## 2011-12 WCHA Women's Season-in-Review

**Minnesota Golden Gophers Reign as NCAA Women's Frozen Four Champions as WCHA Extends Record Streak of Consecutive National Titles to 13; UM Defeats League-Rival Wisconsin in Frozen Four Championship Game at AMSOIL Arena in Duluth; Gophers Upend Cornell in National Semifinal, Badgers Down Boston College; UW Forward Brianna Decker Named 2012 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award Winner; Eight WCHA Member-Team Skaters Earn All-American Honors ... UM's Megan Bozek, UND's Jocelyne Lamoureux, UW's Decker are First Team Honorees; Wisconsin Captures WCHA Regular Season Crown; Four WCHA Teams Ranked Among Nation's Top 10 in Final Weekly Polls ... MADISON, Wis. – Make it a perfect baker's dozens of women's national championships for the Western Collegiate Hockey Association. The University of Minnesota Golden Gophers provided the frosting on the cake by taking a 4-2 victory over border rival Wisconsin in the all-WCHA national championship game Sunday, March 18 before a crowd of 2,439 at AMSOIL Arena in Duluth, Minn., at the 2011-12 NCAA Women's Frozen Four. This was a record 13th consecutive national championship (1 AWCHA in 2000, 12 NCAAAs since) captured by a WCHA-member team.

Coach Brad Frost's Gophers (34-5-2/.854), who upended Cornell 3-1 in the second national semifinal on Friday night, March 16, claimed the third NCAA championship for the Minnesota program. Minnesota's two previous Frozen Four crowns came in 2004 and 2005, while UM also won the AWCHA-sanctioned national title in 2000.

Wisconsin, which had won four of the previous six NCAA Frozen Fours in 2006, 2007, 2009 and 2011, defeated Boston College 6-2 in the first national semifinal on Friday afternoon. Coach Mark Johnson's Badgers (33-5-2/.850) made their sixth appearance in the national championship game in the last seven seasons.

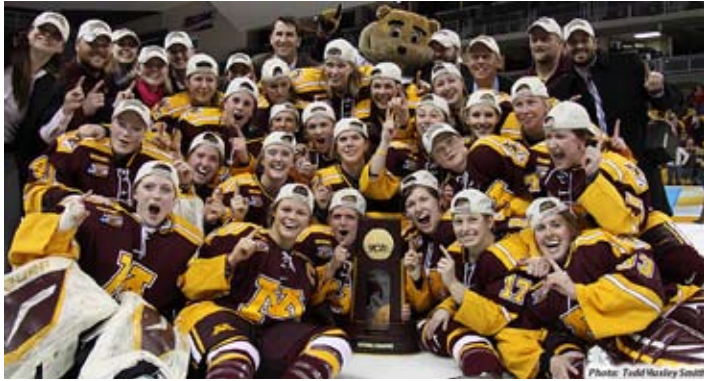
On March 2-3, Minnesota beat North Dakota 6-0 and blanked Minnesota Duluth 2-0 at AMSOIL Arena to win the 2012 WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF playoff championship and gain the league's automatic berth to the NCAA tournament – the Gophers' 10th in the 12-year history of the event. This was also their fifth visit to the Frozen Four and third in the last four years.

## University of Minnesota 2012 NCAA Women's Frozen Four Champions

Minnesota advanced to the 2012 NCAA Women's Frozen Four with a 5-1 regional victory over WCHA-foe North Dakota at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis on Saturday, March 10. Wisconsin, meanwhile, defeated Mercyhurst 3-1 in their March 10 NCAA regional match up at the Kohl Center in Madison.

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association has had multiple teams in all but four NCAA Women's Frozen Fours – in 2001 (Minnesota Duluth), 2004 (Minnesota), 2005 (Minnesota), and 2011 (Wisconsin).

In the 12 years of NCAA-sponsored women's national championships, WCHA-member teams have won all 12 titles – Minnesota Duluth has five, Wisconsin has four and Minnesota has three. Wisconsin defeated Boston University 4-1 in the 2011 championship game at Tullio Arena in Erie, Pa.

The WCHA also dominated college hockey's individual awards with eight All-Americans and Wisconsin junior forward Brianna Decker being the recipient of the 2012 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, as announced by USA Hockey on March 17. The award is given annually to the top female hockey player in the nation. Decker accepted the 15th annual award at a brunch ceremony at the Greysolon Ballroom in Duluth, Minn., in conjunction with the 2012 NCAA Women's Frozen Four. The Dousman, Wis., native is the fourth Badger to win the award, joining Sara Bauer (2006), Jessie Vetter (2009) and Meghan Duggan (2011).

Along with Decker, fellow top-three finalists Jocelyne Lamoureux of North Dakota and Florence Schelling of Northeastern were honored at the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award ceremony. The trio of finalists were named to the CCM Division 1 Women's Hockey All-American First Team by the American Hockey Coaches Association with Minnesota defender Megan Bozek and Cornell's Rebecca Johnston and Laura Fortino. The All-American Second Team included Bemidji State goaltender Zuzana Tomcikova, North Dakota defender Monique Lamoureux-Kolls, Wisconsin forward Hilary Knight, Minnesota forward Amanda Kessel and Ohio State forward Natalie Spooner.

Decker was also named the 2011-12 WCHA Player of the Year and was an All-WCHA First Team honoree, along with Lamoureux, Spooner, Knight, Bozek, Anne Schleper of Minnesota and Tomcikova. Decker, Knight and Schleper are all repeat selections on the all-league squad and it is the third straight season Schleper has been honored. Decker led the nation in goals with 37 and tied for the national lead in points with 82. Earlier this season, she set the program's record for longest scoring streak at 32 consecutive games, recording at least one point in every game between Feb. 11, 2011 and Jan. 6, 2012. She also recorded 26 multiple-point games, 13 multiple-assist games and nine multiple-goal games this season. Decker sits fourth all-time at UW with 189 career points.

Lamoureux was honored as the WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year for 2011-12 in addition to earning the league's scoring title and All-WCHA First Team accolades. The junior from Grand Forks, N.D., maintains an outstanding grade-point average of 3.877 (4.0 scale), majoring in Physical Education, Exercise Science and Wellness, and has been on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll, the Dean's List and the President's Honor Roll at UND. She has been a WCHA Scholar-Athlete in both 2010-11 and 2011-12 as well as a member of the All-WCHA Academic Team. Lamoureux is actively involved with service activities on campus and in the Grand Forks community, including reading to elementary students and Special Olympic events.

Wisconsin's Stefanie McKeough, a junior defender from Carlsbad Springs, Ont., was honored as the WCHA Defensive Player of the Year in a vote of the league's head coaches. She scored four goals, had 14 assists and 18 points in 19 league contests for the regular season champion Badgers.

The WCHA Coach of the Year Award for 2011-12 went to Wisconsin's Mark Johnson, who led the Badgers to a 23-3-2-1 conference record and to the regular season title. It is the fifth time Johnson has either won or shared the award.

North Dakota forward Michelle Karvinen of Rodovre, Denmark was named the WCHA Rookie of the Year.

Joining UND's Karvinen on the All-WCHA Rookie Team were Minnesota Duluth forward Jenna McParland, North Dakota forward Josefine Jakobsen, Minnesota defenseman Rachel Ramsey, Minnesota Duluth defenseman Brigette Lacquette, and goaltender Julie Friend of St. Cloud State.

WCHA teams forged an impressive 36-7-6 record and .796 winning percentage against opponents from other Division 1 conferences this season. League-member clubs went 7-0-2 (.889) vs ECAC Hockey, 14-2-1 (.853) vs. the Hockey East Association, 9-5-3 (.618) vs. College Hockey America, and 6-0-0 vs. Independents.

Four Western Collegiate Hockey Association-member teams ranked among the nation's top 10 in the final two weekly national polls for 2011-12. In the USCHO.com Div. 1 Women's College Hockey Poll, the WCHA had national champion and WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF champion Minnesota at No. 1, WCHA regular season champion Wisconsin at No. 2, North Dakota at No. 6 and Minnesota Duluth at No. 10. In the final USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine Women's Div. 1 College Hockey Poll, Minnesota was No. 1, Wisconsin was No. 2, North Dakota was No. 6 and Minnesota Duluth was No. 10.

The WCHA also had the top four teams in attendance for the women's game. Buoyed by the biggest crowd to ever watch a collegiate game – a total of 12,402 who saw Wisconsin blank Bemidji State 1-0 at the Kohl Center Jan. 28, 2012 – the Badgers attracted 56,471 to home games this season. That is an average of 2,689 per game. North Dakota was second in home attendance nationally (drawing 28,218 for an average of 1,455 per game), followed by Minnesota (27,658/1,307 per game) and Minnesota Duluth (22,435/1,181 per game.)

## Canada Defeats U.S. in Overtime in Gold Medal Game at IIHF Women's World Championship

BURLINGTON, Vt. – The U.S. Women's National Team fell to Canada, 5-4, in overtime in the gold-medal game of the 2012 International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) Women's World Championship here tonight at Gutterson Fieldhouse. Team USA finished the tournament in second place and earned the silver medal with a 4-0-1-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record.

"I'm extremely proud of how our kids battled out of a major hole that we were in against a really good team," said Katey Stone, head coach for the U.S. Women's National Team. "We got ourselves in a position to win the game, but unfortunately it didn't happen."

Canada struck first at 7:52 before Kendall Coyne (Palos Heights, IL) evened the score at 12:54 of the first period to send the teams into the first intermission tied 1-1.

The second period opened with two Canadian goals less than two minutes apart before Brianna Decker (Dousman, WI) connected on the power play from the left faceoff circle at 16:43 to cut the deficit to one. Gigi Marvin (Warroad, MN) followed suit with a power-play goal at 18:16 with a redirected shot from the point.

Marvin scored her second power-play goal of the night at 2:57 of the third period to give the U.S. a 4-3 lead. But Canada notched a power-play tally at 17:22 to send the game to overtime and scored at 1:50 of the extra session to claim the gold medal.

## USA Hockey Announces 23-Player Roster for 2012 IIHF Women's World Championship Group Includes Seven 2011-12 WCHA Member-Team Skaters, Five League Alums

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – USA Hockey today announced the 23 players who make up its U.S. Women's National Team for the 2012 International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship, which runs from April 7-14 in Burlington, Vt. Team USA has won the last three world championships (2008, 2009, 2011).

The U.S. squad was chosen following a selection camp that began March 25 in Lake Placid, N.Y., and included 27 players. The U.S. Women's National Team will continue to train in Lake Placid until departing on Wednesday (April 4) for Burlington.

Included in the group are seven WCHA member-team players from 2011-12. They are defensemen Megan Bozek and Anne Schleper and forward Amanda Kessel of 2012 NCAA Women's Frozen Four champion Minnesota, 2012 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award-winner and forward Brianna Decker and forward Hilary Knight of WCHA regular season champion Wisconsin, and forwards Jocelyne Lamoureux and Monique

Lamoureux-Kolls of North Dakota.

Five players named to the U.S. Team are WCHA alums. They are goaltender Jessie Vetter (Wisconsin), defensemen Lisa Chesson (Ohio State) and Gigi Marvin (Minnesota) and forwards Erika Lawler (Wisconsin) and Jenny Potter (Minnesota Duluth).

