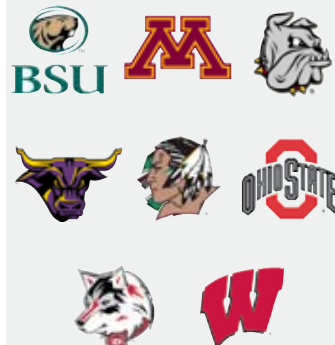

Wisconsin Badgers Head to 2011 NCAA Division 1 Women's Frozen Four as WCHA Looks to Extend Record Streak of 11 Consecutive National Championships

Conference Regular Season, Playoff Champion and No. 1-Ranked UW to Take on Boston College in First National Semifinal Friday in Erie, Penn.; It's Boston Univ. vs Cornell in Second National Semifinal; Badgers Sport Nation's Best 25-Game Unbeaten Streak; Wisconsin's Meghan Duggan Highlights 2010-11 WCHA Individual Awards as Conference Player of the Year; UW's Duggan One of Three Finalists for 2011 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award; Four WCHA-Member Teams Ranked Among Nation's Top 10 in Latest USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine Div. 1 Women's Hockey Poll ... Wisconsin No. 1, Minnesota No. 3, Minnesota Duluth No. 7, North Dakota No. 9; WCHA's Non-Conference Record Stands at 24-12-3 (.654) this Season

MADISON, Wis. – The University of Wisconsin will be the standard bearer of the Western Collegiate Hockey Association, which has won the last 11 women's national championships, at this weekend's 2011 NCAA Women's Frozen Four on Friday, March 18, and Sunday, March 20 in Erie, Pa.

The top-seeded Badgers (35-2-2) will make their fifth NCAA Women's Frozen Four appearance, meeting No. 4 seed Boston College (24-6-6), in Friday's first semifinal at 5:00 pm EDT at Tullio Arena in Erie, Pa. No. 2 seed Cornell (31-2-1) faces No. 3 seed Boston University (26-6-4) in the 8:00 pm ET semifinal. Friday's two winners will then play at 2:00 pm ET on Sunday for the national championship.

The Badgers are making their sixth NCAA national tournament appearance and continue the quest for their fourth national championship after taking home the title in 2009, 2007 and 2006. UW is 12-2-0 in the national tournament for a .857 winning percentage.

Wisconsin, the WCHA regular season and playoff champion, is currently on a 25-game unbeaten streak, con't

posting a 23-0-2 record since losing to defending national champion Minnesota Duluth on Nov. 28, 2010. The Badgers earned the WCHA's automatic berth to the national tournament after defeating Minnesota 5-4 in overtime in the league's playoff championship game at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis on March 5.

Wisconsin is the lone WCHA team in this year's Frozen Four, marking the first time since 2005 that the WCHA has only had one team among the final four teams. The league has had multiple teams in all but three Frozen Fours (2001, UMD; 2004, Minnesota; 2005, Minnesota). This year also marks the first time that multiple Hockey East Association teams have qualified for the Frozen Four (Boston College, Boston University).

In the 10 years of NCAA-sponsored championships, WCHA-member teams have won all 10 titles – Minnesota Duluth has five, Wisconsin has three and Minnesota has two. UMD defeated Cornell 3-2 (3 ot) in the 2010 national championship game at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis.

The Badgers secured their place in this year's Frozen Four with a 2-1 win over No. 7 Minnesota Duluth in the NCAA quarterfinal round last weekend at the Kohl Center in Madison. In its second-straight comeback win, Wisconsin scored two unanswered goals after trailing the Bulldogs 1-0. Meghan Duggan scored her sixth game-winning goal of the season and Hilary Knight had a goal and an assist. Goaltender Alex Rigsby made 29 saves as she improved to 25-1-2 on the season.

Minnesota, which, along with UMD, was a WCHA at-large team invited to the eight-team NCAA field, fell to host Boston College, 4-1, in a quarterfinal at Boston.

Wisconsin has a 3-0-0 all-time mark against Boston College, but the teams have not met in over nine years. The last meeting between the two squads saw the Badgers skate to a 7-0 shutout victory in Boston on Jan. 26, 2002.

USA Hockey announced that Wisconsin's Meghan Duggan is one of three finalists for the 2011 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, presented annually to the top Div. 1 women's hockey player, is presented by Lake Erie College of Osteopathic Medicine. Hilary Knight, Duggan's teammate on the U.S. Olympic Women's Hockey Team in 2010, was a top 10 finalist for the Patty Kazmaier award, while fellow Badger Brianna Decker received attention as a nominee. The 2011 award winner will be announced Saturday, March 19 in conjunction with the Frozen Four.

Knight is one point shy of becoming the third Badger and 16th player in NCAA history to hit 200 career points. She netted her 100th career goal against Bemidji State (Feb. 4), becoming the first Badger to reach 100 career goals. Knight currently has 112 goals and 87 assists for 199 career points.

In this week's (March 24, 2011) USCHO.com Division 1 Women's College Hockey Poll, four of the WCHA's eight-member teams are again ranked in the top ten. Wisconsin continues its reign at No. 1, Minnesota is at No. 3, Minnesota Duluth is ranked No. 7, and North Dakota is at No. 9.

