For the Final Five, the six first round winners were re-seeded No. 1 thru No. 6 following the first round of playoffs based on their regular season finish. North Dakota as the No. 1 seed and Denver as the No. 2 seed receive a bye on Thursday.

Thursday's (March 17) two Final Five quarterfinal match-ups will have No. 6 seed Bemidji State (14-17-5) vs No. 3 seed Minnesota Duluth (22-9-6) in a 3:37 pm CT afternoon face-off while the evening game on Thursday will feature No. 5 seed Alaska Anchorage (16-17-3) against No. 4 seed Colorado College (21-17-3) at 7:07 pm CT.

On Friday (March 18) afternoon at the Xcel Energy Center, No. 2 seed Denver (23-10-5) will play the winner of Thursday's Minnesota Duluth vs Bemidji State game at 2:07 pm CT while top-seeded North Dakota (28-8-3) will go up against either Colorado College or Alaska Anchorage in the evening semi-final at 7:07 pm CT.

Then on March 19, championship Saturday will get underway at 1:00 pm CT when the Minnesota Wild host the Columbus Blue Jackets in a National Hockey League regular season contest.

From 4:30 pm-6:30 pm CT on Saturday, fans can attend free of charge The Microsoft Store WCHA Fan Fest, at the Iron Range Grill located at Gate 4 of the Xcel Energy Center. Come celebrate the Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five with music, interactive games, food & beverages and more! Cheerleaders, mascots and WCHA pep bands will rock the house with the school songs that lead their teams to victory. Live music by Playback. Notable WCHA alumni will also be part of the action.

The 2011 Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five will then conclude on Saturday evening with the Broadmoor Trophy championship game at 7:07 pm CT. The winner receives the WCHA's automatic berth into the NCAA tournament.

- Minnesota Duluth is 1-0-1 vs Bemidji State this season, winning 3-2 on Oct. 29 and tying 1-1 (ot) on Oct. 30 with both games in Bemidji.
- Colorado College is 2-3-0 in five encounters against Alaska Anchorage this season, winning 4-3 in a non-conference match up at the Bryce Alaska Goal Rush tournament in Fairbanks on Oct. 15, splitting with the Seawolves in Colorado Springs in league play on Nov. 26-27 (lost 3-4 ot, won 2-0) and then getting swept in Anchorage on Jan. 14-15 by 4-1 and 4-2 scores.
- Denver is 2-0-0 vs Bemidji State this season, winning 3-1 and 4-2 at Magness Arena in Denver on Nov. 19-20.
- Denver is 1-1-0 vs Minnesota Duluth, winning 5-4 (ot) and losing 2-1 in Duluth on Dec. 3-4.
- North Dakota is 2-0-1 vs Alaska Anchorage this season, tying the Seawolves 5-5 (ot) in non-conference play at the Kendall Hockey Classic in Anchorage on Oct. 8 and then sweeping them in Grand Forks on Feb. 11-12 by 6-1 and 3-1 scores.
- North Dakota is 1-1-0 vs Colorado College this season, splitting their WCHA series in Colorado Springs on Jan. 28-29 (lost 4-2, won 6-0).

The Fighting Sioux, Pioneers, Bulldogs, Seawolves and Beavers all posted two-game sweeps this past Friday (March 11) and Saturday (March 12) in their first round, best-of-three, WCHA playoff series while Colorado College prevailed in three games over visiting Wisconsin. Both Alaska Anchorage and Bemidji State claimed their first round series on the road. North Dakota won 8-0 and 3-1 over No. 12 seed Michigan Tech on Friday (March 11) and Saturday (March 12). No. 2 seed Denver posted back-to-back first round playoff victories over No. 11 seed Minnesota State, 4-2 and 3-2 (ot). No. 10 seed Bemidji State claimed successive victories at No. 3 seed Nebraska Omaha, 4-2 and 3-2. No. 4 seed Minnesota Duluth upended No. 9 seed St. Cloud State twice, 4-2 and 3-2 (3 ot). No. 8 seed Alaska Anchorage swept at No. 5 seed Minnesota, 4-3 and 2-0. And No. 6 seed Colorado College skated past No. 7 seed Wisconsin in three games, with the Badgers winning 3-1 in the opener last on Friday night and the Tigers coming back for a 4-3 (ot) triumph on Saturday and a 2-1 decision on Sunday.

Following this week's 2011 Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five, the first round the NCAA tournament, to be contested the weekend of March 25-27, will consist of four regionals. The East Regional will be played at Arena at Harbor Yard in Bridgeport, Conn., on Friday and Saturday. The West Regional will be played at Scottrade Center in St. Louis, Mo., and will also be played on Friday and Saturday. The Northeast Regional will be contested that Saturday and Sunday at Verizon Wireless Arena in Manchester, N.H., while the Midwest Regional will be on Saturday and Sunday at Resch Center in Green Bay, Wis.

The 2011 NCAA Men's Frozen Four, matching up the four regional winners from the previous weekend, is set for Thursday, April 7 and Saturday, April 9 at Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul, Minn.

In this week's (March 14, 2011) USCHO.com Men's Div. 1 Hockey National Poll, the WCHA has six member teams ranked among the nation's top 20 and four more who received votes. North Dakota is again No. 1, Denver is No. 5, Minnesota Duluth is No. 11, Colorado College is No. 13, Nebraska Omaha is No. 14 and Wisconsin is No. 19. Also receiving votes this week were Minnesota, Alaska Anchorage, Bemidji State and St. Cloud State.

In this week's (March 14, 2011) USA Hockey/USA Hockey Magazine Div. 1 Men's Poll, North Dakota is No. 1, Denver is No. 5, Minnesota Duluth is No. 11, Colorado College is No. 13, and Nebraska Omaha is No. 15.

Through games of March 14, the 12 WCHA men's member teams own a collective 51-25-12 record in games vs other Div. 1 clubs this season for a .648 winning percentage. WCHA teams are 28-10-10 in non-conference games at home, 12-9-2 in non-conference games on the road, and 10-6-0 in non-conference match ups at neutral sites. Against the four other Div. 1 men's leagues, WCHA teams are 9-5-1 (.633) vs Hockey East Association teams, 7-8-4 (.474) vs ECAC Hockey teams, 17-10-7 (.603) vs Central Collegiate Hockey Association clubs, 12-0-0 (1.000) vs Atlantic Hockey Association teams, and 6-2-0 (.750) vs independents.