"We had some extremely difficult decisions to make after a great week of training and competition in Lake Placid," said Reagan Carey, director of women's hockey for USA Hockey. "Each player was challenged to become better and each player rose to the occasion. I look forward to this team having the opportunity to defend our World Championship title on home ice."

"This group is made of experience and youth, but most importantly, some very exciting players to compete for a world championship," said Katey Stone, head coach for Team USA and also the head women's ice hockey coach at Harvard University. "We hope the crowds come out and don the red, white and blue in Burlington."

The American roster is made up of three goaltenders, seven defensemen and 13 forwards. There are a total of 13 Olympians on the squad, including four-time Olympian Jenny Potter (Edina, Minn.) and Julie Chu (Fairfield, Conn.), who has played on three Olympic teams. A total of 15 players are on the roster who helped Team USA win the world title in 2011.

Defenseman Megan Bozek (Buffalo Grove, Ill.) and forward Taylor Wasylik (Port Huron, Mich.) are making their U.S. Women's National Team debut at the senior level. An additional four players will be competing in their first IIHF Women's World Championship, including defenseman Michelle Picard (Taunton, Mass.) and forwards Hannah Brandt (Vadnais Heights, Minn.), Jillian Dempsey (Winthrop, Mass.) and Amanda Kessel (Verona, Wis.).

Further, 12 members of Team USA played NCAA Division I women's ice hockey during the 2011-12 season, while seven played in either the Canadian Women's Hockey League or the Western Women's Hockey League and one played in prep school. Of the 12 NCAA players, eight participated in the 2012 NCAA tournament, six advanced to the Women's Frozen Four and three captured the national title as part of the University of Minnesota.

At the last IIHF Women's World Championship, which took place in Zurich and Winterthur, Switzerland, in 2011, the U.S. defeated Canada, 3-2, in overtime in the gold-medal game to earn its third straight world title. Top-seeded Team USA opens play in Burlington against Canada on April 7.

## Minnesota Wins Third NCAA Championship with 4-2 Victory over Wisconsin in 2012 NCAA Women's Frozen Four Title Game

### Senior Forward Sarah Erickson Nets Two Goals for Golden Gophers as WCHA Extends Record Streak of Consecutive National Titles to 13

DULUTH, Minn. – Minnesota calls itself the “State of Hockey”. And once again the championship trophy for women's Div. 1 collegiate ice hockey resides there.

Senior forward Sarah Erickson scored two goals and junior goaltender Noora Rätty made 42 saves, including 20 in the final period, to lead the University of Minnesota to its third women's national championship with a 4-2 victory over defending NCAA champion Wisconsin in a high octane championship game at the 2012 NCAA Women's Frozen Four at AMSOIL Arena.

It is the first national championship since 2005 for the Golden Gophers, who also won the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF playoff championship at AMSOIL Arena two weeks ago, and it marks the 13th straight season the Western Collegiate Hockey Association has produced the best team in women's college hockey. The women's WCHA was founded in 1999 and a league-member team has won every national championship.

“I knew this team was a special group when we built it,” said head coach Brad Frost, who won his first national title as head coach after serving as an assistant the first times Minnesota won the crown.

The wide-open battle between league rivals was a wide-open affair from the start, matching the two top seeds in the tournament. This was the first time since 2006 – when Wisconsin won its first national

championship with a 3-0 victory over Minnesota – that the national title game was a Border Battle. It started with a furious pace as All-American forward Amanda Kessel, a Madison, Wis., native, gave the Gophers the early lead 8:45 into the game with her 32nd goal of the season against her hometown team. Kessel's brother Phil also played at Minnesota, but didn't win a championship in his one year in college before becoming a National Hockey League all-star with the Toronto Maple Leafs. Amanda said her parents told her “you can now do something your brother never did.”

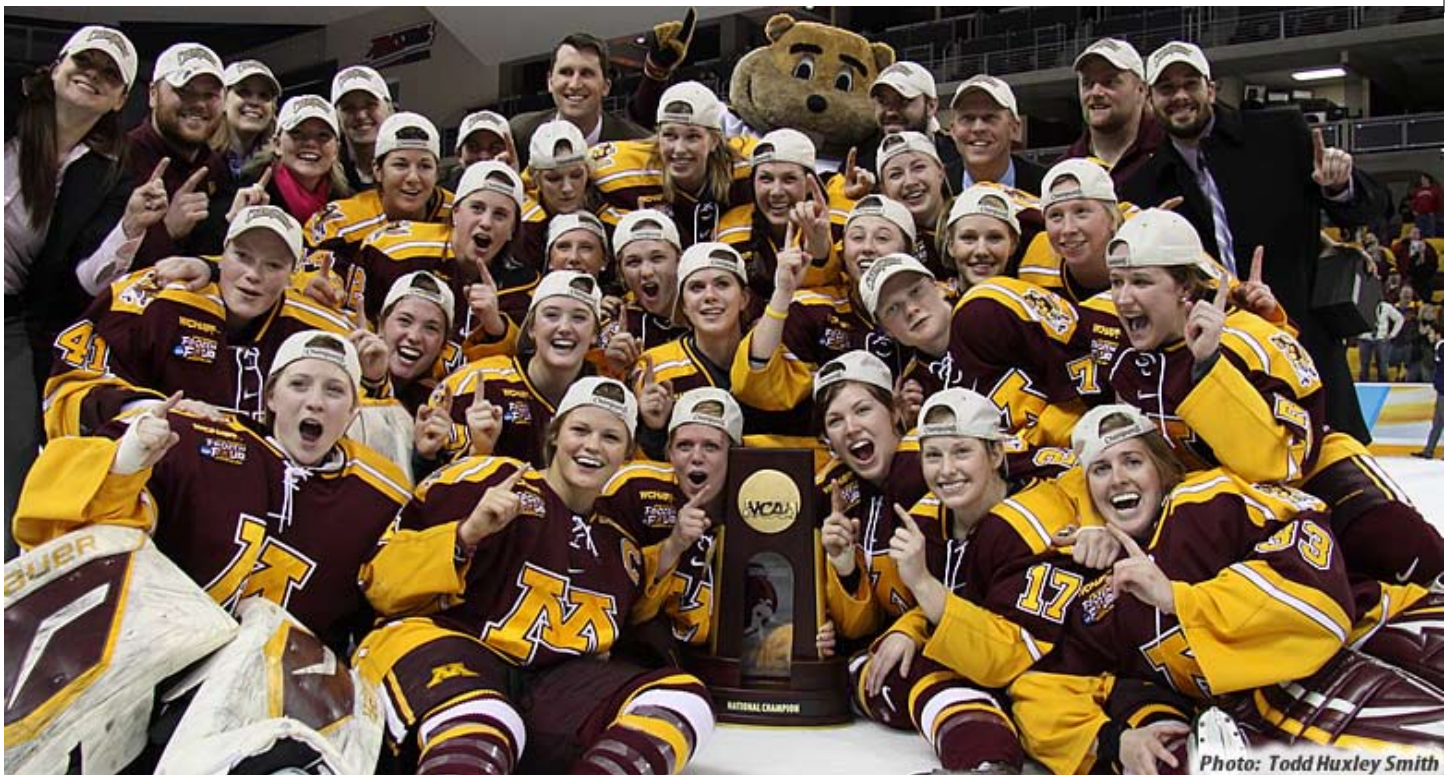
Erickson made it 2-0 just 2:38 later with the first of her two goals and the Gophers were rolling. However, the Gophers then took three straight penalties and allowed Wisconsin back in the game.

Wisconsin's Stefanie McKeough, the WCHA Defensive Player of the Year, cut the lead to 2-1 with a power-play goal, a left point drive which hit traffic and caromed past Rätty, at 14:03. The Badgers' Brooke Ammerman then tied the game 100 seconds later with her 34th goal of the year.

Wisconsin seemingly had momentum and then had a two-man advantage, but the Gophers killed off the first penalty and Emily West broke in on a lone break while killing the second penalty. Even though West failed to score, she was tripped was Minnesota was awarded a penalty shot. West then beat UW goaltender Alex Rigsby with a nifty move and the Gophers regained the lead, 3-2, with 1:32 left in the first period. It was the 27th goal of the season for West, a senior.

The goaltenders took over in the second period. Rätty made 14 of her saves in the middle period, including a spectacular glove save on the Badgers' Carlyne Prévost who thought she had scored on a rebound after Rätty stopped Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award winner Briana Decker's break with 3:13 left in the second session. Decker, the country's leading goal scorer, was held without a point by the Gophers, who had the best defense in the country.

“Noora has been on a run during the last month that has been as good as any goaltender has been on,” said Frost of Rätty, who has given up five

goals in the post-season.

Rigsby, who finished with 21 saves, made a similar great stop on a shorthanded breakaway by Sarah Davis in the final minute of the scoreless period.

It wasn't until Erickson scored her 20th goal of the season, at 3:57 of the final period, that the many Gophers fans in the crowd of 2,439 started thinking Minnesota may dethrone the Badgers, the defending NCAA champs who have also won the last two WCHA regular season titles.

The Gophers went through some tough times to get to that point. Freshman Stephanie Anderson's 24-year-old sister, Nicole, died unexpectedly early in the season, and team wore 'NA' on their helmets to remember her during the tournament. Just two weeks ago, during the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF, Frost's father had emergency brain surgery.

"When I looked up and saw there were three seconds left, tears just came to my eyes," Frost said. "Adversity can bring you together. It doesn't always, but it can."

The Badgers hardly went down without a fight. They fired 12 shots at Rätty in the final six minutes, including a half dozen on a power-play, which came with 2:55 left in the third period and a time when Coach Mark Johnson pulled Rigsby for another attacker to set up a six-on-four skater advantage.

"It was a tough pill to swallow," Johnson said. "We made some mistakes. We needed a break, needed a bounce at some point. We didn't get it. They just did a little bit more than we did. We had opportunities. We didn't capitalize when we needed to."

The Gophers finished the season with a 34-5-2 record. They have previously won NCAA titles in 2004 and 2005 and also won the ACHA national championship in 2000 before the NCAA began to sanction the women's sport. This is the first national title that the Gophers have won under Frost and it served as a going-away gift for retiring athletic director Joel Maturi, a long-time supporter of the Gopher women's program.

The Badgers finish the season 33-5-2 and made an appearance in the title game for the sixth time in the last seven years. UW won national titles in 2006, 2007, 2009 and 2011 and was also a runner-up to Minnesota Duluth in 2008. UMD has won the most NCAA titles with five.

"This is definitely one of the best hockey games I have been a part of," said Wisconsin's Ammerman. "The speed was at a whole another level."

The all-tournament team consisted of Rätty as goaltender, who was also named the tournament's most outstanding player, defender Megan Bozek of Minnesota and forwards Kessel, Erickson, Ammerman and Prévost.

The Dousman, Wis., native is the fourth Badger to win the award, joining forward Sara Bauer (2006), goaltender Jessie Vetter (2009) and forward Meghan Duggan (2011).

Along with Decker, fellow top-three finalists Jocelyne Lamoureux, a forward from North Dakota, and Florence Schelling, a goaltender from Northeastern, were honored at the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award ceremony. The top 10 finalists were also recognized.