Through games of March 14, the eight WCHA-member women's teams are a combined 24-12-3 in non-conference play this season for a .654 winning percentage.

Kelly Nash Scores in Overtime to Lift Wisconsin to 2011 WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF Playoff Title Senior Forward Nets Game-Winner Against Minnesota at 14:11 of Overtime

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. – After all of Wisconsin's top guns had fired and fired 55 times to get the Badgers back into the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF championship game, it was left to light-scoring senior Kelly Nash to shoot the 56th Badger shot at 14:11 of overtime to lift the Badgers to a 5-4 victory over Minnesota Saturday night.

Minnesota scored the first three goals of the game, and had a 4-2 lead after two, but Wisconsin's No. 1 ranked Badgers scored the last three. Madison Packer and Meghan Duggan scored third period goals to tie the game in the final seven minutes, and Nash, a third-line right wing from

Bonita, Calif., just back this weekend after missing several games with an injury, caught a pass from Geena Prough in the slot and quickly snapped a shot that looked as good as anything her more prolific teammates might have fired. The puck zipped past the screening body of defenseman Anne Schleper and past Noora Raty to hit the right edge and bring a stunning ending to the league playoff final.

"This is incredible. It's exciting for us," said Duggan, whose two goals in the game boost her season tally to 37. "I couldn't be happier that Kelly scored that goal. We were down 2-0 and it was deflating, but I knew we had it in us."

Wisconsin outshot Minnesota 56-30 for the game, and once the Badgers started rallying in the third period, it became a question of whether Golden Gopher goaltender Raty could hold off the relentless Wisconsin shooters. She almost pulled it off.

"I didn't see the shot," said Raty, a sophomore from Finland. "The pass came from the corner, and our 'D' screened me. It happens."

Both Wisconsin (34-2-2) and Minnesota (26-9-2) are assured of getting a Sunday invitation to the eight-team NCAA tournament, and both are virtually certain to be at home for next weekend's quarterfinals. But that's for the future; the intensity of the FINAL FACE-OFF title game will last for both teams.

"I've got to give our players a lot of credit," said Wisconsin coach Mark Johnson. "There were a couple of points in the game when we could have moved on to next week. But we took some energy from the last 6-8 minutes of the third period and carried it over to overtime. Then to have Kelly score that goal, it's great because her parent are here, and it gives her something to take away from this."

For the second straight game, Minnesota was the lower seed and had to wear the visiting maroon jerseys on its home Ridder Arena ice. At the start, it appeared the Gophers should consider switching permanently, because for the second straight game they played with offensive precision to take early command of the game. Just as they had done in beating Minnesota Duluth 4-2 in Friday's semifinals, when they spotted UMD a 1-0 lead and then scored four consecutive goals, the Gophers were able to disrupt the usually slick-passing Badgers, and Sarah Erickson personally staked them to a 2-0 lead at the first intermission.

Wisconsin took the game's first two penalties, and just four seconds after the second one expired, the Gophers struck for the first goal. Erickson was stationed in the slot and got a clean deflection on Megan Bozek's shot from the left point, directing it past goalie Alex Rigsby at 9:46. Five minutes later, Minnesota killed a penalty, and at 15:38, Erickson cut left-to-right across the slot, scoring for a 2-0 lead.

"Jen Schoullis was working hard to get the puck in the corner, as usual, and she threw it at the net," said Erickson. "I got my stick on it, and it hit the pipe and kinda went in before she (Rigsby) covered it up."

Wisconsin needed to get its explosive offense untracked in the second period, but instead, Sarah Davis caught a pass from fellow-freshman Kelly Terry and sped up the right boards. Remarkably, she outflanked the retreating Badger defense and kept on skating all the way to the net, scoring from close range to make it 3-0 at 10:20. The game was half over, but nobody anticipated the issue was settled, even at 3-0.

"Obviously, up 3-0, losing the game is not ideal," said Erickson.

Wisconsin stormed back, finally breaking through Raty's strong goaltending display. It took a power-play to get the Badgers going, as Brianna Decker scored her 33rd of the season on a wild tangle at the crease at 14:34.

"Raty is a great goaltender, and we were a little nervous," said Decker.

Suddenly, just :38 seconds later, Badger scoring leader Duggan converted a neat set-up at the goal-mouth to close it to 3-2.

"Anytime you score a goal it creates energy," said Johnson.

But Minnesota regained its composure, and a two-goal lead, when Schoullis scored on a scramble at the crease at the other end of the rink with 1:47 left in the middle period. That was a huge goal, because at 4-2, it gave Minnesota a 2-2 standoff for the period, despite being outshot 16-4 by Wisconsin.

However, the third period saw the Badgers increase pressure, and the

victory became a question of whether the Gophers could hold off all that firepower as the Badgers outshot them 18-9 in the third period. They did an admirable job of weathering the pressure for 13 minutes, but at 13:38, the Badgers kept the puck in on the left side, and Madison Packer swatted the puck out of the air to score from the right edge and trim the score to 4-3.