Team records in non-conference play are: Alaska Anchorage (2-2-0), Bemidji State (4-2-0), Colorado College (5-3-1), Denver (4-2-2), Michigan Tech (2-4-2), Minnesota (3-2-1), Minnesota Duluth (5-0-1), Minnesota State (6-0-2), Nebraska Omaha (4-4-0), North Dakota (4-2-1), St. Cloud State (4-3-1) and Wisconsin (8-1-1).

The 2011 Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five will begin on March 17 with quarterfinal match-ups at 3:37 pm and 7:07 pm (CT), and will be followed up by semifinal games on March 18 at 2:07 pm and 7:07 pm. The Broadmoor Trophy championship game will be played on March 19 at 7:07 pm CT.

The Minnesota Sports Broadcast Network was formed in 2005 with the intent on providing coverage for sports of all levels, including youth, high school, college, and professional levels. The Broadmoor Trophy

One of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association's two major championship trophies for men's competition is the Broadmoor Trophy, which has been awarded annually since 1985 to the winner of the conference's post season playoff championship tournament. In 2010 (last season), the league unveiled an all-new Broadmoor Trophy.

The history of the Broadmoor Trophy dates to 1981, when it was first presented to the conference by the world-renowned Broadmoor Hotel and Resort Complex of Colorado Springs, Colo.

For the first three seasons of its partnership with the WCHA (1981-1984) – and due to the departure of league member and MacNaughton Cup (regular season championship trophy) custodian Michigan Tech to

the CCHA – the Broadmoor Trophy was presented to the Association's regular season champion. But when the Huskies returned to the WCHA in 1984 – with the MacNaughton Cup in hand – the Broadmoor Trophy became, and has remained since, the symbol of the league's post-season tournament championship.

Long an ardent supporter of college hockey, the Broadmoor Hotel included the former Broadmoor World Arena, which hosted the NCAA Ice Hockey Championship a total of 11 times between 1948 and 1969.

Final Five Overtime Procedures

Where advancement in a bracket or the determination of a tournament champion is necessary, any game that results in a tie will be broken by 20-minute sudden-death overtime periods.

The ice shall be resurfaced upon completion of regulation play, as well as after each succeeding 20-minute overtime period.

Intermissions between overtimes will be the same as between the first, second and third periods.

The teams will change ends at the start of each 20-minute overtime period for the entire time that it takes to determine a winner.

Final Five Official Timeouts

Official Timeouts: There will be four, 1:00 official timeouts per periods one, two and three. Timeouts will be taken at the first stoppage of play after the 16:00, 12:00, 8:00 and 4:00 marks.

There will be no timeouts taken during power-plays.

There will be no timeouts may be taken after an icing.

No timeouts may not be taken if the puck is shot directly out of the defensive zone by a defensive player.

Timeouts are discouraged (but not prohibited) during even-strength shorthanded play.

There will be no timeouts during overtime for all 2011 Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five games.

MADISON, Wis. – Two seniors representing regular season and MacNaughton Cup champion University of North Dakota – forward **Matt Frattin** and defenseman **Chay Genoway** – were today (March 10) honored as WCHA Player of the Year and WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year, respectively, to highlight the men's Western Collegiate Hockey Association individual awards for the 2010-11 season. Frattin and Genoway were also both voted to the All-WCHA First Team.

The league's other major individual awards went to University of Wisconsin defenseman **Justin Schultz** as WCHA Defensive Player of the Year, University of Denver forward **Jason Zucker** as WCHA Rookie of the Year, **Frattin** as WCHA Scoring Champion, North Dakota netminder **Aaron Dell** as WCHA Goaltending Champion, and to **Dean Blais** of the

University of Nebraska Omaha as WCHA Coach of the Year.

Frattin, who received 58 votes in player of the year balloting, also captured the league's scoring title (conference games only) with 40 points (22g, 18a), the most points by a Sioux player in league games since 2000-01. In 28 league games he averaged 1.43 points per game as the Sioux claimed the regular season championship for a record 15th time overall and second time in the past three seasons. A native of Edmonton, Alberta, Frattin is tied for the NCAA Div. 1 lead with 29 goals, including a nation's-best 19 goals scored away from home, and leads UND in points (49), goals (29), power-play goals (9), game-winning goals (4), and shorthanded goals (2). He is currently riding his second nine-game point streak for the season, scored a goal in eight straight games earlier this season, and has gone consecutive games without a point on only two occasions. Frattin is a draftee of the National Hockey League's Toronto Maple Leafs.

Genoway, who also earned All-WCHA First Team honors, was named the men's WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year in a vote of league member team Faculty Athletic Representatives. A two-time team captain and one of only three individuals to earn WCHA Scholar-Athlete honors four times (the others were Scott McCulloch of Colorado College from 2005-09 and Jenna Hewitt of Minnesota State from 2006-10), Genoway maintains a 3.558 cumulative grade-point average at North Dakota and will graduate in May with a BBA in Management. After a season-ending injury last year, the Morden, Manitoba product went on to earn a 4.0 GPA in the fall of 2010, has done a team-leading 68.5 hours of community service during this academic year and was named an ESPN the Magazine All-American as a junior. He is the fourth highest scoring defenseman overall in the WCHA this season with 26 points (6g, 20a) despite missing eight games, ranked second in the WCHA in points per game by a defenseman at 0.95, leads all active WCHA defensemen with 116 career points, and put together a 12-game point streak earlier this season, tying a 33-year old school record for defensemen. Genoway is also a finalist for the Lowe's Senior Class Award and has earned UND's Archie Krum Memorial Athletic Scholarship for "leadership qualities, high academic standards and athletic excellence" three years in a row.

The WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year Award is determined from nominations made by the member institutions and each institution then has one final vote. The criteria is as follows: 1) must be a senior student-athlete, i.e. one who is finishing his competition as an eligible player in the WCHA; 2) consistently displays outstanding sportsmanship on and off the ice; 3) is a good student making satisfactory progress toward a degree; and 4) is a good hockey player who has performed consistently as a regular member of the team.