Selection criteria includes outstanding individual and team skills, sportsmanship, performance in the clutch, personal character, competitiveness and a love of hockey. Consideration is also given to academic achievement and civic involvement.

About Patty Kazmaier: The Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award is named in honor of the late Patty Kazmaier, who was a four-year varsity letter-winner and All-Ivy League defenseman for Princeton University from 1981-86. An accomplished athlete who helped lead the Tigers to the Ivy League Championship in three consecutive seasons (1981-84), Patty Kazmaier-Sandt died on Feb. 15, 1990, at the age of 28 following a long struggle with a rare blood disease.

## **Minnesota Moves Into NCAA Title Game with 3-1 Win over Cornell in Second National Semifinal** **Sophomore Forward Amanda Kessel Registers Goal and Two Assists for Golden Gophers**

DULUTH, Minn. – The Minnesota Golden Gopher women's hockey team has advanced to the 2012 NCAA Frozen Four championship game with a 3-1 victory over Cornell in a national tournament semifinal. Amanda Kessel led the Gophers with three points on a goal and two assists in the game while Megan Bozek had the game-winning goal, which came in the first period.

Minnesota was dominant in the first period, logging 21 shots on goal and two goals while Cornell managed just five shots on goal. Penalties factored into the first period as the Gophers took just one penalty, while Cornell had four, which resulted in two power-play goals for the Gophers.

Cornell's goaltender, Amanda Mazzotta, made some incredible saves early in the game to keep her team in it, but the Gophers eventually found the back of the net. Seventeen minutes into the game, Amanda Kessel put Minnesota on the scoreboard with a power-play goal, assisted by Sarah Erickson and Anne Schleper. Just :20 seconds after Kessel's goal, Cornell took another penalty and gave the Gophers another power-play opportunity, which they took advantage of when Megan Bozek gave the Gophers a 2-0 lead with a power-play goal at 18:29. Jen Schoullis and Kessel had assists. On Bozek's goal, the puck was deflected off the skate of a Cornell player and found its way past Mazzotta.

The second period had a much different feel as the Big Red came back from intermission showing more offensive pressure. Cornell got on the board with a goal at 11:40 of the period, getting a power-play tally from Alyssa Gagliardi. Jillian Saulnier had an assist on the goal, which cut Minnesota's lead to 2-1. The score would remain the same through the period. After being severely outshot in the first period, Cornell came back to lead in shots 13-9 in the second period.

The Gophers came back to life in the third period, allowing just three shots on goal and staying out of the penalty box. The Gophers recorded 11 shots in the final period. Cornell took two penalties in the latter half of the period, giving the Gophers nearly four consecutive minutes on the power-play. Minnesota did not score with the man-advantage, but was able to wear down Cornell's defense. Cornell pulled Mazzotta out of the net in favor of an extra skater with just under a minute remaining in the game, and Emily West was able to score an empty-net goal on a breakaway with just :34 seconds remaining. Kessel and Rachel Ramsey had assists on the goal.

Minnesota goaltender Noora Räty saved 21 shots in the game, and now has a record of 32-5-2 on the season after starting in all but one game during the 2011-12 campaign.

The Gophers now advance to the NCAA championship game for the first time since 2006, and are looking for their first national title since 2005.

## **Knight, Ammerman Lead Wisconsin Past Boston College 6-2 in First National Semifinal** **Two Badger Forwards Each Score Two Goals to Vault UW into National Championship Game**

DULUTH, Minn. – For the second consecutive year, the No. 1-ranked University of Wisconsin women's hockey team advanced to the national championship game after defeating Boston College, 6-2, on Friday evening at AMSOIL Arena in Duluth, Minn.

Wisconsin (33-4-2) came back from an early deficit to score five

unanswered goals in the semifinal round of the 2012 NCAA Women's Frozen Four. The Badgers will now play Minnesota on Sunday at 3:00 pm CT for the national championship.

Boston College (24-10-3) struck first in the game, netting a goal within the first minute of play. Emily Field never got a full shot off, with her possession broken up by a Badger defenseman, but the loose puck slid its way into the back of the net.

However, the Badgers continued to fight back, netting two goals before the end of the period, highlighted by Carlyne Prévost's unassisted shorthanded goal at the 13:47 mark.

Senior Hilary Knight scored two goals for the Badgers, including the game winner at the 1:34 mark of the second period. Her goal on the power-play at the end of the game was the team's first with the man-advantage since March 2.

The aggressive battle saw a combined 14 penalties, with seven committed in the second period alone. Wisconsin was able to capitalize on the man-advantage with one power-play goal, while also overcoming the disadvantage only conceding one goal on the penalty-kill, coming on a five-on-three power-play for the Eagles.

The Wisconsin seniors led the way with five combined points between Knight, Prévost and Brooke Ammerman. Sophomore Brittany Ammerman added two goals of her own while Brianna Decker and Madison Packer assisted on two goals apiece.

UW goaltender Alex Rigsby earned her 33rd win of the season, stopping 22 shots on goal. Eagles' netminder Corinne Boyles finished the game with 32 saves, giving up all six Badger goals.

After the early goal by the Eagles, Brittany Ammerman evened-up the score six minutes later when Packer corralled a loose puck in the Badgers' defensive zone. Packer made a headman pass to Ammerman, who entered the zone and sniped the puck past Boyles for the 1-1 tie.

Prévost gave Wisconsin the lead on a shorthanded goal at the 13:47 mark after snagging the puck away with :30 seconds left in the Badgers' penalty-kill. Prévost used her speed to get past Boyles to put Wisconsin up 2-1.

Knight pushed the Badger lead in the second period scoring on a two-on-one breakaway from the neutral zone with assists from Packer and Alev Kelter two minutes into the period.

The Ammerman sisters each tallied goals of their own to secure Wisconsin's advantage with a 5-1 score, with Brittany scoring her second goal of the day with less than three minutes in the second period, and Brooke putting one past Boyle at the 7:46 mark in the third period.

The Eagles scored one more on a five-on-three power-play midway through the third period, but it wasn't enough for the late rally.

Knight capped-off the evening by netting her second goal of the game at the 16:23 mark on a Badger power-play for the 6-2 final score.

Wisconsin will play Minnesota on Sunday for the NCAA Div. 1 Women's Ice Hockey National Championship.

## **Wisconsin Returns to Frozen Four with 3-1 Win Over Mercyhurst** **Junior Forward Brianna Decker and Senior Forward Carlyne Prévost Each Post Goal and Assist for Badgers**

MADISON, Wis. – Wisconsin advances to the Frozen Four for the second-consecutive year after a shorthanded goal from senior Hilary Knight broke a third period tie with Mercyhurst. The No. 1 Badgers defeated the No. 8 Lakers, 3-1, in the NCAA quarterfinal match at the Kohl Center on Saturday night in front of 2,946 fans.

Returning to AMSOIL Arena in Duluth, Minn., for the NCAA Women's Frozen Four next weekend, the Badgers will play against No. 4-seed Boston College in the semifinals on Friday, March, 16, at 5 pm CT.

Mercyhurst's 28.3% on the power play coming into Saturday night's game was the highest in the nation. However, Wisconsin came in with

the nation's best penalty-kill unit and it was the Badgers that gained the upper hand.

With the game tied, 1-1, heading into the third period, Carlyne Prévost and Hilary Knight entered the Mercyhurst zone on a two-on-one during a Lakers power-play. Prévost faked a shot and dished the puck over to Knight who scored the first shorthanded goal against Mercyhurst all season. The goal also stood as the game-winner, giving Knight nine GW's on the season, which also leads the nation.

"Well originally I was going to do a slap shot from far away, but then I saw Hilary (Knight) busting down the far side," Prévost said of the goal. "She was calling for the puck and I knew she has a better chance of scoring when she is around the net than I am, so I figured I would move the puck over to her. She scored a nice goal."

Alex Rigsby earned her 34th win of the season giving up only one goal to the Lakers. Rigsby's 28 saves in the game pushed her season total to 1,001. Mercyhurst's Hillary Pattenden fell to 20-8-3 in the Lakers' final game of the season. Pattenden ended the night with 38 saves, giving up two Badger goals.

Both teams came out of the gates with high intensity with neither team able to hold control of the puck. Despite the back-and-forth play, the Badgers dominated on defense not allowing the Lakers to record a single shot on goal in the first half of the opening period.

"It was tough not seeing some shots for a while," Rigsby said. "I think the hardest ones were in the first period when I don't think I saw a shot for the first fifteen minutes because our team had so much energy to keep it in their zone. Its always tougher in that situation, but I mean you just have to stay focused during the entire game."

Wisconsin capitalized on Mercyhurst turnovers early, as Brianna Decker snagged the puck away in her own zone and fired the puck to Prévost sitting on the opposite side of the net. Prévost beat Pattenden and put the puck in on the backdoor side to net the opening goal of the game.

The second period saw an increase in aggressiveness from the two teams as play continued at a back-and-forth pace. Mercyhurst was able to work the puck offensively more in the period, ending the period with an even 10 shots a side.

Wisconsin looked in control after breaking up a late Lakers' power-play, but with :40 seconds remaining in the period, Mercyhurst's Kelley Steadman pushed ahead of the pack following a faceoff and fired a shot past Rigsby to even the score at one apiece.

"We had to bring the energy as we did the first period," Knight said of going into the third period. "Unfortunately we had a tough bounce in the last minute of the second period. But I don't think there was doubt in anyone's minds and that we were going to come out in the next period and compete. That was our biggest component to our third-period play. The energy was high; we were ready to go out. People were cheering and yelling, it was a good feeling."

Knight's shorthanded goal at the 11:18 mark was her 29th career game-winning goal, the most in program history.

Wisconsin held the momentum after Knight's goal, but Mercyhurst continued to fight. The Lakers pulled Pattenden with three minutes left in the game opting for an extra attacker. However, the Badgers were the first to find the back of the net as Decker put the puck in the empty goal for the 3-1 win.

"In the first five or six minutes, it was like a game of chess," head coach Mark Johnson commented about the game. "Nobody wanted to make any big mistakes. I don't think there was a shot on net for the first four or five minutes, obviously the kids are nervous. There was a nice size crowd and magnitude and the pressure of the game. I think we did a lot of good things. I think as coaches we look for perfection, so to answer your question I'm not sure if we played an entire 60-minute game. But we did what we needed to do to win the game, so that's what you're looking for right now."

The Badgers and Boston College collide for the second year in a row at the Frozen Four, as Wisconsin downed the Eagles 3-2 last year in Erie, Pa., en route to winning the 2011 National Championship.

## Minnesota Advances to Frozen Four with 5-1 Win Against North Dakota

### Senior Forward Sarah Erickson Registers Goal, Two Assists

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. – The Minnesota Golden Gopher women's hockey team earned a 5-1 victory over North Dakota to advance to the NCAA Frozen Four. Minnesota had goals from five different players in the game. Sarah Erickson had three points in the game with a goal and two assists, while Emily West, Sarah Davis, Amanda Kessel and Jen Schoullis each had two points.