Barely a minute later, the determined Badgers tied the game, as Duggan scored her second of the game and 37th of the season. Fittingly, the WCHA women's player of the year extended the FINAL FACE-OFF championship game to overtime. And, perhaps more fittingly, a popular senior just back from an injury, won it.

Nash, Duggan Lead WCHA All-Tournament Team

Wisconsin's Brianna Decker was named most valuable player of the 2011 WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF tournament, while three of her teammates were named to the six-player all-tournament team.

Kelly Nash, whose goal in overtime carried Wisconsin to a 5-4 victory over Minnesota in the title game, after getting two assists in the 3-0 semifinal victory over North Dakota, was joined by teammates Meghan Duggan, who scored twice in the final to force overtime, and defenseman Geena Prough. Minnesota goaltender Noora Raty, who faced 56 shots in the title game, after beating Minnesota Duluth 4-2 on Friday, was also named, along with Gophers forward Amanda Kessel, and defenseman Megan Bozek.

Wisconsin's Duggan Named One of Three Finalists for 2011 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – University of Wisconsin senior forward **Meghan Duggan** (Danvers, Mass.) has been named one of three finalists for the 2011 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, joining senior forwards Meghan Agosta (Ruthven, Ont./Mercyhurst College) and Kelli Stack (Brooklyn Heights, Ohio/Boston College). The Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, which is in its 14th year, is presented by Lake Erie College of given out annually by The USA Hockey Foundation to the top player in NCAA Division 1 women's ice hockey.

The trio represents three NCAA Division 1 women's ice hockey conferences – the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (Duggan), College Hockey America (Agosta), and the Hockey East Association (Stack).

2011 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award Three Finalists

Meghan Duggan, Senior, Forward, University of Wisconsin: Amidst a standout senior season with the University of Wisconsin, Duggan was named Western Collegiate Hockey Association Player of the Year and earned All-WCHA First Team honors. She ranks second nationally with 82 points, 37 goals, 45 assists and 11 power-play goals, and third with three shorthanded goals. As team captain, she helped lead Wisconsin to the WCHA regular season and tournament championships, as well as a berth in the NCAA tournament. She also led the WCHA with 61 points, 34

assists and 20 power-play points (9-11), and ranked second with 27 goals. Duggan reached several NCAA and Wisconsin milestones this season, becoming the seventh player all-time and first Wisconsin player to reach both 100 goals and 100 assists. She ranks seventh in NCAA history and leads Wisconsin with 233 career points.

Meghan Agosta, Senior, Foward, Mercyhurst College: One of Mercyhurst College's team captains, Agosta has become a top-three finalist for the fourth time in her collegiate career. This season, she became the first player in NCAA history to reach 300 career points and now stands at 301 (155-146). She also became the NCAA's all-time leading scorer with her 151st goal and has 155 goals to date. In College Hockey America play, Agosta was named CHA Player of the Year and earned First Team All-CHA honors, while leading the CHA in all offensive categories and winning the league's regular-season scoring trophy with 41 points (18-23) in 16 games. Agosta helped lead Mercyhurst to the CHA regular-season and tournament championships, as well as a berth in the NCAA tournament. She currently leads the nation with 84 points, 48 assists, 14 power-play goals and four shorthanded goals, while ranking third with 36 goals and nine game-winning goals.

Kelli Stack, Senior, Forward, Boston College: Stack is the first-ever top-three finalist from Boston College. As a senior captain, she helped lead BC to its first-ever Hockey East tournament championship and a berth in the NCAA tournament. Stack ranks first in the country with four shorthanded goals, fourth with 34 goals and eight game-winning goals, and eighth with 56 points. She led Hockey East with 33 points (22-11), 22 goals, 12 power-play points (7-5), four shorthanded points (4-0) and five game-winning goals. Along with winning the league's regular-season scoring trophy, Stack was named Hockey East's Player of the Year and earned Hockey East First Team All-Star honors. In addition, she was named Hockey East Player of the Month twice and Hockey East Player of the Week three times. This season, Stack set the Hockey East records for career points (133) and goals (68). She also set her school record for points (199) and now stands at 207 career points.

Notes: Meghan Agosta is the second top-three finalist from Mercyhurst College (Vicki Bendus-2010 winner), while Meghan Duggan is the third top-three finalist from the University of Wisconsin (Sara Bauer-2006-07, Jessie Vetter-2009). Sara Bauer won the 2006 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award and Jessie Vetter won the award in 2009 ... Kelli Stack is the first-ever top-three finalist from Boston College ... Mike Ruzzi, sports director at WICU-TV (NBC) in Erie, Pa., will serve as the master of ceremonies, while Laura Halldorson, who led the University of Minnesota women's ice hockey team to three NCAA Division 1 national championships as head coach, will be the keynote speaker ... The 2011 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award Ceremony, presented by LECOM, will be broadcast live at USAHockey.FASTHockey.com ... USA Hockey and the NCAA will team up once again to put on free girls' skills clinics in conjunction with the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award and the NCAA Women's Frozen Four. Both will take place on March 19, at Mercyhurst Ice Center with an American Development Model session set for 3-4 p.m. ET and a Try Hockey For Free clinic to take place from 4-5 p.m.

