his MSU career when he tallied the Mavericks' second goal last Friday vs. North Dakota ... Herndon has 1-2=3 in eight games in 2012-13 ... As a team Minnesota State is second nation in goals scored in the third period with 45 ... Minnesota State's 39 power-play goals on the season stands tied for second in the nation (the Mavericks 23.1 PP% ranks sixth in the nation) ... The Mavericks' 22 wins this year are the most achieved during the program's DI-era, which dates back to the 1996-97 season ... MSU teams have hit the 20-win plateau three times since reaffiliating to NCAA Division I (22-11-3 in 2012-13, 21-14-4 in 1999-2000 and 20-11-10 in 2002-03) ... MSU's attendance for last Saturday's game vs. North Dakota of 5,088 is the seventh-largest crowd ever at Verizon Wireless Center ... MSU's average attendance this year (3,786) is the highest since the Mavericks averaged 3,880 per game in 2009-10.

This week, the Mavericks begin the WCHA playoffs as the seventh seed and will visit sixth-seeded Minnesota State for games on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, if necessary, March 15-17 ... All three games start at 7:07 pm ... UNO finished the regular season with a record of 18-16-2 overall and 14-12-2 in the WCHA ... The Mavericks closed the regular season with four straight losses ... UNO was swept for the second consecutive weekend and for the fourth time this season, losing at Minnesota Duluth, 5-4 and 6-0 ... Last Saturday's game was UNO's first shutout loss of the season ... Josh Archibald, Matt White and Michael Young all had two-point weekends ... Archibald had a goal and an assist while White and Young each had two helpers ... Young and fellow defenseman Andrej Sustr led the team with +2 ratings ... UNO surrendered five power-play goals in their 6-0 loss to Minnesota Duluth last Saturday ... It was the first time in more than eight years that the Mavericks had surrendered five powerplay goals in a game (Nov. 13, 2004 vs. Bowling Green) ... Junior Ryan Walters, a candidate for the Hobey Baker Memorial Award, was held to just one assist in last Friday's 5-4 loss ... He is now second in the nation with 50 points, and his average of 1.39 points per game is tied with Erik Haula of Minnesota for fourth in the NCAA ... He had scored point in seven straight games (5-5=10) before being blanked on Saturday ... He has points in 26 of the last 29 games (21-26=47) ... Walters leads a parade of Mavericks who have reached new career highs in goals, assists and/or points in a season ... Josh Archibald (19-16=35), Dominic Zombo (10-22=32), Andrej

The Mavericks trail the all-time series with Minnesota State, 12-15-5, and they trail 5-8-2 in Mankato ... The two teams split a series in Omaha in December ... Minnesota State won 6-3 in the opener, and UNO responded with a 5-1 win the following night ... Since joining the WCHA, UNO is 4-2-0 against Minnesota State.

NORTH DAKOTA

North Dakota (19-10-7, 14-7-7 WCHA) is the No. 3 seed in the WCHA playoffs and will host Michigan Tech for the fourth time in six seasons next weekend in Grand Forks ... UND earned home ice for the first round of the WCHA playoffs for the 11th straight season, the longest active streak in the WCHA ... UND is 30-8 in the WCHA playoffs under ninth-year head coach Dave Hakstol – nine more wins than any other WCHA school during that time – and has won the last three consecutive Broadmoor Trophies as WCHA playoff champions, the only team in league history to win three league tournaments in a row ... Under Hakstol, UND is 16-3 (.842) in the WCHA First Round and has yet to lose a WCHA First Round series ... The last time UND hosted Michigan Tech in the first round of the WCHA playoffs was in 2010-11, when top-seeded UND swept the 12th-seeded Huskies with 8-0 and 3-1 wins ... UND holds a 147-93-10 (.608) advantage in the all-time series with MTU after picking up a road sweep in Houghton back in December (6-1, 4-1) ... Senior forwards Corban Knight (3g, 3a) and Danny Kristo (2g, 4a) each had 6-point series that weekend. Knight has 15 points in 12 career games against the Huskies, while Kristo has 14 points in eight games ... Junior Clarke Saunders started both games of that December series and stopped 65 of 67 shots ... UND enters the playoffs with just two losses in the last 11 games (6-2-3) and just five setbacks in the last 23 (13-5-5) ... UND closed out the regular season with a split at Minnesota State, winning 4-3 on Friday before falling 2-1 in overtime on Saturday ... Sophomore forward Stephane Pattyn scored a key go-ahead goal in the third period of Friday's win, snapping a 28-game goal-scoring drought ... UND is 14-1-2 this season when scoring four or more goals in a game ... Freshman forward Rocco Grimaldi had a goal and an assist Friday night to extend his career-long point streak to eight games, a streak that came to an end the following night despite a game-high eight shots on goal ... Danny Kristo scored his team-leading 21st goal of the season in last Saturday's loss ... The goal was his 154th career point, which leads all active NCAA Division I men's hockey players ... It also moved him into a tie with Brandon Bochenski (2001-04) and Mike Burggraf (1975-79) for 20th place on UND's all-time scoring list ... Senior Corban Knight assisted on Kristo's goal Saturday, giving him 142 career points and tying him with T.J. Oshie (2005-08) for