The Gophers took an early lead in the game, getting a goal from Emily West just a minute and 28 seconds into the game. Sarah Davis had an assist on the goal that put Minnesota ahead 1-0. North Dakota changed goalies shortly after Minnesota's goal, putting Jorid Dagfinrud in the game in place of Stephanie Ney. Minnesota had two power-play chances in the opening period, while North Dakota had one, but neither team scored with the advantage. The Gophers compiled eight shots on goal in the first period, with six for North Dakota.

Minnesota went ahead 2-0 when Sarah Davis scored early in the second period, assisted by Sarah Erickson and Emily West. Erickson took a shot on goal, which Davis redirected for the score. The Gophers extended their lead to three goals when Amanda Kessel scored, shorthanded and unassisted, 10:06 into the period. With Rachel Ramsey in the penalty box, Kessel stole the puck in the neutral zone and took it in for the goal. The shorthanded goal was the second for Kessel this season, and fifth for the Gophers this season. Six and a half minutes later, Sarah Erickson got a tap in with assists from Kessel and Schoullis to bring Minnesota's lead to four goals.

In the second period, the Gophers tallied 13 shots on goal to UND's six. Each team was called for three penalties with two for each team resulting in power plays.

In the third period, Minnesota got a goal from Schoullis 3:40 in, assisted by Erickson and West. Minnesota took a pair of penalties in the the next several minutes of play, and North Dakota pulled its goalie for a six-on-three advantage in skaters. UND finally got on the scoreboard, scoring six minutes into the final period. Michelle Karvinen had the goal, assisted by Josephine Jakobsen and Monique Lamoureux-Kolls. The goal ended goalie Noora Rätty's shutout streak at 246:53. Rätty had not allowed a goal since the Feb. 24 WCHA First Round game against St. Cloud State.

North Dakota went over seven and a half minutes in the third period with an empty net, but the Gophers couldn't manage an empty net goal. Neither team scored in the remainder of the game, ending with a score of 5-1. UND outshot the Gophers 17-7 in the final period.

With the win, the Gophers have advanced to the NCAA Frozen Four, which will be held at AMSOIL Arena in Duluth, Minn., March 16-18.

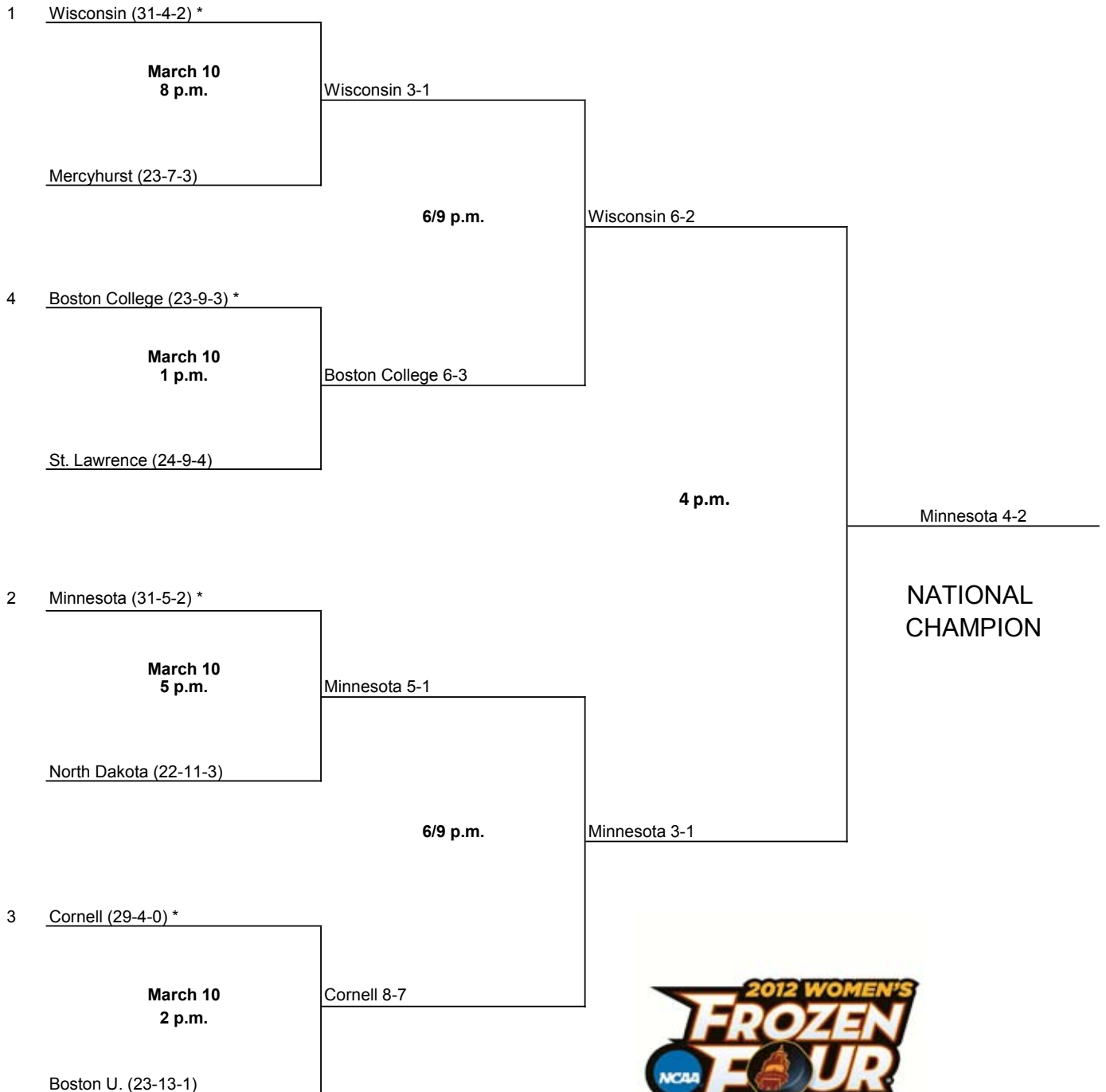

## Wisconsin's Brianna Decker, North Dakota's Jocelyne Lamoureux Among Three Finalists for 2012 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award

USA Hockey has announced that Wisconsin's Brianna Decker and North Dakota's Jocelyne Lamoureux are two of three finalists for the 2012 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, given annually to the top Division 1 women's hockey player and presented by the Easton Foundation. The 2012 award winner will be announced Saturday, March 17 in Duluth in conjunction with the Frozen Four.

The two WCHA forwards join goaltender Florence Schelling from Northeastern University as this year's three finalists.

Decker was most recently named the 2011-12 WCHA Player of the Year and to the All-WCHA First Team. She currently leads the nation with 36 goals and is second in the nation with 78 points, averaging 2.11 points per game. Earlier this year, Decker set the UW program's record for longest scoring streak at 32 consecutive games, recording at least one point in every game between Feb. 11, 2011 and Jan. 6, 2012. She has also recorded 24 multiple-point games, 12 multiple-assist games and nine multi-goal games this season. Decker sits fourth all-time at Wisconsin with 185 career points. Wisconsin's previous finalists include Sara Bauer (2006, 2007), Meghan Duggan (2011) and Jessie Vetter (2009). All three won the Patty Kazmaier, with Bauer winning in 2006.

Lamoureux is the first-ever top-three finalist from North Dakota. As team captain, Lamoureux leads the nation in points (82), points per game (2.34) and assists (48), all of which broke the single-season school records. Her efforts helped lead North Dakota to its first NCAA tournament berth in program history. In WCHA play, Lamoureux paced the league in points (64), goals (27) and assists (37). Along with winning the league's regular-season scoring trophy, Lamoureux was named to the All-WCHA First Team and was the WCHA's Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year award recipient. This season, Lamoureux recorded 24 multi-point games, tallied three five-point games and collected her 200th career point in her 105th game.

## Goaltender Noora Rätty Helps Minnesota Win First WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF Title Since 2005

DULUTH, Minn. – Noora Rätty, Minnesota's junior goaltender who says she believes that the goalie should never allow a goal, continued her amazing season Saturday (March 3) night by stopping all 28 Minnesota Duluth shots and anchoring the Golden Gophers' 2-0 victory in the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF championship game at AMSOIL Arena.

Rätty, who shut out North Dakota 6-0 in Friday's (March 2) semifinals, recorded her third straight shutout, and 26th for her three-year career by blanking the Bulldogs. It was Minnesota's first league playoff title since 2005, and boosts the Golden Gophers to 31-5-2, while UMD drops to 21-13-1.

Minnesota outshot UMD 35-28 for the game, and had its hands full trying to get anything past Jennifer Harss in the UMD goal. The Gophers finally scored when Emily West drew a penalty, then scored on the power-play late in the second period. West, in fact, was involved in virtually everything that the Gopher offense could muster, including drawing a penalty shot, which she missed.

Rätty took over in the third, holding the slim 1-0 lead until Megan Bozek scored into an empty net with just six seconds remaining. West was even involved defensively at the finish, twice making key blocks of UMD blasts to help preserve the shutout.

"We're ecstatic to be champions of the WCHA tournament," said Minnesota coach Brad Frost. "It was a great hockey game; both teams laid it on the line. We played well tonight, and they played very well. After the game, Haley Irwin shook my hand and said, 'Brad, it's been a lot of fun playing against your team for four years. I thought that was pretty special, and she's a special player."

"Our team played so hard, and this was good for us; we need to be in games like this, where we have to play through it. We've scored a lot of goals, but the strength of our team is our defense, which starts with Noora. And our seniors. We've got seven fantastic seniors, and each brings something special to the table."

Minnesota Duluth came out with the same fire displayed in the 3-1 upset of No. 1-ranked Wisconsin in the semifinals.

"I'm extremely proud of our team," said UMD head coach Shannon Miller. "We had to empty our tank to beat the No. 1 team in the country yesterday, and today I wasn't sure if we had anything left in the tank. But we played great again. Minnesota is the fastest team in the country that we've seen, without a doubt. But it was such a close game that one team got a bounce, and one didn't."

Rätty was named all-tournament goaltender and most valuable player, and was joined on the all-tournament team by teammates West, Sarah Davis, and defenseman Anne Schleper, plus UMD center Haley Irwin and Bulldogs' defenseman Bridgette Lacquette.

"One of our seniors told a freshman that when you win a championship like this, you think it's supposed to happen. But it doesn't," said Frost. "It's been seven long years since the Gophers won the league playoffs, so I told the players to enjoy the moment."

MADISON, Wis. – The University of Wisconsin and the University of Minnesota were atop the league standings and national polls most of the regular season and the teams' success is reflected in the 2011-12 post-season women's honors announced by the Western Collegiate Hockey Association today (March 1) at a league awards ceremony held in Duluth, Minn., in conjunction with the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF tournament championship. All three of those players – Knight, Lamoureux and Spooner – were also named as finalists for this season's Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award. Knight was a WCHA Offensive Player of the Week on Dec. 14 and Feb. 15, Lamoureux earned the honor on both Nov. 9 and Jan. 25, and Spooner won the weekly award on both Nov. 30 and Jan. 11.