About the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award: An award of the USA Hockey Foundation, the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award is annually presented to the top player in NCAA Division 1 women's ice hockey. Selection criteria includes outstanding individual and team skills, sportsmanship, performance in the clutch, personal character, competitiveness and a love of hockey. Consideration is also given to academic achievement and civic involvement. The Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award is supported, in part, by a grant from the NHL Foundation.

About Patty Kazmaier: The Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award is named in honor of the late Patty Kazmaier, who was a four-year varsity letter-winner and All-Ivy League defenseman at Princeton University from 1981-86. An accomplished athlete who helped lead the Tigers to the Ivy League Championship in three consecutive seasons (1981-84), Patty Kazmaier-Sandt died on Feb. 15, 1990, at the age of 28 following a long struggle with a rare blood disease.

Wisconsin's Meghan Duggan Named Player of the Year to Highlight 2010-11 WCHA Women's Awards

Minnesota Duluth's Jocelyne Larocque is WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year; Wisconsin Places Trio and Minnesota Pair on All-WCHA First Team; Coaches Vote UMD's Larocque WCHA Defensive Player of the Year; Minnesota's Amanda Kessel Named WCHA Rookie of the Year; Wisconsin's Mark Johnson is WCHA Coach of the Year; Duggan is WCHA Scoring Champion; UMD's Kim Martin is WCHA Goaltending Champion; League Announces All-WCHA Academic Team

MADISON, Wis. – The University of Wisconsin convincingly won the regular season championship and the Badgers' success was reflected in the 2010-11 post-season women's honors announced by the Western Collegiate Hockey Association today (March 3) at a league awards ceremony held at TCF Stadium in Minneapolis in conjunction with the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF tournament championship. The WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF is Friday and Saturday, March 4-5, at Ridder Arena on the University of Minnesota campus.

Three members of the Badgers' high-scoring line and a pair of players from the University of Minnesota lead the All-WCHA First Team selected by coaches. Wisconsin's Meghan Duggan, who was the league's scoring champion with 61 points (27 goals, 34 assists) in 28 games, was named the WCHA's Player of the Year. The senior from Danvers, Massachusetts, also leads the first team All-WCHA squad which includes Duggan's teammates, Hilary Knight, a junior from Sun Valley, Idaho who had 29 goals and 50 points in league play, and Brianna Decker, a sophomore from Dousman, Wisconsin, who had 23 goals and 51 points.

The All-WCHA First team also includes Minnesota junior defenseman Anne Schleper, a junior from St. Cloud, Minnesota and the lone repeater on the team, and teammate and goaltender Noora Rätty, a sophomore from Espoo, Finland who had nine shutouts this season, a 1.70 goals-against average in league play and a .943 conference saves percentage.

Minnesota Duluth's Jocelyne Larocque, a senior defender from Ste Anne, Manitoba, completes the first team, one of a trio of honors she received. Larocque also was voted the WCHA Defensive Player of the Year in a vote of the league's head coaches, was the top-scoring defenseman in the league with six goals, 18 assists and 24 points in 26 league contests, and also was named the WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year.

The WCHA Coach of the Year Award for 2010-11 went to Wisconsin's Mark Johnson. It is the fourth time Johnson has either won or shared the award. The former 'Miracle on Ice' hero and gold medalist in the 1980 Olympics is a three-time national Division 1 coach of the year and his team won over 30 games. In his seven years at Wisconsin, Johnson has an .815 winning percentage. He took a sabbatical to coach the United States team to a silver medal at the Winter Olympics in Vancouver 2010. That U.S. team included Knight, Duggan and All-WCHA Second Team members

Jocelyne Lamoureux (Grand Forks, ND), a forward from the University of North Dakota, and her twin sister Monique Lamoureux-Kolls (Grand Forks, ND), a defenseman. Other All-WCHA Second Team members include Haley Irwin (Thunder Bay, ON), a forward from Minnesota Duluth, Natalie Spooner (Scarborough, ON), Ohio State University's all-league forward last season, Minnesota Duluth defenseman Jessica Wong (Baddeck, NS) and Bemidji State University goaltender Zuzana Tomcikova (Bratislava, Slovakia), who shared WCHA Player of the Year honors last season. It is the third straight season Tomcikova has been the second team all-league goalie.

Minnesota's Amanda Kessel, a freshman from Madison, Wisconsin, was named WCHA Rookie of the Year and leads the All-WCHA Rookie Team and the All-WCHA Third Team. Kessel's brother, Phil, is a former Minnesota athlete who currently is a National Hockey League all-star with the Toronto Maple Leafs.

Also named to the All-WCHA Third Team was Minnesota Duluth senior goaltender Kim Martin (Stockholm, Sweden), who was the league's goaltending champion with a 1.51 goals-against average, sophomore defenseman Megan Bozek (Buffalo Grove, IL) of Minnesota, junior defenseman Brittany Haverstock (Hammonds Plains, NS) of Wisconsin, and forwards Elin Holmlov (Knivsta, Sweden), a senior from Minnesota Duluth, and Erin Cody (Roseville, MN), a senior from Bemidji State.