To earn recognition as a WCHA Scholar-Athlete, student-athletes must have completed at least one year of residency at their present institution prior to the current academic year and must also have a grade-point average of at least 3.50 on a 4.0 scale for the previous two semesters or three quarters, or may qualify if his or her overall GPA is at least 3.50 for all terms at his or her present institution.

The league's 12 head coaches voted the University of Wisconsin's Justin Schultz as WCHA Defensive Player of the Year. From West Kelowna, British Columbia, Schultz is the first sophomore to win the award and also earned All-WCHA First Team accolades. Schultz is the second straight Badger to earn the league's top defensive award, with defensemen Brendan Smith earning the honor in 2009-10. Schultz's 18 goals so far this season are the most for any defenseman in the country since the 2002-03 season and one off the UW record. He's the nation's leading point scorer among defensemen and also leads the Badgers with 46 points. Among his goals are nine power-play goals, five first goals and three game-winning goals, including an overtime game-winning goal. A draftee of the NHL's Anaheim Ducks, he posted the first hat trick by a UW defenseman since 1991-92 and logs over 30 minutes of ice time per game.

Honored as the WCHA Rookie of the Year was University of Denver forward Jason Zucker, who was named on 78 ballots after leading all first-year conference players in scoring – and finishing third overall – with 36 points (20g, 16a). From Las Vegas, Nevada, Zucker made a strong bid to become just the second freshman in the 59-year history of the WCHA to win a scoring title, with DU's Vic Venasky first accomplishing the feat in

1970-71 with 39 points (14g, 25a) in 22 games. One of only two players to score 20 goals in WCHA action, he ranked second nationally among rookies with 1.12 points per game, had 12 multiple-point games, and tallied 14 points (4g, 10a) during a career-high nine-game point streak. Zucker was named the National Div. 1 Rookie of the Month for February and was a two-time WCHA Rookie of the Week. He is a draftee of the NHL's Minnesota Wild.

Earning the WCHA goaltending crown for 2010-11 was North Dakota's Aaron Dell, who was also voted to the All-WCHA First Team. A sophomore from Airdrie, Alberta, Dell topped all league netminders with a 1.97 goals-against average in conference play, posting a 19-4-1 WCHA mark and a .912 save percentage over 1,432:09 of action. He won the league's goaltending crown by the widest margin since 2001-02 and led the WCHA in league wins (19) and winning percentage (.812). In 33 overall games, Dell is tied for second in the nation in wins (24), ranks second in GAA (1.95), third in winning percentage (.781), and is tied for fourth in shutouts (4). A two-time WCHA Defensive Player of the Week, he put together a shutout streak of 224 minutes, :31 seconds, the second-longest in school history and the longest in nearly 60 years.

The WCHA Coach of the Year for 2010-11 is Dean Blais of the University of Nebraska Omaha. Blais, who earns the award for the fourth time in his collegiate coaching career, led his Mavericks to a 17-9-2 league mark and third place finish, just one point out of second, as well as to a home playoff berth in the team's first season in the WCHA. Named on 49 ballots, he guided UNO to its best-ever conference finish, to the most conference wins in school history, and as of March 10, the Mavericks have also already secured the second-highest single season win total in school history with 21. Blais, who earned his 300th career win on Feb. 12 against Wisconsin, was previously honored as the league's coach of the year in 1996-97, 1998-99 and 2000-01 as head coach at North Dakota.

The WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year award is selected by league-member Faculty Athletic Representatives while the WCHA Defensive Player of the Year is selected by the league's 12 head coaches.

WCHA Announces Record Group of 90 Men's and Women's Scholar-Athletes for 2010-11 Sixth Annual Class Includes 30 Repeat Honorees

MADISON, Wis. – The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, through Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod, Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, University of Alaska Anchorage Faculty Representative Steve Strom (Chair, men's league) and University of North Dakota Faculty Representative Sue Jenö (Chair, women's league) announced on Feb. 10, 2011 that a total of 90 men's and women's student-athletes make up the sixth annual group of WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award recipients. "This annual announcement of our Scholar-Athletes has become one of the highlights for the entire Western Collegiate Hockey Association family of student-athletes, coaches and administrators and gives us an opportunity to showcase the fact that along with being great athletes on the ice, these honorees are truly exceptional students off the ice. The rigorous classroom schedules they maintain, as well as their intense commitments to their sport, are most impressive and to be able to achieve what they have is inspiring to all of us. Thirty (30) of this season's 90 men's and women's WCHA Scholar-Athletes are repeat honorees, including a four-time recipient and 11 three-time winners. Earning the distinguished honor for the fourth time is North Dakota's Chay Genoway (2007-08, 2008-09, 2009-10, 2010-11), who becomes only the third student-athlete to do so. All 12 Member Teams to be Involved in Post-Season Championship

SAINT PAUL, Minn. – At a press conference held March 20, 2010 in conjunction with the annual Red Baron™ WCHA Final Five, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association revealed its new post-season tournament format (beginning in 2010-11), unveiled a new Broadmoor Trophy to go to the league's annual playoff champion and welcomed new Association-members Bemidji State University and the University of Nebraska Omaha into the conference family.

On hand for the press conference were WCHA Commissioner Bruce McLeod, Minnesota Wild Vice-President Bill Robertson, Blue Ribbon Trophies & Awards of Colorado Springs, Colo., Bemidji State Faculty Representative Doug Leif and 1980 U.S. Olympic hockey player Phil Verchota speaking on behalf of BSU, and Nebraska Omaha Director of Athletics Trev Alberts. Also making a special appearance was Paul Kelly, CEO of College Hockey, Inc., and former Executive Director of the NHLPA.

"We are very excited to announce what we will feel will be a very positive evolution in the long and successful history of our WCHA Final Five beginning next season," said McLeod. "A tremendous amount of work has gone into this process and numerous ideas and concepts were discussed. But ultimately our goal was to preserve the tremendously popular event we have now, continue to build on that success and add a couple of intriguing new twists."

"The Red Baron WCHA Final Five has become a perennial favorite in Saint Paul," said Xcel Energy Center Vice President and General Manager Jack Larson. "The new



format will make it even better. We are very proud to host to this tournament and honored to play a part in this exciting new era for the WCHA."