The All-WCHA First Team for 2011-12 also includes Minnesota defenseman Anne Schleper (28 gp, 4-19=23), a senior from St. Cloud, Minn., and teammate Megan Bozek (28 gp, 10-23=33), a junior defenseman from Buffalo Grove, Ill. The All-WCHA First Team goaltender is Bemidji State University senior Zuzana Tomcikova, a senior from Bratislava, Slovakia who had a 2.43 goals-against average in league play and a .929 conference saves percentage. Tomcikova shared WCHA Player of the Year honors as a sophomore. Schleper was a WCHA Defensive Player of the Week on Feb. 15, Bozek was a Defensive Player of the Week on Dec. 7, and Tomcikova earned the weekly honor on both Oct. 5 and Feb. 15.

Decker, Knight and Schleper are all repeat selections on the all-league squad and it is the third straight season Schleper has been honored.

Wisconsin's Stefanie McKeough, a junior defender from Carlsbad Springs, Ont., was honored as the WCHA Defensive Player of the Year in a vote of the league's head coaches. She scored four goals, had 14 assists and 18 points in 19 league contests for the regular season champion Badgers.

The WCHA Coach of the Year Award for 2011-12 went to Wisconsin's

Mark Johnson, who led the Badgers to a 23-3-2-1 conference record and to the regular season title. It is the fifth time Johnson has either won or shared the award. Under Johnson's tutelage, Wisconsin has won four NCAA titles, four WCHA playoff titles and three WCHA regular season crowns. Johnson and the Badgers were the first team ever to land in the NCAA championship game in four consecutive seasons and win the title three times (2006, 2007, 2009). The former 'Miracle on Ice' hero and gold medalist in the 1980 Winter Olympics is also three-time national Division 1 coach of the year. In his eight years at Wisconsin, Johnson has an .820 winning percentage. He took a sabbatical to coach the United States team to a silver medal at the Winter Olympics in Vancouver 2010.

North Dakota's Jocelyne Lamoureux was honored as the WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year in addition to earning the league's scoring title and All-WCHA First Team accolades. She maintains an outstanding grade-point average of 3.877 (4.0 scale), majoring in Physical Education, Exercise Science and Wellness, and has been on the Athletic Director's Honor Roll, the Dean's List and the President's Honor Roll at UND. She has been a WCHA Scholar-Athlete in both 2010-11 and 2011-12 as well as a member of the All-WCHA Academic Team. Lamoureux is actively involved with service activities on campus and in the Grand Forks community, including reading to elementary students and Special Olympic events.

Her twin sister Monique Lamoureux-Kolls (Grand Forks, N.D.), a defenseman who produced 53 points (17g, 36a) in 28 league games, leads the All-WCHA Second Team which includes McKeough, Wisconsin goaltender Alex Rigsby, a sophomore from Delafield, Wis., who was the league's goaltending champion with a 1.47 goals-against average and went 23-3-2 in league play, and Minnesota forwards Jen Schoullis (27 gp, 18-22=40), a senior from Erie, Pa., and Amanda Kessel (28 gp, 17-34=51), a sophomore from Madison, Wis. Kessel's brother, Phil, is a former Minnesota athlete who currently is a National Hockey League all-star with the Toronto Maple Leafs. Both Lamoureux-Kolls and Kessel also earned the distinction of being among the top 10 finalists for this season's Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award. Lamoureux-Kolls was the WCHA Offensive Player of the Week on Oct. 25 as well as the Defensive Player of the Week on Feb. 8, Rigsby earned three Defensive Player of the Week awards on Oct. 19, Oct. 25 and Feb. 1 while Kessel was the league's Offensive Player of the Week on Oct. 12, Nov. 23 and Feb. 8.

North Dakota forward Michelle Karvinen of Rodovre, Denmark was named the WCHA Rookie of the Year. She scored 21 goals and added 31 assists and 52 points and was named to the All-WCHA Rookie Team as well as to the All-WCHA Third Team. Karvinen was also honored as the WCHA Rookie of the Week on four occasions during the regular season – Oct. 19, Oct. 25, Nov. 9 and Feb. 8.

The All-WCHA Third team also features Minnesota Duluth senior forward Haley Irwin (26 gp, 11-32=43) of Thunder Bay, Ont., Wisconsin senior forward Brooke Ammerman (28 gp, 20-32=52) of River Vale, N.J., Minnesota Duluth sophomore defenseman Jessica Wong (28 gp, 7-15=22) of Baddeck, Nova Scotia, Bemidji State senior defender Montana Vichorek (27 gp, 5-21=26) of Moose Lake, Minn., and Minnesota junior goaltender Noora Rätty (20-5-2, 1.57, .933). Irwin was a two-time WCHA Offensive Player of the Week (Dec. 7 and Feb. 22), Ammerman earned the honor once (Feb. 22), Vichorek was the WCHA Defensive Player of the Week on Feb. 22, and Rätty earned that distinction on both Nov. 9 and Jan. 11.

McParland was the WCHA Rookie of the Week on both Dec. 7 and Jan. 17, Jakobsen was a two-time recipient of the weekly honor on Feb. 1 and Feb. 22, Ramsey earned the rookie of the week award on Feb. 15 and Friend was so honored on Dec. 14 in addition to being the league's Defensive Player of the Week on Jan. 17.

Conference member-team head coaches, assistant coaches and team captains vote for the WCHA individual award winners. The WCHA Defensive Player of the Year Award is chosen by the head coaches, while the WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year is selected by the institutional faculty representatives.

## WCHA Announces Record Number of 110 Scholar-Athletes for 2011-12 Seventh Annual Class Includes 54 Repeat Honorees; MSU's Lee, UMD's Reiter are Four-Time Recipients

MADISON, Wis. – The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, through Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod, Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, Michigan Technological University Athletic Director Suzanne Sanregret (Chair, men's league) and University of Minnesota Faculty Representative Perry Leo (Chair, women's league) announced on Feb. 15 that a record total of 110 men's and women's student-athletes make up the seventh annual group of WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award recipients for 2011-12. The previous record for honorees in one season was 90 in 2010-11.

"It is with a great deal of pride that we announce our seventh annual group of WCHA Scholar-Athletes," said McLeod, Martin, Sanregret and Leo (Chair, women's league) in a joint statement.

"This announcement has become one of the real highlights for the Western Collegiate Hockey Association each season as it focuses attention on a truly exceptional group of student-athletes. These outstanding young men and women have gone above and beyond to achieve great success both on and off the ice and their accomplishments are a testimony to the amount of dedication and hard work they put in throughout the school year. Together, they represent their teams and their league in a most impressive way and we could not be more proud of each and every one of them. On behalf of the entire WCHA, We wish them all the success in the world."

The WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award was developed through Association member team Faculty Representatives and approved by the conference membership beginning with the 2005-06 season. To earn recognition as a WCHA Scholar-Athlete, conference-member student-athletes must have completed at least one year of residency at their present institution prior to the current academic year and must also have a grade-point average of at least 3.50 on a 4.0 scale for each of the previous two semesters or three quarters, or may qualify if his or her overall GPA is at least 3.50 for all terms at his or her present institution.

Over the first seven years of the award, there have now been 525 honorees representing all 12 men's-member and all eight women's-member institutions. The previous record for honorees in one season was 90 in 2010-11.

Fifty-four (54) of this season's 110 men's and women's WCHA Scholar-Athletes are repeat honorees, including two four-time recipients and 15 three-time winners.

Earning this distinguished honor for the fourth time are Minnesota Duluth's Kenny Reiter (2008-09, 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12) and Minnesota State's Austin Lee (2008-09, 2009-10, 2010-11, 2011-12), who also become only the fourth and fifth conference student-athletes to do so. The others were North Dakota's Chay Genoway (2007-08, 2008-09, 2009-10, 2010-11), Colorado College's Scott McCulloch (2005-06, 2006-07, 2007-08, 2008-09) and Minnesota State's Jenna Hewitt (2006-07, 2007-08, 2008-09, 2009-10).

Fifteen of this season's honorees have now earned the WCHA Scholar-Athlete award for the third time in their careers. Former Wisconsin defenseman Bobbi Jo Slusar also was on Team Canada, which fell 4-3 in a shootout to the United States in the championship game.

**Mark Johnson, Jeff Sauer Among Four Lester Patrick Trophy Winners Recognized by NHL Award Ceremony Set for Wednesday, Oct. 26 in Saint Paul**

NEWYORK, N.Y. – Distinguished player and coach Mark Johnson, Hockey Hall of Famer Bob Pulford, long-time USA Hockey executive Tony Rossi and college coaching legend Jeff Sauer have been named recipients of the 2011 Lester Patrick Trophy for outstanding service to hockey in the United States. The recipients will be honored at an evening reception on Oct. 26 at the RiverCentre in St. Paul, Minn.

Johnson, a Minneapolis, Minn. native, is not only an accomplished athlete, but has distinguished himself as an outstanding coach as well. He played 11 years in the NHL (1979-90), where he amassed 508 points in 669 games with the Pittsburgh Penguins, Minnesota North Stars, Hartford Whalers, St. Louis Blues and New Jersey Devils.

Johnson may be best known as the leading scorer for Team USA at the 1980 Olympic Winter Games, where he scored twice in Team USA's iconic victory against the Soviet Union en route to the gold medal. All total, Johnson represented the United States as a player in 13 international tournaments. He also enjoyed a three-year collegiate playing career at the University of Wisconsin where he was a two-time All-American and was named the Western Collegiate Hockey Association Freshman of the Year in 1977.

Johnson is currently the head coach of the women's hockey team at his alma mater, having led Wisconsin to four NCAA championships (2006, 2007, 2009 and 2011). He also served as the head coach of the 2010 silver-medal winning U.S. Olympic women's ice hockey team and

twice was as an assistant coach for the U.S. men's national team at the International Ice Hockey Federation Men's World Championship (2000, 2002). Johnson, the son of legendary college and NHL coach "Badger" Bob Johnson, was inducted into the United States Hockey Hall of Fame in 2004.

Sauer, a Fort Atkinson, Wis., native, is one of the most successful and distinguished coaches in the history of college hockey. Following his playing career at Colorado College, where he played for Bob Johnson, Sauer spent more than 30 seasons as an NCAA Division 1 head coach – both at Colorado College from 1971-80 and then at the University of Wisconsin from 1983-2002. Sauer won national championships as coach of the Badgers in both 1983 and 1990 and ranks eighth on the all-time wins list of college hockey coaches with more than 650 victories (655-532-57) and a winning percentage of .549.

Sauer also is closely involved with preparing and coaching the USA Deaf Olympic Team, having participated in seven Deaflympics and earning a gold medal in 2007 at the IIHF Winter Deaf Olympics. In April 2009, he also coached Team USA to a bronze medal in the first ever World Deaf Hockey Championships. Sauer earned the John "Snooks" Kelley Founders Award from the American Hockey Coaches Association in 2003, presented to individuals in the coaching profession who have contributed to the overall growth and development of the sport of ice hockey in the United States. He is a member of USA Hockey's International Council and the Disabled Hockey Committee and also currently works for the WCHA as assistant to the commissioner. Sauer was recently named head coach of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team.

The Lester Patrick award, one of the most prestigious in hockey, was presented to the NHL by the New York Rangers in 1966. It honors the memory of Lester Patrick, who spent 50 years in hockey as a player, coach and general manager and was a pioneer in the sport's development.