Joining Kessel on the All-WCHA Rookie Team were Minnesota forward Kelly Terry (Whitby, ON), Wisconsin forward Brittany Ammerman (River Vale, NJ), Minnesota defenseman Baylee Gillanders (Kyle, SK), North Dakota defenseman Kayla Berg (Fargo, ND), and goaltender Alex Rigsby of Wisconsin (Delafield, WI).

The conference also today released the 2010-11 All-WCHA Academic Team, comprised of 97 student-athletes representing all eight WCHA women's member institutions. See page three for the complete list.

Earlier today, USA Hockey, Inc., announced that four WCHA players – Wisconsin forwards Duggan and Knight, Minnesota Duluth forward Irwin and Minnesota goaltender Rätty – were among the 10 finalists for the 2011 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, given each year to the top player in women's Div. 1 collegiate hockey.

Conference member-team head coaches and assistant coaches vote for the WCHA individual award winners. The WCHA Defensive Player of the Year Award is chosen by the head coaches, while the WCHA Outstanding Student-Athlete of the Year is selected by the institutional faculty representatives.

WCHA Announces Record Group of 90 Men's and Women's Scholar-Athletes for 2010-11 Sixth Annual Class Includes 30 Repeat Honorees

MADISON, Wis. – The Western Collegiate Hockey Association, through Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod, Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, University of Alaska Anchorage Faculty Representative Steve Strom (Chair, men's league) and University of North Dakota Faculty Representative Sue Jenö (Chair, women's league) today (Feb. 10, 2011) announced that a total of 90 men's and women's student-athletes make up the sixth annual group of WCHA Scholar-Athlete Award recipients. Over the first six years of the award, there have now been 414 honorees representing all 12 men's member and all eight women's member institutions. The previous record for honorees in one season was 80 in 2009-10.

WCHA Member Team Notebooks

Bemidji State Beavers

- The Beavers' 2010-11 season came to a close Feb. 27 as they fell in overtime of game three to North Dakota 3-2. The only series in the first round of playoffs to go to three games, the Beavers and Sioux battled to a 2-2 tie at the end of regulation, forcing the extra period of play.
- In game one of the series, a couple costly defensive mistakes in the third period by BSU would give the game to North Dakota by a score of 3-2. After giving up a 1-0 lead early in the game on a shorthanded goal, the Beavers responded with Emily Erickson and Erin Cody scoring two goals in the second period within :30 seconds. However, Stephanie Roy scored two goals in the third period to put the game out of reach.
- Battling back on Saturday in game two, the Beavers played one of their best games of the season blanking the Sioux 3-0. Erika Wheelhouse scored the game-winner, which was also her first of her college career. Lauren Williams and Sadie Lundquist scored unassisted goals in the third period to secure the victory. Zuzana Tomcikova also played one of her finest games, making 22 saves including two clutch saves at key points to keep UND off the board.
- In game three, Bemidji State jumped on the board first with a goal by Marlee Wheelhouse in the second period. The Sioux would then score twice, capitalizing once on the power play, to take a 2-1 lead. But before the end of the period, Lundquist scored a goal to tie the game. In the overtime period, at the 16:00 mark, Monique Lamoureux-Kolls would skate the puck from one end to the other and deke her way to a goal advancing the Sioux to the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF.
- The Beavers finished the season with the most conference wins in a single season (11) and the most home wins in a single season (9).
- They also finished the season with the best conference penalty-kill with a 90.4% efficiency.
- Erin Cody became the first player in school history to record multiple seasons of scoring at least 20 goals. Scoring at the 9:20 mark of the third period on Feb. 18 against Ohio State, Cody netted her 20th goal of the season, marking back-to-back seasons to put up 20 goals.
- The Beavers secured a sole fifth-place finish in the WCHA, the best in program history. Last season the Beavers finished tied for fifth in the WCHA, BSU has also finished fifth before in the WCHA, but never with an eight-team conference before.
- The Beavers set the school record for the best home record in a single season, going 9-5-2 (.652). The record surpasses the 1999-2000 season when that year's squad finished with a 8-7-2 (.592) home record.

Minnesota Golden Gophers

- The No. 3 Golden Gophers allowed four goals in the first and fell to Boston College, 4-1, last Saturday in an NCAA quarterfinal match up in Chestnut Hill, Mass. The loss dropped the Golden Gophers to 26-10-2 on the season and an end to the season. Boston College improved to 26-6-6 and advance to the Frozen Four. The Eagles will play Wisconsin Friday in Erie, Pa.
- BC came at the Gophers right out of the gate and scored four goals within the first 14 minutes of the game. Ashley Motherwell scored just 24 seconds into the contest. Gopher goalie Noora Raty was trying to stop the puck off the backboard, but went in front of the net for Motherwell to score her fifth goal of the year. Melissa Bizzari took advantage of a Gopher turnover in their zone to go up, 2-0 just 2:45 into the contest. Minnesota called a timeout at 2:56 into the game, but the Eagles added another two by the 13:50 mark. Patty Kazmaier top-three finalist Kelli Stack scored back-to-back goals at 8:16 and 13:50 to put the Eagles up, 4-0 after one. The fast start by BC was all that it needed in order to win. Sarah Erickson broke Minnesota's drought and netted a power-play goal at 11:45 in the second. Erickson rifled a shot high and on the short side of BC goalie Molly Schaus to put the game at 4-1 after two. Amanda Kessel

and Megan Bozek assisted on the play. . Minnesota had 14 shots in the first, four in the second and 14 in the third for 32. BC scored four goals on eight shots in the first and had 28 for the game. Minnesota pulled Raty at the end, but the Gophers could not cover with the extra attacker.