Beginning in 2010-11 the WCHA post-season championship will consist of six first round, best-of-three series on campus sites. The No. 1 seed will host the No. 12 seed, the No. 2 seed will host the No. 11 seed, No. 3 will host No. 10, No. 4 will host No. 9, No. 5 will host No. 8 and No. 6 will host No. 7.

Following the completion of the first round, the six winning teams will advance to the WCHA Final Five at Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul. The brackets for the Final Five will be pre-set and the top two seeded teams will receive a bye. The 2011 Red Baron WCHA Final Five, set for March 17-19, will get underway with two games on Thursday on a single-ticket for the opening day. The Thursday games are set for 3:37 pm CT and 7:07 pm CT. Team No. 3 will play Team No. 6 and Team No. 4 will play Team No. 5.

On Friday of Final Five weekend, Thursday's winners will advance to take on the top two-seeded teams in a pair of semifinal matchups on Friday with separate admission tickets set for 2:07 pm and 7:07 pm. As the brackets will be pre-set, the matchups on Friday could be different than usual. And there will no longer be a third place game.

Then on 'WCHA championship Saturday,' hockey fans are in for a special treat with a National Hockey League–WCHA doubleheader. The Minnesota Wild will play a regularly-scheduled NHL game tentatively set for 1:00 pm at Xcel Energy Center, followed by the Final Five title contest at 7:07 pm CT. A limited number of tickets for the Minnesota Wild NHL game will be made available to Final Five season ticket purchasers who meet a prescribed deadline.

"Our Final Five name is such a strong brand for us we wanted to make every effort to preserve that," added McLeod. "And with the championship still consisting of five games, we were able to do that."

"This will be a great opportunity to see an NHL game and presents numerous possibilities for the WCHA and the Minnesota Wild to do a lot of cross-marketing with the connection between college and pro hockey. We think it's a win-win situation for all!"

The WCHA also unveiled a new Broadmoor Trophy at the press conference, which is presented to the winning team of the league's annual playoff championship. The new bronze cast trophy, created by Blue Ribbon Trophies & Awards of Colorado Springs, Colo., is a recreation of the famous Broadmoor Hotel, host to numerous past national championships and the former home of Colorado College hockey.

"We worked closely with Steve Bartlett of the Broadmoor Hotel and Bill and Karen Busobusky of Blue Ribbon Trophies & Awards and could not be more pleased with how the project has come to fruition," said McLeod. "Our MacNaughton Cup has long been recognized as one of the most impressive trophies in all of intercollegiate athletics and we know that this spectacular new Broadmoor Trophy will take a back seat to none. We are greatly indebted to the Broadmoor Hotel and want to recognize their long and significant relationship with the WCHA and college hockey in general."

There will be a total of three Broadmoor Trophies. The largest will be on permanent display at the Xcel Energy Center in Saint Paul in conjunction with the WCHA Final Five, one will be a traveling trophy, and one will be given to the winning team each year as a permanent addition to their display case.

WCHA Final Five Team Notebooks

Seawolves

University of Alaska Anchorage

- The Alaska Anchorage Seawolves advanced to the WCHA Final Five for just the second time in UAA history after sweeping then-No. 17 Minnesota at Mariucci Arena (March 11-12), 4-3, 2-0 in the WCHA First Round, best-of-three series. The First Round sweep was the first in UAA history.
- The only other time the Seawolves have qualified for the tournament was in 2003-04, after besting Wisconsin. The sweep is UAA's fourth of the season, and second straight on the road after sweeping Minnesota State on March 4-5.
- The 2-0 shutout on March 12 was UAA's third of the season and fifth straight win. The last time the Seawolves put together a string of five wins was in 1998-99, while Saturday's win gives UAA its most overall victories since becoming a member of the league in 1993-94.
- With the sweep, UAA is 6-35 in the WCHA First Round. UAA has only picked up First Round wins against Wisconsin and Minnesota – three apiece. At the WCHA Final Five, UAA is 1-2. The Seawolves defeated Colorado College at the Final Five on March 18, 2004 in the Play-In game, before falling to North Dakota (4-2) in the semifinal on March 19 and to Minnesota Duluth (4-2) in the 3rd-place game on March 20.
- The Seawolves wrapped up the regular season with a 3-1 record against Minnesota and were 9-4 in the last 13 games. Overall, UAA holds a 16-17-3 record, and wrapped up league play with a 12-14-2 record (.464) – the best under head coach Dave Shiyak and second best since the Seawolves joined the conference. The best league record was in UAA's inaugural season (1993-94) with a 14-16-2 (.468) mark.
- UAA's penalty-kill unit improved greatly in the second half of the season, going 78/85 (.917) compared to 63/82 (.768) in the first half. The Seawolves' PK finished the conference season ranked No. 1 at 85.8 (109/127) and is currently third in the overall WCHA stats at 84.4 (141-167) – good for No. 13 in the country.
- In the overall WCHA stats, UAA is tied for No. 7 in scoring defense (2.83), No. 9 in penalty minutes (3.3), and No. 10 in scoring offense (2.42) and power-play (15.7).
- UAA's five-game unbeaten streak is currently tied for No. 6 in the country with Connecticut.
- UAA sits at No. 20 in the PairWise rankings, No. 21 in RPI, No. 17 in KRACH and continues to have the second toughest strength of schedule.
- Individually, freshman G Chris Kamal is currently in a five-game winning streak and has posted a .963 save percentage (126/131) and 1.00 goals-against average in that span. Kamal has dressed in 14 games so far this season, posting a .901 save percentage – ranks second on the all-time UAA goaltending list. The Alpharetta, Ga., native's 2.48 goals-against average currently ranks second on the UAA all-time list. In the WCHA overall stats, Kamal ranks No. 6 in gaa, No. 10 in save percentage, and No. 3 in winning percentage (.679).
- Kamal's shutout on March 12 marked the first by a UAA goaltender in a WCHA playoff game – that covers 44 games dating back to the 1992-93 season, when UAA became an affiliate member of the league and made its league playoff debut.
- Senior F Tommy Grant currently holds a career- and team-high eight-game point streak with 6-3=9 totals in the span. Grant leads UAA in goals with a career-high 16 and in points with a career-high 32. In the all-time UAA lists, the North Vancouver, B.C., local is tied for No. 25 in points (90), tied for No. 19 for goals (45) and No. 42 for assists (45).
- Furnishing point streaks in the last five games were senior forwards Craig Parkinson (1-5=6) and Sean Wiles (2-4=6), while freshman F Jordan Kwas tallied 0-7=7 totals in the last six games. Kwas leads UAA in assists with 20 – the most for a Seawolf freshman since Ales Perez posted 22 in 2002-03.
- The Seawolves are hoping to return freshman F Matt Bailey for the WCHA Final Five. Bailey has missed the last six games with a knee injury

after posting 10-10=20 totals in 30 games prior. Bailey is tied for the second-most goals this season (10) and has scored the most goals for a UAA freshman since 2006-07.