## **League Head Coaches Select Defending National Champion Wisconsin to Win WCHA Title in 2011-12**

**Minnesota Chosen Second, Minnesota Duluth Third in Annual Preseason WCHA Head Coaches Poll; Wisconsin's Knight Picked as Pre-season WCHA Player of the Year; North Dakota's Michelle Karvinen, Minnesota's Meghan Lorence, Minnesota Duluth's Brigitte Lacquette Tabled as Rookies of the Year**

MADISON, Wis. – There will be no surprises from the coaches who have seen its league win the last 12 women's national championships. The University of Wisconsin swept to the national championship in a memorable season last year (2010-11) and, according to a preseason poll of league coaches, the Badgers are the pick to win the Western Collegiate Hockey Association women's title again in 2011-12.

The Badgers, who won the WCHA regular season crown and the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF a year ago before beating Boston University 4-1 to win the national title, return 18 players this season. Wisconsin collected six first place votes and 47 points in the poll of the league's eight head coaches.

Minnesota finished second with 43 votes, including two first place votes. Minnesota Duluth, with 37 points, was selected to finish third. Like Wisconsin, UMD qualified for the NCAA tournament last season.

North Dakota was picked to finish fourth, followed by Ohio State in fifth place, Bemidji State in sixth, Minnesota State in seventh and St. Cloud

State in eighth.

Wisconsin senior forward Hilary Knight, a member of the women's U.S. Olympic Hockey Team in 2010, received six votes and is the head coaches' pick to be preseason WCHA Player of the Year. An AHCA Division 1 First Team All-American as a sophomore and junior, Knight was also a Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award Top 10 finalist in 2010-11 and has scored 112 goals in her first three seasons. Brianna Decker, Knight's teammate on Wisconsin, also received two votes.

Three players – North Dakota forward Michelle Karvinen, Minnesota forward Meghan Lorence and Minnesota Duluth defenseman Brigette Lacquette – are the head coaches' choice as pre-season WCHA Rookie of the Year. Minnesota's Rachel Ramsey and Minnesota Duluth's Jenna McParland also had one vote each.

## Bemidji State

Bemidji State achieved its winningest season in program history with a 17-17-3 mark during the 2011-12 campaign ... 2011-12 was a season of firsts for the Beavers as they earned their first-ever ranking after upending eventual National Champion University of Minnesota Oct. 29 ... BSU rose to as high as No. 7 in the polls following a win over North Dakota Nov. 26 ... The Beavers had five wins over teams ranked in the top 10 during the 2011-12 campaign ... Senior goaltender Zuzana Tomcikova became the program's first-ever All-American selection as she was named to the 2012 CCM All-America Second Team ... Tomcikova also accomplished the feat of being BSU's first All-WCHA First Team pick ... In addition to Tomcikova, defenseman Montana Vichorek also earned accolades from the WCHA as she was selected All-WCHA Third Team for the second time in her career ... A lot of BSU's success during the 2011-12 season was due to the stellar play of its power-play unit as the squad scored a school-record 36 goals on the man-advantage and was ranked in the top five nationally in that category for most of the season ... The 36 power-play goals helped ignite another school record as Bemidji State finished with 101 goals overall, the team's best total since the 1999-2000 season ... BSU's senior class of Kimberly Lieder, Alana McElhinney, Zuzana Tomcikova, Montana Vichorek, Marlee Wheelhouse and Lauren Williams went out on a unique note as they became the winningest four-year class in program history during the 2011-12 season ... Several members of that class will be etched in the record books for years to come ... Tomcikova finished her collegiate career holding every career record for BSU goaltenders as she surpassed the marks for wins, saves, save percentage, minutes played, games played, goals-against average and shutouts ... Vichorek also finished in the top 10 in several categories as she is ranked for points, power-play goals, assists, points by a defenseman, goals by a defenseman, games played and consecutive games played ... Vichorek set the school mark for assists by a defenseman surpassing Lisa Peters ... Marlee Wheelhouse became the school record holder for consecutive games played and games played and is also ranked in the top 10 for points by a defenseman, goals by a defenseman and assists by a defenseman ... McElhinney and Lieder also finished their careers ranked in BSU's record books in a few categories ... In addition to school records, Tomcikova finished her career ranked second all-time in saves in the WCHA and third all-time in the same category in the NCAA ... Tomcikova was also a Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award nominee for her strong senior season ... Bemidji State played a thrilling game in front of a NCAA record 12,402 fans at the Kohl Center against Wisconsin Jan. 28.

## Minnesota

Minnesota finished the 2011-12 season with an NCAA Championship and No. 1 ranking in the USCHO.com and USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine national polls ... The national title was the fourth in the history of the Gopher women's hockey program, and third in the NCAA era ... The Golden Gopher defeated Wisconsin in the NCAA title game at AMSOIL Arena in Duluth ... Minnesota got on the scoreboard first, as Amanda Kessel scored 9:45 into the game ... Less than two minutes later, the Gophers made it 2-0 with a goal by Sarah Erickson, who went top side against Badger goalie Alex Rigsby ... The Gophers were on the penalty-kill for nearly 5:00 through the last half of the period, and Wisconsin took advantage ... Stephanie McKeough found the net on a power-play, bringing the score to 2-1 ... Less than two minutes later, Brooke Ammerman scored at even-strength to tie up the score, with a delayed penalty ... Kessel went to the box, and Kelly Terry joined her one minute later, giving Wisconsin a five-on-three advantage for one minute ... The Gophers were able to kill both penalties and only gave up two shots on goal while Wisconsin was on the power-play ... With one and a half minutes remaining in the

first period, Emily West took a shot on goal, and was tripped ... A penalty shot was awarded and West scored to bring the score to 3-2 in favor of the Gophers ... The penalty shot score was the first by a Minnesota player since January 2008 when Bobbi Ross scored ... It was the first ever penalty shot attempted in an NCAA championship game ... The five goals in the opening period were the most combined goals scored in a single period in an NCAA championship game ... After five goals in the first period, both teams went scoreless in the second period ... The Badgers outshot the Gophers 14-7 in the period, but Gopher goalie Noora Rätty came up big, time after time ... The Gophers got an insurance goal early in the third period when Sarah Erickson scored her second goal of the game, four minutes in ... Wisconsin outshot the Gophers 20-9 in the final period, but Minnesota's defense held strong ... Wisconsin got a power-play opportunity with just under 3:00 remaining in the game ... The Badgers pulled goaltender Alex Rigsby from the net for a full two minutes with a six-on-four advantage ... Minnesota's net was peppered with shots during the penalty, but the Gophers were able to successfully kill the penalty ... Rigsby did not return to the Badger net when Minnesota returned to full-strength, and Jen Schoullis had an open net shot, but didn't score ... The Golden Gophers advanced to the NCAA Frozen Four championship game with a 3-1 victory over Cornell in the tournament semifinal on Friday, March 16 ... Amanda Kessel led the Gophers with three points on a goal and two assists in the game ... Megan Bozek had the game-winning goal, which came in the first period ... Minnesota was dominant in the first period, logging 21 shots on goal and two goals while Cornell managed just five shots on goal ... The second period had a much different feel as the Big Red came back from intermission showing more offensive pressure ... Cornell got on the board with a goal 11:40 into the period, getting a power-play goal from Alyssa Gagliardi ... After being severely outshot in the first period, Cornell came back to lead in shots 13-9 in the second period ... The Gophers came back to life in the third period, allowing just three shots on goal and staying out of the penalty box ... Cornell took two penalties in the latter half of the period, giving the Gophers nearly four consecutive minutes on the power-play ... Minnesota did not score with the advantage, but was able to wear down Cornell's defense ... Cornell pulled their goaltender in favor of an extra skater with just under 1:00 remaining in the game, and Emily West was able to score an empty-net goal on a breakaway with just :34 seconds remaining ... Four Minnesota players were named to the NCAA Women's Frozen Four All-Tournament Team in Sarah Erickson, Amanda Kessel, Megan Bozek and Noora Rätty ... Rätty was also named the Most Outstanding Player of the Frozen Four ... Minnesota made its 10th appearance in the 12-year history of the NCAA Championship, and qualified for the NCAA postseason tournament for a fifth-straight season ... The Gophers have a 11-8-1 overall record in the NCAA Tournament, and has advanced to the Frozen Four eight times ... Minnesota has played in the NCAA championship game four times (2004, 2005, 2006 and 2012) ... Minnesota allowed just 54 goals on the season, the lowest in the nation ... Minnesota led the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 1.32 goals per game during the season ... Minnesota tied for the most goals scored in the 2011-12 season, collecting 181 goals to tie Wisconsin for the national lead ... Minnesota finished the season ranked No. 1 in scoring margin, winning by an average of 3.10 goals per game ... For the second consecutive season, Amanda Kessel was the Gophers' top scorer ... She tallied 80 points in her sophomore campaign, giving her 130 career points after two seasons ... She is the second-highest scoring sophomore in program history, as only Natalie Darwitz had more career points after two seasons of play ... Darwitz had 146 career points at the end of her sophomore season ... Kessel's 80-point season ranks third in the Minnesota record books for points in a season, behind Natalie Darwitz (114 points in 2004-05) and Krissy Wendell (104 points in 2004-05) ... Junior goaltender Noora Rätty led the nation in goals-against average at 1.35, and led the nation with 10 shutouts during the season season ...

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Three of her 10 shutouts came in post-season play, and she allowed just five goals in seven post-season games ... Rätty reached 34 wins in 2011-12, the school record for wins in a season ... Rätty also holds second place in the Minnesota record book with 25 wins in 2010-11 ... Jody Horak is in third place in the record book with 24 wins in the 2004-05 season ... Rätty set the school record for career shutouts when she got her 22nd at St. Cloud State on Feb. 4 ... She had since added four shutouts, and currently has 26 in her career ... Senior Emily West finished her career among the top 10 scorers in Minnesota history ... West ranks 10th in career points with 158 ... Seniors Jen Schoullis and Sarah Erickson were just shy of breaking into the top-10 as Schoullis tallied 156 career points, and Erickson had 155 career points ... Sarah Erickson and Emily West each rank among the all-time top 10 goal scorers for Minnesota ... West ranks seventh all time with 82 career goals, while Erickson ranks 10th with 69 career goals ... Minnesota had three defensemen who ranked in the top 25 nationally in scoring by defensemen ... Junior Megan Bozek finished second nationally in points by a defensemen with 42 on the season ... In first place was North Dakota's Monique Lamoureux-Kolls, who also played at forward during the season ... Bozek ranked third in points per game by a defenseman (1.08 ppg) and was one of only three defensemen in the nation to average more than one point per game ... Senior Anne Schleper ranked eighth nationally in scoring by defensemen with 28 points, ranking 16th in points per game, averaging 0.68 ppg ... Rookie Rachel Ramsey finished 14th in points with 25 points, and 22nd in points per game with 0.61 ... Among freshmen defensemen, Ramsey ranked second in the country in points scored ... Senior defenseman Anne Schleper has 114 career points, and moved ahead of Courtney Kennedy for second place on Minnesota's all-time list for points by a defenseman ... Kennedy (1998-2001) had 112 career points ... The school record for points by a defenseman is 134 by Winny Brodt (1998-2003) ... Schleper played in 158 career games, and owns the school record for career games played ... Junior defenseman Megan Bozek has 89 career points and ranks fourth on the Minnesota all-time scoring list for defensemen ... Bozek also has 27 career goals and ranks fourth in Gopher history in goals by a defenseman ... The Gophers had a weekend attendance of 5,220 against Wisconsin Jan. 6-7, with 2,554 fans at Ridder for Friday's game and 2,666 fans in attendance on Saturday ... Both figures rank among the top 10 all-time attendance numbers for Ridder Arena ... Against North Dakota on Feb. 18, Minnesota had its third game with more than 2,000 in attendance with a crowd of 2,157 ... The Gophers had an average home attendance of 1,308 in 2011-12, up 50.6% from the attendance average of 838 in 2010-11 ... This season, the Gophers had eight home games with crowds of 1,500 and over ... Minnesota did not draw any crowds of 1,500-plus last season ... Five Gophers scored hat tricks this season: sophomores Amanda Kessel, Sarah Davis and Kelly Terry, and seniors Jen Schoullis and Emily West ... Davis had three goals against UND in the WCHA semifinals to mark her first career hat trick ... West had three goals in the Jan. 27 game at Minnesota State, marking the first hat trick of her career ... West scored the Gophers' final three goals of the game to give her team a 6-3 victory ... Terry got her first career hat trick at Harvard, scoring three goals in the first period ... Schoullis had her first hat trick at Bemidji State on Oct. 28 ... Kessel tallied four hat tricks in 2011-12 ... She recorded two hat tricks against New Hampshire Nov. 18-19, marking the first time since 2004 that a Gopher player had two hat tricks in a weekend.