- It was the final career game for seniors Terra Rasmussen, Laura May and Jenny Lura. Rasmussen finished her career playing in 149 games and scored 19 goals and 14 assists for 33 points. May played in 143 games for Minnesota. She scored 21 goals and 19 assists for 40 points. Goaltender Lura saw action in 42 games for Minnesota and had a career 1.82 goals-against average.

Minnesota Duluth Bulldogs

- The No. 7 Bulldogs dropped a hard-fought 2-1 decision to Wisconsin in the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament at the Kohl Center last Saturday in front of more than 4,000 fans.
- The game ends UMD's season at 22-9-3, and just one victory short of what would have been the Bulldogs fifth-consecutive NCAA Frozen Four.

"It was an unbelievable hockey game, thought it was very even and both teams could have won," said head coach Shannon Miller, who is now 4-3 in NCAA regional play since the eight-team format was introduced.

- UMD broke a first period stalemate late in the opening stanza when Haley Irwin, to the right of UW goaltender Alex Rigsby on the pipe, wrapped the puck around a Badger defenseman to a wide-open Jessica Wong in the slot. Wong – no stranger to NCAA postseason success with both a game-winning goal in last season's NCAA Regional and NCAA title game – one-timed her shot through Rigsby's five-hole with just :28.3 seconds remaining in the first period. After UMD outshot Wisconsin 12-11 in the opening period, the Badgers turned the tables in the second stanza. A power-play blast from the point at 3:06 turned into UW forward Hilary Knight's 47th goal of the season, and gave the Badgers the 1-1 equalizer. Wisconsin outshot UMD 16-5 in the second period, and 27-17 after the first 40 minutes of action. The Badgers took the lead 7:34 into the third period, on a 3-on-2 which Meghan Duggan trailed on to get off a shot that was deflected for the go ahead score. With ample chances in the final 12 minutes of play, UMD was put on the power-play with six minutes remaining, but despite three shots over that time, Rigsby held up. Wisconsin then withstood 36 seconds of an empty Bulldog net, and the Badgers managed to not only keep their 22-game winning streak alive, but ended UMD's NCAA-leading four-straight Frozen Four appearances at four (2009-10, 2008-09, 2007-08 and 2006-07).
- Senior goalie Kim Martin ends her career with a 1.52 goals-against average – the lowest GAA average by any UMD netminder who has played more than 20 games – after making 38 saves against the NCAA's top-rated offense. Martin ends her career with a record of 67-23-6, making her the winningest goaltender in Bulldog program history, and her saves percentage of .943 is the highest of any goaltender over a career in UMD's past twelve seasons.
- The Bulldogs have five seniors – Martin, Elin Holmlöv, Laura Fridfinnson, Jocelyne Larocque and Tara Gray, and with two NCAA titles (2010, 2008), two WCHA regular season titles and WCHA Playoff titles (2010, 2008), as well as three-straight NCAA Frozen Four appearances, they leave UMD as one of the most successful senior classes in the history of the program.

Minnesota State Mavericks

- The Mavericks finished the 2010-11 season with an 8-25-3 record overall, while going 7-20-1-0 in the WCHA.
- The Mavericks finished seventh in the WCHA standings with 22 points and were swept by sixth-rated and second-seeded Minnesota Duluth, dropping last Friday's contest, 3-0, then falling to the Bulldogs, 5-0, on Saturday.
- In game one, UMD scored the opening goal at 6:44 of the first period when Elin Holmlöv cleaned up a rebound on MSU goaltender Alli Altmann's glove side. After a scoreless second frame, the Bulldogs added two goals in the third period – by senior defenseman Jocelyne Larocque at 2:49 and Holmlöv at 8:19. Altmann allowed all three goals and stopped 37 saves, while Minnesota Duluth netminder Kim Martin earned the shut-out and 20 saves.
- On Saturday, Minnesota Duluth jumped out to a 1-0 lead at 14:08 of the first frame on its first power-play chance of the game. Junior center Haley Irwin's shot was saved by Altmann, but sophomore Audrey Cournoyer put in the rebound for the Bulldog goal. Early in the second UMD added two goals just :26 seconds from each other. The first, scored by sophomore center Katie Wilson at the 6:24 mark, and the other was scored by sophomore defenseman Jessica Wong at the 6:50 mark. Minnesota Duluth increased its lead to 4-0 with a goal scored by Larocque at the 16:44 mark. UMD made it 5-0 at 9:18 of the third frame when freshman Noora Jaakkola's shot from the point was tipped over Altmann's shoulder glove side by sophomore forward Vanessa Thibault. Altmann finished with 38 saves and UMD sophomore goaltender Jennifer Harsz earned the shut-out and 25 saves.
- MSU is now 0-3 against UMD in post-season action with the only other loss being a 10-1 loss in the 2000-01 season.
- Minnesota State is 2-16 in all-time playoff games. The two wins came in 2008-09 when they earned their first ever playoff game and playoff series win over St. Cloud State.
- Freshman forward Kathleen Rogan earned 12-9=21 over the course of the 2010-11 season, a team-best for the season.
- Sophomore forward Lauren Smith tallied 15 points (4-11=15), second most on the team.
- Senior forward Nina Tikkinen (5-7=12) and junior forward Moria O'Connor (6-6=12) earned 12 points tied for third-best on the squad.
- Rogan's 12 goals on the season was a team-best, while Smith's 11 assists was a season-high.