32nd on UND's all-time scoring list ... UND's next victory will give Dave Hakstol 20 wins in each of his nine seasons behind the bench.

ST. CLOUD STATE

The St. Cloud State men's hockey team won its first-ever WCHA regular season title on March 8 with its 4-2 win at Wisconsin ... SCSU completed the regular season with a 21-14-1 overall record and an 18-9-1 WCHA record, which provided SCSU with 37 league points ... The Huskies gained the number one seed in the upcoming WCHA postseason playoffs and will host #12 seed Alaska Anchorage in first round play at the NHEC on March 15-17 ... For complete information on this best-of-three series, please visit www.scsutickets.com or call 1-877-SCSUTIX ... The regular season conference title marks SCSU best finish since joining the league in 1990-91 ... SCSU owns a 2-0 record in WCHA postseason play against Alaska Anchorage ... The lone meeting in tournament play against UAA was a 5-1 and 8-2 series sweep at the NHEC on March 9-10, 2001 ... This will mark the 12th time since 1990-91 that SCSU has hosted first round action in the WCHA playoffs and it marks the second consecutive season that SCSU has hosted the first round games ... Last year, SCSU posted a 4-0, 3-1 series sweep at the NHEC against Nebraska Omaha ... In first round games hosted by the Huskies, SCSU owns a 20-6-0 record ... SCSU has gained home ice in the WCHA playoffs five times during the Bob Motzko era (since 2005-06) ... The last time SCSU hosted first round games and did not advance to the WCHA Final Five was in 1995 with a pair of setbacks against North Dakota ... Overall, SCSU is 29-24 in first round playoff games ... SCSU is 50-17-6 in the all-time series against Alaska Anchorage ... Earlier this season, SCSU split a weekend trip to Alaska with a 4-3 OT victory on Nov. 30 and a 3-1 loss on Dec. 1 ... Last year, SCSU split at the NHEC against UAA with a 3-2 OT loss on Feb. 17, 2012 and an 8-3 win on Feb. 18, 2012 ... SCSU is 2-3-0 in the last five meetings against UAA and 5-4-1 in the last 10 meetings against the Seawolves ... Of note, SCSU has only lost one game at home against UAA since joining the WCHA in 1990-91 ... Hobey Baker Memorial Award and postseason awards candidate Drew LeBlanc added a goal and an assist in the weekend series at Wisconsin on March 8-9 ... He continues to lead the country with 34 assists and four more helpers this winter to tie the team record of 38 assists set by Mark Hartigan in 2001-02 and Brandon Sampair on 2000-01 ... LeBlanc also ranks fourth in the country with 46 points ... In the WCHA, LeBlanc finished the regular season with a league-leading 25 assists (WCHA games only) ... LeBlanc has 14 multi-point games in 2012-13 ... Freshman Jonny Brodzinski scored two goals in the Huskies' 4-2 win at UW on March 8 ... He ranks fourth in the league with 16 goals in WCHA games and ranks first among Division I rookies with 19 goals overall ... He has enjoyed six multi-point games this season and has been held off the scoresheet only three times since Dec. 8 ... Defender Andrew Prochno continues to impress in the second half of 2012-13 ... He scored two assists and two goals in the series at Wisconsin ... In the last six games, Prochno has enjoyed five multi-point games and has scored three goals and eight assists ... His season totals now stand at five goals and 21 assists in 2012-13 ... Junior defender Nick Jensen ranks second in the nation among DI defenders with 24 assists this season and he also four goals for a season total of 28 points ... Jensen had one goal and one assist in the games at UW this past weekend ... In his career, Jensen now ranks fourth in the team records for points by a defender with 83 (he is tied with SCSU assistant coach Garrett Raboin/2006-10) ... He ranks second in the team records for blueliners with 68 career assists ... A total of 12 Huskies have charted 10-or-more points in 2012-13 ... This group includes five freshmen and only two seniors ... Of note, freshman Jimmy Murray notched two assists in the Husky win at Madison on March 8 and junior Cory Thorson had two helpers on March 9 at UW ... Junior forward Nic Dowd ranks second on the team on offense with 36 points (13g, 23a) ... Sophomore goalie Ryan Faragher owns a 2.34 goals-against average this season with a .914 save rate ... His record this season is 20-12-1 and his 20 wins rank fourth in the team season records for most wins in a season ... The team record for most goalie wins in a season is 25, which was set by Scott Meyer in 2000-01 ... Faragher has started 15 consecutive games for the Huskies