## Minnesota Duluth

UMD finished the 2011-12 season ranked No. 10 by USCHO.com and No. 9 by USA Today/USA Hockey, jumping back into the top-10 after falling out for the first time in program history on Feb. 13 ... The Bulldogs finished the season with an overall record of 21-14-1, their 13th season with 20 or more wins ... UMD's 14 losses were a program-high, however, topping the previous high of 12 in the 2003-04 season ... Four players turned in 30 or more points over the season, including senior center Haley Irwin, who put up 54 points (16g, 38a) in just 34 games played ... Irwin became the sixth member of UMD's 200-point club on Feb. 18 with a power-play tally and ends her career at UMD as the fifth-highest scorer in Bulldog history with 206 points in just 134 games ... With 127 career assists, Irwin also wraps up her time at UMD with the third most helpers in program history ... Junior winger Audrey Cournoyer had a breakout season for the Bulldogs, putting up 48 points, including 22 goals – a team-high ... With a combined 54 points in her first two seasons at UMD, Cournoyer's offensive output pushed her into another club – the 100 point club at UMD ... Cournoyer, who picked up just one penalty this season in 36 skates, has 101 points in 111 games as a Bulldog ... Rookie winger Jenna McParland ranked third in scoring for the Bulldogs with 32 points, 21 of which were tallies, with a team-best five game winning goals ... McParland's 21 goals were the most by a UMD rookie since Irwin netted 23 in her rookie season of 2007-08 ... Junior blueliner Jessica Wong dropped in 30 points from the backline, tying her for sixth-most points by a defenseman in a single season ... Wong had 38 points a from the blueline during the 2010-11 season ... Wong has now recorded 68 points (26g) as a defenseman in two seasons, which currently ranks her as the sixth highest scoring blueliner in Bulldog history ... With 26 goals, Wong has already scored more goals from the backline than any other defenseman in the program ... Both Wong and Irwin earned All-WCHA Third Team honors this past season ... Both McParland and Brigitte Lacquette, who cashed in 20 points from the backline in her own right, landed on the All-WCHA Rookie Team, a nod of what may come for a UMD squad that will graduate five players this May ... Senior forward Kacy Ambroz set a UMD record for consecutive games played, finishing her career with 142 straight appearances for the Bulldogs ... Ambroz also played in 148 games total, tying her for the fourth most games played in program history ... Senior goaltender Jennifer Harss, who owns the top-two slots for saves in a single season, made the second most saves in a year in her career in 2011-12 with 897 ... She leaves UMD with 2,386 stops – the third most by a goaltender and just a little over a hundred short of Riitta Schaublin's mark of 2,494 picked up over four seasons ... Harss, who had only three years of eligibility at UMD, also leaves with the third most wins in the program, owning a career record of 57-25-6 and 11 shutouts ... Harss was impressive between the pipes at the end of the season when the Bulldogs made a postseason push, making 32 saves against then No. 1 Wisconsin in the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF semifinal at AMSOIL Arena to help secure a 3-1 win for UMD and a berth in the final against Minnesota ... As a team, the Bulldogs, who were sluggish out of the gate to start the season, went 9-3 in their last 12 games, including winning nine of their last 11 heading into the WCHA final ... UMD was 5-10-1 against teams ranked in the top-10 ... The 2011-12 season marks only the second time in school history the Bulldogs did not land in the NCAA tournament ... The first was during the 2003-04 season when the NCAA only offered a Frozen Four with no playoff system prior to the four-team tournament ... UMD had a program-high of 13 players named to the All-WCHA Academic Team this year.

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### Minnesota State

The Mavericks scored 64 goals and gave up 133 on the 2011-12 season ... MSU averaged 27.69 shots per game and 10.25 minutes of penalties per game ... Junior Lauren Smith and junior Lauren Zrust led the Mavericks in points as they finished in 37th for points in the WCHA (19) ... In the second game of the season, MSU beat Lindenwood University 10-2 on Oct. 1, 2011, marking the largest margin of victory since a 9-1 victory against Findlay in 2003 ... The Mavericks tied the school record in the blowout over Lindenwood in team assists in a period (9) and team assists in a game (17) ... Sophomore forward Kathleen Rogan joined four others for the most goals scored in a game when she scored four lamp-lighters ... The Vancouver, B.C., native blasted 11 shots on goal against Lindenwood, landing her third on the charts for shots in a game at MSU ... Rogan wasn't the only player to reach the top charts as sophomore Lauren Barnes and junior Lauren Smith each notched four assists in the game, tying the school record for most assists in a game (4) ... Lauren Barnes had 18 points and was tied for 38th in the WCHA for points ... Barnes is ranked 30th in the WCHA for assists with 14 ... After a disappointing end to the season, the Mavericks say goodbye to six seniors including senior defensemen and captain's Jackie Otto and Ariel Mackley ... Otto now holds the record in career games played at MSU (142) and Mackley falls one game behind (141) her for second in career games played ... Backstopper Alli Altmann completed her career at MSU and ends second in career games played among goaltenders, third in career saves made (2750) and fourth in career save percentage (.891) ... Senior forward Emmi Leinonen graduates tied in sixth-place for career power-play goals (10) and fourth in career shots (372) ... Senior defenseman/forward Jenna Peterson and senior assistant captain Moria O'Connor both registered valuable minutes in more than 115 games in their careers ... A positive note for Minnesota State is it returns its top four scorers from this year and its leading scorer from 2010-11, who missed the majority of the season ... Junior Lauren Smith led the team in shots on goal (120) and co-led the team in points (19) and goals (9) ... Smith garnished 10 assists this season, moving her to seventh on career assists at Minnesota State (37) and is ninth in career shots on goal (315) ... MSU returns 80% of its goals scored next season as the majority of its youthful lineup shift into upperclassmen, which is led by Kari Lundberg and Lauren Barnes ... Lundberg had nine goals and eight assists as Barnes had 14 helpers and four goals.

### North Dakota

The University of North Dakota women's hockey team earned its first NCAA National Tournament appearance ... UND also made its second WCHA FINALFACE-OFF appearance (first last year) and its second straight season hosting its WCHA first round playoff series ... North Dakota became the first program to finish in the top-3 of WCHA standings besides (UM, UMD, UW) excluding an Olympic year ... UND had its most wins in program history (22) and highest winning percentage (.635) ... The Fighting Sioux also had its most home wins in program history (15), best winning percentage (.815), most goals scored in program history (155), best power-play percentage (23.0%) and best penalty-kill (87.4%) ... The Sioux also had the most shutouts (six) in program history and set the record for most consecutive games scoring (35); only shutout once ... UND set a new record for highest home total attendance (44,995) which was second best in the nation ... North Dakota set new individual records in season points, goals and assists and new season rookie records in points, goals and assists ... The Fighting Sioux concluded the season ranked sixth in the nation, the highest in program history ... UND had a record seven WCHA Scholar-Athletes and 15 WCHA All-Academic Team members ... UND had its first Patty Kazmaier finalists in Jocelyne Lamoureux (top three) and Monique Lamoureux-Kolls (top 10), its second

WCHA Student-Athlete of the Year in Jocelyne Lamoureux (also Casie Hanson in 2007-08), its first AHCA All-Americans in Jocelyne Lamoureux (first team) and Monique Lamoureux-Kolls (second team), its first WCHA Rookie of the Year in Michelle Karvinen, and its first WCHA Scoring Champion in Jocelyne Lamoureux ... Jocelyne Lamoureux finished the year tied for first in the national scoring race with 82 points and led the nation in points per game ... Monique Lamoureux-Kolls finished sixth in the nation in scoring with 71 points and led all defensemen in scoring ... Michelle Karvinen led the nation in scoring by a rookie with 61 points ... Josefine Jakobsen was second in the WCHA in scoring by a rookie (trailing only Karvinen) and ninth in the nation.

### Ohio State

The Ohio State women's hockey team concluded its 2011-12 season with a pair of losses at Minnesota Duluth in the opening rounds of the WCHA Playoffs, Feb. 24-25 ... The fifth-seeded Buckeyes dropped a 4-3 decision vs. the fourth-seeded Bulldogs and followed with a 3-2 overtime loss in AMSOIL Arena ... The Buckeyes concluded 2011-12 season with a 16-16-4 overall mark and a 13-14-1-1 record in WCHA play ... Ohio State finished fifth in the conference standings with 41 points ... Ohio State had five seniors this season in Brittany Carlson, Melissa Feste, Laura McIntosh, Natalie Spooner and Kelly Wild ... Spooner ended her Ohio State career on top of four Buckeye records including the season goals record broken in the final series of the season ... She finished her four years as Ohio State's only student-athlete to score 100 goals in her career and she had a program-best 16 career game-winning goals ... In WCHA play, she led all current and former Buckeyes with 75 goals scored ... Spooner finished the season with a team-best 50 points on 31 goals and 19 assists ... Her 50 points finished tied for third all-time in points scored in a season at Ohio State ... She had 12 power-play goals on the year, which is also third-best in the program ... Spooner concluded her career with 161 points for second all-time at Ohio State ... Her 56 power play points is sixth all-time in the program and she finished her four years second overall with 35 power play goals ... Spooner finished with three hat tricks on the year, including a pair of four-goal games ... She totaled one short-handed, four game-winning and two unassisted goals on the season ... For her efforts this season, Spooner was honored as a Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award Top 10 Finalist ... She earned All-America and All-WCHA First Team honors as well ... McIntosh concluded her collegiate career as the program's all-time leading points scorer and leader in career assists, finishing with 170 career points with 123 career assists ... Against WCHA opponents, she led all current and former Buckeyes with 136 career points and 98 assists ... McIntosh totaled 60 power-play points (7g, 53a) in her career to finish tied for third all-time in Ohio State history ... McIntosh totaled 39 points on the year for second best on the team ... She tallied 12 goals and 27 assists ... Wild finished her career as one of the program's top defenders, tallying 63 points to come in seventh overall in points by a defenseman ... She totaled 17 points (3g, 14a) on the season to lead all Buckeye defensemen ... Sophomore Ally Tarr had a breakout season, finishing third in scoring with 27 points on 17 goals and 10 assists ... She led the squad with six game-winners and notched a hat trick in the second game of the year ... Tarr also finished second on the squad with six power play scores ... Goalie Lisa Steffes concluded the season as the Buckeyes top goalie, totaling over 1401 minutes and having a 3.08 goals against average ... She finished with a .894 save percentage and a 12-12-1 overall record ... Her 610 saves ranks ninth at Ohio State in saves in a season.