North Dakota Fighting Sioux

- The Sioux enjoyed the best season in its nine-year history, but fell just short of this year's eight-team NCAA Tournament field.
- UND finished ninth in the Pairwise rankings with the top eight teams earning a bid to the 2011 NCAA Women's Hockey Championship.
- The Sioux posted a record of 6-9-0 against the eight teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament with five of those nine losses coming to Wisconsin.
- UND captured its first home WCHA first round playoff series and advanced to its first WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF, falling to No. 1 seed Wisconsin, 3-0, on March 4. Goaltie Stephanie Ney kept the Sioux in the game until late making 31 saves, but the Badgers scored three goals in the second periods and beat the Sioux for the fifth time in five tries. Ney stood strong in net making 25 saves through two periods and kept Wisconsin off the board until 6:18 of the second period when Carolyn Prevost scored her 17th of the season. Brianna Decker made the Sioux pay again at 11:28 of the middle frame scoring on the penalty-kill for UND's 10th allowed this season. The Badgers would show their other side of the special teams unit can score as well as Mallory Deluce capped off the games scoring at 18:14 of second period. The Sioux were held scoreless in six attempts while UW finished 1-for-5. UW goalie Alex Rigsby finished with 19 saves.
- The Sioux posted a 20-13-3, the most wins in school history and finished fourth in the WCHA with a 16-10-2 mark.

- Sophomores Jocelyne Lamoureux and Monique Lamoureux-Kolls were named second team All-WCHA and finished in the top five in the league in scoring and will lead a huge group of returning players.
- The Sioux lose only one senior, forward Stephanie Roy.

Ohio State Buckeyes

- The Buckeyes concluded the 2010-11 season with a 3-2 loss to No. 3-ranked Minnesota on Feb. 26 and finished the season 14-19-3 overall and 8-19-3-3 in the WCHA after being swept in the best-of-three series at Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, Minn.
- Down 2-0, the Buckeyes battled back to even the score at 2-2 in the third period, but a late goal by Minnesota ended Ohio State's season. Minnesota would strike first with a goal from Sarah Erickson at 10:48 of the first period. Carding her 100th career point, Erickson connected with Amanda Kessel for the goal. The Gophers' Sarah Davis then capitalized on an Ohio State hooking penalty just over a minute later at 11:54 to bring the Gopher lead to two. Skating four-on-five, the Buckeyes were able to generate some offensive momentum when sophomore Paige Semenza fired a shorthanded goal from sophomore Minttu Tuominen at 5:14 of the second stanza. The Buckeyes held Minnesota scoreless in the period, as rookie goalie Lisa Steffes stopped all 15 shots on goal. Ohio State put 16 shots on net in the period. The Buckeyes would get on the board again to even the score at 6:21 in the third, when senior Shannon Reilly tallied her ninth goal of the season. The power-play goal was assisted by Tuominen who ended the game with two points. Racking up 15 shots on goal to the Buckeyes' six in the final period, the Gopher offense remained strong. At 16:51, Kessel fired the unassisted game-winner to send Minnesota to the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF. Ohio State pulled Steffes for the extra attacker with 1:10 remaining in regulation but were unable to get a shot on net.
- Lisa Steffes concluded her rookie season with 35 saves and a record of 14-19-3. She ended the year with an Ohio State record 1,085 saves and leads the country in minutes played and saves.
- Both squads were able to capitalize on the power-play opportunity in the first round playoff series. The Buckeyes were 1-of-2, while the Gophers went 1-of-3. Ohio State tallied 32 shots on goal to Minnesota's 38.
- Ohio State opened its WCHA First Round Playoff series with a 4-2 loss to No. 3 Minnesota on Feb. 25 at Ridder Arena. Down 4-0, the No. 6-seed Buckeyes got two goals from Laura McIntosh in :33 seconds, but it was not enough to edge the No. 3-seed Golden Gophers who capitalized on two power play opportunities. The Gophers jumped on the board first with an unassisted goal by Kelly Seeler at 2:10. Holding the Scarlet and Gray to just six shots on goal in the first stanza, Minnesota's Jen Schoullis would then find the net on the power-play at 15:53. Minnesota continued its control of the puck out of the break with two more goals. Sarah Erickson tallied her 17th goal of the season at 6:49, while Schoullis converted another power play opportunity at 11:29. The Buckeyes were able to cut the deficit in half when McIntosh fired back-to-back goals to swing the momentum in Ohio State's favor. Connecting with sophomores Tina Hollowell and Hokey Langan, McIntosh's first goal came at 13:33. The Waterloo, Ontario, native then scored again unassisted just 33 seconds later at 14:06. Ohio State continued to fight in the final period, but its efforts were not enough for the Gopher defense who held the Buckeyes scoreless to secure the win. Between the pipes, Steffes made 34 saves.