Beavers

Bemidji State University

- The Bemidji State University men's ice hockey team makes its debut in the Red Baron WCHA Final Five March 17 after sweeping a best-of-three series at University of Nebraska-Omaha March 11-12. The six-seeded Beavers (14-17-5) will face the No. 3 seed University of Minnesota Duluth (22-9-6) in Game 1 of the event at 3:37 pm CT.
- The Beavers and Bulldogs met Oct. 29-30 at Sanford Center in Bemidji, Minn. Each game of the series was extended to overtime as UMD stole a 3-2 OT victory with just seven seconds to play in the series-opener, before the teams settled for a 1-1 tie in the series finale.
- UMD leads the all-time series 19-9-1, but since Oct. 7, 2005, BSU owns a 7-4-1 mark versus the Bulldogs.
- Sweeping its road series March 11-12, BSU is now 8-4-2 away from the comfort of its home rink – Sanford Center – since Dec. 31.
- Bemidji State's victories versus Nebraska-Omaha last weekend stood as the fourth and fifth wins of the season over the Mavericks as the Beavers finished 5-0-1 versus UNO in 2010-11 – That's 36% of the Beavers' 2010-11 wins. Conversely, BSU also accounted for 33% of the third-place Mavericks' losses and 50% (3-of-6) of its losses at Quest Center Omaha.
- Matt Read paced the Beavers at UNO scoring three goals, including the game-winner last Saturday to help BSU cap the sweep. Tied with Jordan George (16-18=34) for BSU's lead in scoring with 21-13=34, Read established a new career-high last Saturday scoring a pair of goals to total 21 for the season.
- Jamie MacQueen added 2-1=3 points versus the Mavericks, which included the game-winner last Friday evening. Of his 7-4=11 points this season, 2-1=3 came in last weekend's playoff series.
- BSU was out shot in the series 91-37 in the game as the Beavers allowed a season-high 48 shots on goal last Friday.
- BSU has been out shot 23 times in 36 games in 2010-11 and has been out shot 1,092-909 this season.
- The Beavers have allowed 138 shots in the last three games alone, but Dan Bakala has been up to the challenge. He's stopped 131-of-138 shots (.949), posting back-to-back career-high save totals – 44 versus Minnesota March 5 and 46 at Nebraska-Omaha March 11. The last BSU goaltender to record 45 or more stops in a game was Matt Clime (45) in a 4-3 overtime loss to Denver in the semifinal of the 2005 NCAA Northeast Regional (3/26/2005).
- Bakala has totaled 829 saves this season to rank third in the league. He trails the WCHA's top saves man John Falkner (897) of UNO by 68 saves despite playing in nine fewer games.
- Matt Read made his 144th and 145th appearances for the Beavers March 11-12 surpassing Matt Pope and John Haider for the BSU Division I-era record for games played. He holds BSU Division I-era marks for goals (64), assists (78) and points (142).
- Matt Read and Jordan George are tied for 20th in league scoring with 34 points apiece, while Read ranks fifth in goals scored (21) and is tied for first in shorthanded markers (3) this season.
- Read's 20th goal of the season stood as his team-leading eighth power-play goal of the season. He leads the Beavers with 8-7=15 power-play points in 2010-11.
- Matt Read, Ian Lowe and Ryan Cramer, all seniors this season, head into the WCHA Final Five having scored in each of the Beavers last two games. Read has scored in the last four games in which he has played posting f-1=6 points. He sat out BSU's March 5 game versus Minnesota.
- Three seems to be a magical thresh hold for BSU opponents in 2010-11.

BSU is 14-3-3 (.775) when holding its opponents to two or fewer goals this season and gained just two points in the WCHA in the standings (0-10-2 /.083), a pair of ties, when its opponents scored three or more goals in a game.

- BSU's power-play has fewer power-play opportunities than any other team in the league. BSU's 119 man advantage opportunities is more than 100 fewer than the league leader in PP opportunities (222).

Tigers

Colorado College

- The Tigers are making the first appearances at the WCHA Final Five since 2008 and just their second since 2005, when they eventually advanced to the NCAA Frozen Four.
- They will face Alaska Anchorage for the sixth time this season, in the fourth different city and arena. Despite losing three of five decisions against UAA so far in 2010-11, they're 50-17-3 all-time against the Seawolves.
- This season marks the eighth time in Scott Owens' 12 years as head coach that Colorado College has surpassed the 20-victory plateau. CC has accomplished the feat on 14 occasions overall since the 1993-94 campaign.
- Last Saturday's 4-3 overtime triumph over Wisconsin marked the first time in 2010-11 that the Tigers have come from behind to win when trailing at the end of two periods. They did it again on Sunday.
- Last Saturday also marked the team's first sudden-death victory at home in three years.
- Jaden Schwartz and the rest of CC's freshman class have collectively accounted for 103 points (37g,66a) this season after adding six (2g,4a), including four (2g,2a) by Schwartz, to their total last weekend.
- Junior center and assistant captain Nick Dineen has scored five goals in six career post-season appearances.
- By winning three of five decisions against UW the last two weekends, Colorado College improved to 12-4-1 in its last 17 meetings overall with the Badgers dating back to the 2006-07 season.
- Senior winger Stephen Schultz, who scored the game-winning goal at 13:21 of the third period on Sunday, also collected an assist in Games 2 and 3 of last week's playoff series to take over the team scoring lead with 40 points overall (15g,25a) for the season.
- Schultz, along with senior forward Tyler Johnson and freshman left wing Jaden Schwartz, all have factored in on six game-winners apiece in 2010-11. Sophomore center Rylan Schwartz, who combined with his younger brother to set up Schultz's GWG on Sunday, has been involved in a team-best seven, scoring one and assisting on six.
- Jaden Schwartz, who scored twice including the game-winner in overtime last Saturday before adding a pair of assists on Sunday, has averaged 1.42 points per game this season.
- The Tigers have scored twice within a minute eight times in 2010-11. They've also struck in the opening three and a half minutes of a contest on nine occasions.
- Eleven different Colorado College players have been credited with at least one game-winning goal in '10-11, while 20 have factored in on at least one.
- Rylan Schwartz now has factored in on the game-winner goal in 17 of CC's 40 victories the last two seasons combined, scoring four and assisting on 13 including his team-high six GWG helpers this campaign. He also leads the Tigers with a +7 plus-minus rating, and has won 54.3% (284 of 523) of his faceoffs.
- Colorado College, which is 18-1-2 this season when leading or tied after 40 minutes of play, as well as undefeated (15-0-1) when ahead entering the third period, is 11-6-3 in one-goal games.
- The Tigers have scored at least one power-play goal in eight of their last nine outings and in 27 of 41 overall for the season.