... He is 9-5-1 in those games for the Huskies ... SCSU has outscored its opponents 119-91 this season and have outshot its opponents 1060-965 ... SCSU ranks fifth in the nation with an average of 3.31 goals per game ... At an average of 8.1 penalty minutes per game, SCSU is the least penalized team in DI hockey this winter ... For WCHA games only this season, the Huskies rank first on offense in the league with an average of 3.35 goals per game and they rank third on defense with an average of 2.36 goals allowed per game ... Individually, SCSU's Ryan Faragher ranked first in WCHA play this season with 18 goalie victories (league games only) ... UW overcame a 2-0 third-period deficit in the 2-2 tie ... UW meets UMD for the 166th and 167th times in history, but for just the third time in the first round of the WCHA playoffs (1978, 1991) ... UW is 4-0 against UMD in the first round of the WCHA playoffs ... UW and UMD last met in the postseason in the 1993 WCHA Final Five third-place game, with UMD claiming a 7-5 victory ... the Badgers are 13-12-7 against the Bulldogs under head coach Mike Eaves ... the Badgers and Bulldogs have met 165 times, the third most frequent opponent for the UW (Minnesota - 266, Colorado College - 183) ... junior forward Michael Mersch finished the regular season as the WCHA leader in goal-scoring after tallying two goals last Saturday against St. Cloud State for his 21st and 22nd goals of the year ... Mersch is tied for second with 17 goals in league play ... Mersch is the fifth Badger during the Mike Eaves' era to score at least 20 goals in a season, joining Blake Geoffrion (22 in 2009-10) as one of just two Badgers to do so in the regular season ... Mersch has been responsible for 24.4% of UW's goals, second most in the nation behind St. Lawrence's Greg Carey (26.4%) ... three past Badgers have finished a season with at least 20% of the team's goals, including Mark Johnson with 22.4% (48-of-214) in 1977-78, as well as Rene Bourque (2002-03) and Jake Dowell (2006-07) with 20.4% (both at 19-for-93) ... Wisconsin went 12-3-5 over its last 20 league games after beginning the season 1-5-2 in its first eight league contests ... UW is 16-5-5 in its last 26 games after going 1-7-2 in its first 10 games ... Wisconsin is outscoring its opponents 74-50 at even strength this season ... Wisconsin is playing for the 11th consecutive weekend this week ... The current stretch began with a trip to Alaska Anchorage on Jan. 4-5 ... Fourteen of Wisconsin's last 19 games have been decided by one goal or less and UW is 9-3-2 in those one-goal contests ... Wisconsin's defense finished as the league's top regular-season squad, allowing 2.29 goals-against per game in WCHA contests ...