THE RECORD: SCSU finishes the season with a 5-29-2 record, going 4-26 in the WCHA, good for seventh place. HOPE FOR FUTURE: The Huskies will return 96 of its 114 points (36g, 60a) scored during the 2011-12 season ... They will return both their leading goal scorer in sophomore forward Mollie Mott (10g, 4a) and their leader in assists, freshman forward Abby Ness (2g, 12a) ... Also returning will be junior forward, assistant captain Alex Nelson (7g, 4a), sophomore forward Julia Gilbert (2g, 7a), and junior forward and captain Jocelyn Zabrick (4g, 2a) ... In all the Huskies only lose three seniors while bringing back a wealth of talent. FAREWELL SENIORS: St. Cloud State seniors Brittany Toor (Hartland, MI), Jaclyn Daggitt (St. Paul Park, MN), and Tayler VanDenakker (Winnipeg, MB) have completed their collegiate hockey careers at SCSU ... The three seniors combined for 53 points (19g, 34a) in 296 games. TOOR SAVED BEST FOR LAST: Senior forward and assistant captain Brittany Toor had her best season as a Husky in her final year ... Toor scored a team-high and career best 16 points on seven goals and nine assists ... ### Wisconsin

After nearly duplicating last year's success in the WCHA regular season, Wisconsin (33-5-2, 23-3-2-1 WCHA) fell in the 2012 Frozen Four final to Minnesota by a score of 4-2 ... Brianna Decker was named the 15th recipient of the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award ... She is the fourth Badger to win the award, joining Sara Bauer (2006), Jessie Vetter (2009) and Meghan Duggan (2011) ... It also marks the third award in four years to go to Wisconsin ... Wisconsin played in its sixth national title game, and has an all-time record of 4-2 in Frozen Four finals ... The Badgers have played for the national championship six out of the past seven years ... Hilary Knight ended her storied career at UW as the program's points leader with 262 points ... Her 161 goals is also the most scored by a single Badger in the both men's and women's hockey at Wisconsin ... The Badgers and Gophers scored a combined five goals in the first period to open the 2012 national championship game ... Wisconsin was on the short end of the opening frame and started the second period with a 3-2 deficit ... Both team's defenses buckled-down in the second as neither team could find the back of the net ... In the third period the Badgers out-shot the Gophers 20-9 ... However, Minnesota would be the one to tally a goal, as the Gophers went on to win their third national championship with a 4-2 win over the Badgers ... After a 2-0 deficit, Stefanie McKeough scored on the power-play to start a mid-period rally for the Badgers ... Brooke Ammerman scored a tying goal less than two minutes later to bring the score to 2-2 ... However, a late period breakaway would lead to the Gophers drawing a penalty shot and Emily West scored the go-ahead goal to make it 3-2 ... Alex Rigsby made 21-of-25 stops in the game ... In the national semifinal versus Boston College, Wisconsin used five unanswered goals to defeat BC by a score of 6-2 ... The Eagles opened the scoring within the first minute of the game, but Brittany Ammerman and Carlyne Prévost responded for the Badgers, both scoring before the end of the period making it 2-1 UW ... Prévost's goal was her first shorthanded goal of the season and the Badgers' 10th ... Hilary Knight scored twice and Brittany Ammerman tallied another giving her two for the evening ... A total of 10 Badgers recorded a point in the contest and Alex Rigsby made 22 saves ... Four Frozen Four records were updated in the two games that Wisconsin participated in while at the 2012 Frozen Four in Duluth, Minn. ... In the first game against Boston College, BC's Emily Field scored the third fastest goal to open a game, scoring at the :57 second mark ... The Badgers ended up beating Boston College by a score of 6-2, which made Wisconsin the fourth team to score six goals in a single game, just one less than the record ... In the final against Minnesota, a combined five goals were scored in the first period, breaking the record for most combined goals scored in a single period in the national championship game ... Minnesota's penalty-shot goal was also the first penalty shot in a national championship game, which also became the first game-winning goal in a final to be scored off a penalty shot ... The six goals scored by the Badgers was the most scored by a Wisconsin team at a Frozen Four ... The previous mark by the Badgers was five goals in both the semifinal and final of the 2009 Frozen Four in Boston ... The win against BC also marked the Badgers' 10th all-time win at the NCAA Women's Frozen Four ... Junior forward Brianna Decker became the fourth Badger to receive the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award ... Sara Bauer was Wisconsin's first honoree in 2006, Jessie Vetter took home the award in 2009 and Meghan Duggan won last year in 2011 ... Decker finished the season tied with Jocelyne Lamoureux for the national points leader at 82 points (37g, 45a) ... Her 37 goals also led the nation, marking back-to-back years where a Wisconsin forward has led the nation in goals ... For the sixth time, Wisconsin had a multiple student-athletes among the top-10 finalists for the award, as Hilary Knight was named a top-10 finalist for the third time in her career (2009, 2011, 2012) ... Goaltender Alex Rigsby also received attention as a nominee for this year's award ... Hilary Knight's name will remain in the UW record book for a long time to come ... Knight owns eight separate career records: points (262), goals (161), game-winning goals (30), power-play goals (37), shorthanded goals (8), shots (986), plus/minus (+167) and hat tricks (9)

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... She is also the only player in program history to score five goals in a single game, doing so on Sept. 27, 2008 against Quinnipiac ... Additionally, Knight owns four single-season records: goals (47 in 2010-11), power-play goals (16 in 2008-09), shorthanded goals (4 in 2011-12), and shots (311 in 2011-12) ... A total of five Wisconsin women's hockey players earned All-WCHA honors, highlighted by Brianna Decker taking home the league's top honor as the 2012 WCHA Player of the Year ... Decker also earned All-WCHA First Team honors ... Junior defenseman Stefanie McKeough was named the Defensive Player of the Year and sophomore Alex Rigsby took home the league's Goaltending Champion award ... Both McKeough and Rigsby were also named All-WCHA Second Team ... Senior forward Hilary Knight joined Decker among the four forwards awarded All-WCHA First Team honors ... Brooke Ammerman was named All-WCHA Third Team and Head coach Mark Johnson rounded out the awards being named the WCHA Coach of the Year for the fifth time in his career ... Sophomore netminder Alex Rigsby had anything but a sophomore slump ... Playing in all 40 games this season for the Badgers, Rigsby broke the school record for most saves in a season, stopping 1044 of 1100 shots on net ... Her 1,044 saves was also the most made by a single netminder during the season ... Her .949 save percentage was second-best in the nation, just .001 less than 2012 Patty Kazmaier finalist Florence Schelling of Northeastern ... The save percentage also ranks third all-time at UW for highest single-season save percentage ... Rigsby tied the school record for most points by a goaltender in a single season, picking up three assists ... Jackie MacMillan tallied three assists in both the 2001-02 and 2002-03 seasons ... Wisconsin had the most efficient penalty-kill in the nation, successfully denying 131-of-146 (.897) chances by opponents on the man-advantage ... The Badgers also had the second-most shorthanded goals in the nation with 10 ... Hilary Knight led the team with four shorthanded goals ... Brooke Ammerman score twice on the penalty-kill, while Brianna Decker, Carlyne Prévost, Blayre Turnbull and Kelly Jaminski all scored once ... Wisconsin had the fourth-best power-play units in the nation ... The Badgers scored 40 goals on 172 chances for a 23.3% efficiency while on the man-advantage ... The group of Carlyne Prévost, Brianna Decker, Brooke Ammerman and Hilary Knight have combined for a total of 129 goals and 149 assists so far this season ... The four account for over half (.598) of the team's point production and scored more than two-thirds (.712) of the team's goals this season ... Compared to other team's top-four scorers, they are the highest scoring group in the nation with 278 points ... Brooke Ammerman became the fourth Badger in program history to reach 200 career points, scoring on the power-play against St. Cloud State on Feb. 11 ... The senior ended her career just two goals shy of becoming just the third player in program history to record both 100 career goals and assists ... With 98 goals and 117 assists for 215 career points, Ammerman is the fourth-leading point scorer in program history, sitting behind Hilary Knight (262), Meghan Duggan (238) and Sara Bauer (218) ... With her shorthanded goal to lift the Badgers over Minnesota Duluth, 4-3, on Oct. 21, 2011, Hilary Knight became the all-time game-winning goals leader at Wisconsin ... Knight currently has 29 game-winners, which eclipses the mark of 22 set by Meghan Duggan ... The 29 GWG's is the second most on the NCAA Division I Women's career list for game-winning goals, with the top mark of 39 GWG's set by Meghan Agosta of Mercyhurst ... Knight leads the nation in game-winning goals so far this season having captured eight GWG's ... With 1554 total shots on goal during the season, the Badgers averaged just less than 39 shots on goal per game, the second most in the nation ... Wisconsin players have posted nine hat tricks this season, coming from four different players ... Six Wisconsin players were named a WCHA Player of the Week 10 times this season.

### WCHA Women's Tie-Breaking Procedures - For Playoff Purposes Only

At the conclusion of the regular season, teams will be ranked by the number of points accumulated. If two teams are tied for first place, they will be declared co-WCHA champions.

The first round of the WCHA's post-season tournament will be a best-of-three games format at the home site of the teams ranked higher in the final regular season standings. All eight teams participate in the first round of the tournament. First round playoff pairings will be: #1 rank vs #8 rank, #2 rank vs #7 rank, #3 vs #6, and #4 vs #5.

Following the four first round series, the four winning teams will be re-seeded #1 thru #4 according to their standings in the final WCHA in-season competition and will advance to the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF.

In the event that ties are encountered in the determination of WCHA ranking or designation of home teams for playoff purposes, the following procedures will be used in the order given to break the ties:

- If two or more teams are tied, head-to-head competition during the regular (conference) season will be used to break the tie.
- If two or more teams are still tied after (a), the highest seed will go to the team with the most WCHA (conference) wins during the regular season.
- If two or more teams played a four-game series during the regular season and the teams have the same win-loss records for those series and the same number of WCHA wins, the team having the least number of goals scored against it in the four-game series shall have the higher rank. If two or more teams played a two-game series during the regular season, proceed to tie-breaker d).
- If two or more teams are still tied after applying the provisions of (a), (b) and (c), the team having the greatest "winning margin" during the regular season will have the higher rank. Winning margin = WCHA goals for during the regular season minus WCHA goals against.
- Games played against WCHA opponents in holiday tournaments will not be counted in the determinations.
- Shootout wins used during the WCHA regular season will not be counted in the determinations. Shootout games will be recorded as a tie in the determinations.