Pioneers

University of Denver

- No. 2 seed Denver (23-10-5) plays No. 3 seed Minnesota Duluth (22-9-6) or No. 6 seed Bemidji State (14-17-7) in the semifinals of the 2011 Red Baron WCHA Final Five on Friday, March 18 at 1:07 pm MT (2:07 pm CT) at Xcel Energy Center in St. Paul, Minn.
- The Pioneers, who are on a three-game winning streak, are making their fourth straight trip to the Final Five and look to add to their league-leading 15 WCHA playoff championships.
- DU is 75-56-6 all-time in the WCHA playoffs, including a 15-8-2 mark against Minnesota Duluth.
- The Pioneers have never faced Bemidji State in the WCHA Playoffs. The Beavers are in their first year in the WCHA.
- Denver went 1-1 against Minnesota Duluth this year and 2-0 against Bemidji State.
- Denver leads Minnesota Duluth 106-73-9 in the all-time series that dates back to 1961.
- The Pioneers lead Bemidji State 7-0 in the all-time series that dates back to 1967.
- Head coach George Gwozdecky has guided DU to four WCHA playoff championships (1999, 2002, 2005 & 2008) and is 29-22 all-time in the league playoffs.
- DU is 7-4 all-time at the Xcel Energy Center, including three WCHA playoff titles.
- The Denver senior class of 2011 has posted an impressive 99-46-15 career record and will make their school-best with fourth NCAA Tournament appearance this season. The seniors have captured one WCHA regular-season title, one WCHA Final Five title and three Denver Cup championships.
- Drew Shore leads DU in scoring with 43 points (22g, 21g), while Jason Zucker ranks second with 40 points (21g, 19a). Shore is tied for sixth in WCHA overall scoring, while Zucker is tied for 11th.
- Sam Brittain (17-7-5, 2.25 GAA, .922 Sv%), who has started the last five games, leads the WCHA in save percentage, ranks third in goals-against average and fourth in winning percentage.
- Zucker, who was named WCHA Rookie of the Year, was joined on the All-WCHA Second Team by Shore and defenseman Matt Donovan (8-20=28). David Makowski (6-21=27) and Brittain joined Zucker on the All-WCHA Rookie Team.
- The Pioneers landed 16 members on the All-WCHA Academic Team.
- DU ranks fourth in the WCHA in scoring offense at 3.26 goals per game and sixth in scoring defense at 2.63 gpg.
- The Pioneers rank first in the league on the penalty-kill at 85.7% and seventh on the power-play at 18.7%.

Bulldogs

University of Minnesota Duluth

- For the third year in a row and the sixth time in the last nine years, UMD has earned a berth in the WCHA Final Five where this Thursday afternoon it will face Bemidji State University in the first-ever postseason meeting between the two clubs. The Bulldogs went 1-0-1 against BSU during the 2010-11 regular season, skating away with a 3-2 overtime victory and a 1-1 tie on Oct. 29-30 in Bemidji.
- UMD is 7-4-0 all-time at the Xcel Energy Center, which includes a 6-3-0 mark in the 2003, 2004, 2006, 2009, and 2010 Final Five tournaments. Overall, the Bulldogs are 7-6-0 in WCHA Final Five play (they were 0-1 at the Bradley Center in 1998 and 1-1 at the old St. Paul Civic Center in 1993. Two years ago, UMD became the first play-in game participant to ever capture the Final Five title, going a perfect 3-0 and blanking two opponents (North Dakota in the semis and Dever in the finals) in the process.
- The Bulldogs, who are unbeaten in four of their last five games (3-0-1), punched their ticket to St. Paul by sweeping St. Cloud State University in

an opening round league playoff series last Friday and Saturday night at AMSOIL Arena. UMD, which never trailed the entire weekend, prevailed 4-2 in the opener before ousting the visiting Huskies 24 hours later with a 3-2 triple overtime triumph. Mike Connolly's goal at 1:13 into the third extra session ended the longest home game in the 67-year history of Bulldog hockey – almost four years to the day that the same Huskies defeated visiting UMD by that same score in three overtimes in the third, and decisive game of their WCHA playoff series (which, at 1:11:33 remains the WCHA's longest game ever).

- UMD was the only WCHA club which went the entire regular season without being swept by any opponent – the first time that has ever happened since the Bulldogs joined the NCAA Division I ranks in 1961-62 – and picked up at least one point in all of its WCHA series (another program first). UMD will head into postseason play sporting the fewer losses (9) than all but one WCHA foe – North Dakota (8).

- For the first time since in 25 years (1982-86), the Bulldogs have posted three straight 22-win seasons and will enter the Final Five sporting a .676 winning percentage – the seventh best mark in the nation.

- Three Bulldogs currently occupy the top four spots in the WCHA's overall scoring charts – junior All-American center Jack Connolly is tied for first with 54 points senior right winger Justin Fontaine is third (51 pts) and junior left winger Mike Connolly is fourth (48). That line has combined for 43.3% of the team's scoring harvest this winter (153 of 353 points). In league games only, Jack Connolly wound up second in the WCHA scoring race with 37 points – just three points back of champion Matt Frattin of North Dakota. No Bulldog has finished as the WCHA scoring leader since Junior Lessard in 2003-04, although Justin Fontaine came within two points of accomplishing that feat as both a sophomore and junior and Jack and Mike Connolly did likewise last winter. UMD hasn't sported three players with 50 or more points since 1992-93 – Derek Plante (92), Chris Marinucci (77) and Brett Hauer (51).

- Jack Connolly, who has skated in all 120 games since joining the UMD program in 2008-09 – the longest ironman streak of any current Bulldog, ranks third among all NCAA pucksters in total points and is second in assists (a WCHA-leading 39). The 2010-11 WCHA Preseason Player of the Year has generated the Bulldogs' highest scoring yield (54 points) since the 2003-04 season (Junior Lessard with 63 and Evan Schwabe with 57) and reached the 50-point plateau faster (35 games) than any UMD puckster in 17 years (Chris Marinucci did in 32 outings on his way to receiving the Hobey Baker Memorial Award). Connolly, the school's first two-time All-WCHA first team pick in 25 years who is a +35 as a Bulldog, has amassed more points (103) over the past two seasons than any other skater in the WCHA. In addition, he hasn't gone pointless for two straight games going back to the semifinal and finals of the 2009 WCHA Final Five and has been held without a goal and/or assist on only five occasions this season.

- This past December, Jack Connolly went over the 100-point mark (he now has 132) and joined Fontaine (157) and Mike Connolly (130) in the Bulldog Century Club, which now contains 51 members. That marked the first time UMD had at least three players with 100 or more lifetime points to their credit since 1997-98 when the line of Mike Peluso, Ken Dzikowski and Joe Rybar all eclipsed that milestone at some point during the season. Jack Connolly, whose 100 points over the last two seasons have no equal among WCHA skaters, had his career-high 11-game scoring streak – the longest by a Bulldog in two years – snapped last Friday night.

- Fontaine, who is a team-leading +24 this season, figured in on five of UMD's seven goals last weekend against St. Cloud State (all assists). Last week he was named to the All-WCHA second team for a third consecutive season and joined center Mike Peluso (1995-98) and defenseman Norm Maciver (1983-86) as the school's only three-time all-league honoree of any kind. Fontaine has moved up to 17th place on UMD's all-time scoring list and has a shot – he needs eight points – at becoming the first Bulldog in 17 years (Hobey Baker Memorial Award winner Chris Marinucci was

the last in 1993-94) to crack the Top 15. Next in line is No. 16 Mike Peluso (163 between 1994-98) and No. 15 Skeeter Moore (165 pts., 1983-87). Since the opening of 2008-09, no current WCHA combatant has racked up more points (145) than Fontaine.

- Mike Connolly, who collected his fourth overtime goal as a Bulldogs in last Saturday's 3-2 win over St. Cloud State, is just the second NCAA Div. 1-era Bulldog ever to open his career with three straight 40-point seasons (Dan Lempe, the school's all-time scoring leader, is the other UMD skater to accomplish that feat doing so four times between 1976-80). Over the last 12 games, the 2010-11 All-WCHA first team pick has amassed 12 goals – including a school record-tying five in UMD's 6-4 triumph over Minnesota on Feb. 5 – and seven assists. Connolly leads all current Bulldogs in playoff scoring with 17 points on seven goals and 10 assists in 13 games and is a +10 to boot.

- UMD has cashed in on nine of 27 man-advantage opportunities (33.3%) over the past seven games and currently owns the WCHA's third most efficient power-play (22.0%).

- Justin Faulk is currently the third-highest scoring rookie defenseman in the country and is tied for first among NCAA freshmen blueliners in total goals as well. In 34 games this season the South St. Paul, Minn., product has collected eight goals – six of which have come on the power-play – and 18 assists for 26 points. (The only first-year UMD defenseman to ever turn in a higher scoring yield was two-time All-American Norm Maciver with 27 points in 1982-83). Faulk, a member of both the All-WCHA third team and All-Rookie team, sports the fourth best plus-minus rating (+16) of any 2010-11 Bulldog and has finished with a negative figure in the department in only six games all season. Earlier this winter, he competed with the U.S. at the recent International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championships in Buffalo and paced that team's defense in scoring.

- The Bulldogs have outscored the opposition by a sizable 87-61 margin from the second period on this season and have a NCAA-leading six overtime victories to their 2010-11 credit. They have also given up the fewest third-period goals (27) of any WCHA club this season. In addition, UMD is 17-0-1 when it's taken a lead into the final period of play and is 21-0-1 in the situation going back to a 5-4 overtime loss to Bemidji State on Jan. 23, 2010 (after the Bulldogs led 2-1 at the second intermission).

- After putting the clamps on an eight-game pointless skid at Michigan Tech on Jan. 21, right winger and 2010-11 WCHA All-Rookie team selection J.T. Brown has picked up points in 11 of 14 outings since, collecting 10 goals and seven assists over that time. Brown, the Hockey Commissioner's Association National Rookie of the Month for October, resides in the No. 4 spot on the WCHA freshman scoring list with 33 points (15g, 18a) and one of just six Bulldogs to accrue ice time in all 37 games to date – the lone newcomer to do so. The last first-year Bulldog to produce more goals in a single-season was NHL legend Brett Hull (32) in 1985-86.

- With last Saturday's sudden-death victory over St. Cloud State, UMD is now unbeaten in 27 of its last 29 overtime games (12-2-15) – a run which dates back to the start of the 2008-09 season. A school-record 13 of the Bulldogs' 37 engagements this winter have required an extra session, and UMD is 6-1-6 in those. The six OT victories equals a UMD standard set in 1984-85.

- Junior goaltender Kenny Reiter, who has started each of the past five games, currently owns the WCHA's fourth best goals-against average (2.34) and the sixth best saves percentage (.912). In six career playoff appearances (all starts), he has compiled a 4-2-0 record with a stingy 1.78 goals-against average and a .929 saves percentage. During his three years with the Bulldogs, Reiter has posted the second-best career winning percentage (.598 off a 25-16-5 record, including a 12-6-5 figure this winter) of any NCAA I-era Bulldog in team history, trailing All-American Rick Kostl (60-18-2 for a .753 winning percentage between 1983-85).

- The Bulldogs have been outshot only six times all season (including twice at both Colorado College on Feb. 25-26 and at North Dakota on Nov. 5-6) and is the WCHA's most penalized team at the moment, averaging 14.9 minutes of infraction time per game.

- Travis Oleksuk's 13 goals this season (which is a career high) have come in a variety of ways and at some clutch times as well. The junior center, who has racked up a WCHA-best seven game-winning goals this season,

has scored three times on the power play, once while a man down, once on a penalty shot and once with the goaltender pulled. Two of his goals thus far have been registered in overtime.

- UMD will head into Thursday night's clash with Bemidji State armed with the WCHA's second most potent offense (3.43 goals per game).
- All seven of sophomore right winger Mike Seidel's goals thus far in 2010-11 have been registered on the road.
- UMD lost just twice (5-2 to Nebraska Omaha on March 5 in Duluth and 3-2 to visiting Wisconsin on Jan. 15) in its 17 series rematch games this season, going 11-2-4.
- Of the 19 goals the senior left winger Kyle Schmidt has collected over the past two seasons (including eight in 2010-11), 17 have come in even-strength situations. Only two other Bulldogs (Mike Connolly with 24 and Jack Connolly with 19) has more. Schmidt, Kenny Reiter, Aaron Crandall and sophomore center Keegan Flaherty all earned a WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award for 2010-11. Schmidt and Reiter are UMD's first three-time recipients of this honor.
- UMD's nine regular season losses this year were second fewest in program (NCAA I era) history. Only the 1984-85 Bulldogs, who went into the post season with seven setbacks in tow, has less.

Fighting Sioux University of North Dakota

- Top-ranked and top-seeded North Dakota (28-8-3) has earned a bye into the Red Baron WCHA Final Five semifinal on Friday, and will face the winner of Thursday's Alaska Anchorage-Colorado College quarterfinal.
- The Sioux are unbeaten in 10 games (9-0-1) and have won seven in a row.
- UND is making its ninth straight Final Five appearance, the longest active streak in the WCHA.
- The Sioux won last year's Broadmoor Trophy by winning three games in three days, becoming only the second team in the tournament's current format to accomplish that feat. Forward Evan Trupp was named last season's Final Five MVP.
- The Sioux punched their ticket to this year's Final Five with a two-game sweep of 12th-seeded Michigan Tech, winning 8-0 last Friday and 3-1 on Saturday.
- Last Friday's win was highlighted by hat tricks from both Matt Frattin and Jason Gregoire, the first time two Sioux had scored hat tricks in the same game since Zach Parise and Jason Notermann on Jan. 17, 2003 at UAA. Gregoire's hat trick was his second in as many games, making him the first Sioux to record back-to-back hat tricks since Bob Joyce did so in the first two games of the 1986-87 season.
- Senior defenseman Chay Genoway matched his career high with four assists last Friday, enabling him to move into fifth place on UND's all-time defenseman scoring list with 120 career points. Those 120 points lead all active NCAA DI defensemen.
- Sophomore goalie Aaron Dell recorded his fifth shutout of the season last Friday. He allowed just one goal on Saturday, and became UND's career leader in goals-against average (1.86). He also lowered his NCAA-best GAA this season to 1.87, and won his 26th game of the season, a number that has been topped by only two goalies in UND history: Ed Belfour (29 wins, 1986-87) and Jean-Philippe Lamoureux (27, 2007-08).
- Frattin scored four goals in UND's first round sweep of MTU, giving him an NCAA-leading 33 goals this season. Frattin is the nation's only 30-goal scorer and leads the WCHA goal-scoring race by eight. He is also tied for the WCHA scoring lead (all games) with 53 points. The WCHA Player of the Year, Frattin is riding a career-long 11-game point streak, amassing 13 goals and 24 points during that time.
- Gregoire is riding a career-best 14-game point streak, the longest by a Sioux this season. He has 17 goals and 10 assists during that time.

- UND's power-play has gone 16-for 36 (44.4%) over the last seven games.
- The Sioux have killed 17 consecutive opponent power-plays.
- Freshman forward Brock Nelson has reached the scoresheet in six of his last seven games, scoring nine points (2g, 7a) during that time. Nelson has 13 points (5g, 8a) in 17 games since the Christmas break, compared to six points (2g, 4a) in 20 games prior to Christmas.
- Freshman forward Taylor Dickin, a walk-on who joined the Sioux at the Christmas break, scored his first career goal in last Saturday's series clincher over MTU, and the goal proved to be the game-winner.
- UND is 23-8 in the WCHA playoffs under Dave Hakstol, seven more wins than any other school during his seven-year tenure.
- The Sioux lead the WCHA in scoring offense (4.08 goals per game), scoring defense (2.21) and power-play (23.6%), and are tied for second in penalty-kill (85.4%).

WCHA Men's Tie-Breaking Procedures - For Playoff Purposes Only

At the conclusion of the regular season, teams will be ranked by the number of points accumulated. If two teams are tied for first place, they will be declared co-WCHA champions.

The first round of the WCHA's post-season tournament will be a best-of-three games format at the home site of the teams ranked higher in the final regular season standings. All 12 teams participate in the first round of the tournament. First round playoff pairings will be: #1 rank vs #12 rank, #2 rank vs #11 rank, #3 vs #10, #4 vs #9, #5 vs #8, and #6 vs #7.

Following the six first round series, the six winning teams will be re-seeded #1 thru #6 according to their standings in the final WCHA in-season competition and will advance to the WCHA Final Five.

In the event that ties are encountered in the determination of WCHA ranking or designation of home teams for playoff purposes, the following procedures will be used in the order given to break the ties:

- If two or more teams are tied, head-to-head competition during the regular (conference) season will be used to break the tie.
- If two or more teams are still tied after (a), the highest seed will go to the team with the most WCHA (conference) wins during the regular season.
- If two or more teams played a four-game series during the regular season and the teams have the same win-loss records for those series and the same number of WCHA wins, the team having the least number of goals scored against it in the four-game series shall have the higher rank. If two or more teams played a two-game series during the regular season, proceed to tie-breaker d).
- If two or more teams are still tied after applying the provisions of (a), (b) and (c), the team having the greatest "winning margin" during the regular season will have the higher rank. Winning margin = WCHA goals for during the regular season minus WCHA goals against.
- Games played against WCHA opponents in holiday tournaments will not be counted in the determinations.