St. Cloud State Huskies

- The Huskies fell twice to top-ranked Wisconsin, 9-3 and 5-1, in the first round of the WCHA playoffs on Feb. 25-26, a best-of-three series at Verona, Wis.
- Senior defender Diana Karouzos had the Huskies' only goal of the contest as the Badgers ended the SCSU season by a score of 5-1 on Saturday, Feb. 26, swept the Huskies and advanced to the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF. Karouzos' goal, which was assisted by rookie forward Molli Mott on the power play, marked the fourth of the senior's career. Senior netminder Ashley Nixon played in all 60 minutes Saturday, which marked her final game in a Husky uniform. The Blaine, Minn., native backstopped the Huskies with 33 saves and completed her career at SCSU ranked second all-time with 2,988 career saves between the pipes. On Friday night, sophomore Alex Nelson had two goals and rookie Julia Gilbert posted her sixth goal of the season in the Huskies 9-3 loss to the Badgers.
- St. Cloud State completes the 2010-11 season with a 1-33-1 overall record (1-26-1-1 WCHA).

Wisconsin Badgers

- The No. 1-ranked Badgers (36-2-2) will make their fifth NCAA Women's Frozen Four appearance, meeting No. 4 seed Boston College (24-6-6, 13-4-4 Hockey East) in this Friday's first semifinal at 5:00 pm EDT at Tullio Arena in Erie, Pa.
- The Badgers secured their place in this year's Frozen Four with a 2-1 win over No. 7 Minnesota Duluth in the NCAA quarterfinal round last weekend. In its second-straight comeback win, Wisconsin scored two unanswered goals after trailing 1-0. Meghan Duggan scored her sixth game-winning goal of the season and Hilary Knight led all players with two points. Goaltender Alex Rigsby made 29 saves as she improved to 25-1-2 on the season.
- The Badgers are making their sixth NCAA national tournament appearance and continue the quest for their fourth national championship after taking home the title in 2009, 2007 and 2006.
- UW is 12-2-0 in the national tournament for a .857 winning percentage.
- Wisconsin is currently on a 25-game unbeaten streak, posting a 23-0-2 record since losing to Minnesota Duluth on Nov. 28, 2010.
- Wisconsin has a 3-0-0 all-time mark against Boston College, but the teams have not met in over nine years. The last meeting between the two squads saw the Badgers skate to a 7-0 shutout in Boston on Jan. 26, 2002.
- UW is the lone WCHA team in this year's Frozen Four, marking the first time since 2005 that the WCHA has only had one team among the final four teams. The league has had multiple teams in all but three Frozen Fours (2001, UMD; 2004, Minnesota; 2005, Minnesota).
- This year marks the first time that multiple Hockey East teams have qualified for the Frozen Four (Boston College, Boston University).
- USA Hockey announced that Meghan Duggan is one of three finalists for the 2011 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, presented by Lake Erie College of Osteopathic Medicine. Knight was a top 10 finalist for the award, and Brianna Decker received attention as a nominee. The award winner will be announced Saturday morning, March 19.
- Knight is one point shy of becoming the third Badger and 16th player in NCAA history to hit 200 career points. She netted her 100th career goal against Bemidji State (Feb. 4), becoming the first Badger to reach 100 career goals. Knight currently has 112 goals and 87 assists for 199 career points.
- Wisconsin continued its penalty-kill streak last weekend, holding Minnesota Duluth scoreless on three power-play attempts. The previous weekend saw UW's PK unit go a perfect 13-for-13 against Minnesota and North Dakota. UW has allowed only one power-play goal in its last seven

games (and three in its last 13 games); its opponents are 1-for-32 with the man-advantage since Feb. 18. Wisconsin currently ranks 10th in the nation with an 88.4 penalty-kill percentage.

WCHA Women's Tie-Breaking Procedures • For Playoff Seeding Purposes Only

At the conclusion of the regular season, teams will be ranked by the number of points accumulated. If two teams are tied for first place, they will be declared co-WCHA champions.

The first round of the WCHA's post-season tournament will be a best-of-three games format at the home site of the teams ranked higher in the final regular season standings. All eight teams participate in the first round of the tournament. First round playoff pairings will be: #1 rank vs #8 rank, #2 rank vs #7 rank, #3 vs #6, and #4 vs #5. Following the four first round series, the four winning teams will be re-seeded #1 thru #4 according to their standings in the final WCHA in-season competition and will advance to the WCHA FINAL FACE-OFF.

In the event that ties are encountered in the determination of WCHA ranking or designation of home teams for playoff purposes, the following procedures will be used in the order given to break the ties:

- If two or more teams are tied, head-to-head competition during the regular (conference) season will be used to break the tie.
- If two or more teams are still tied after (a), the highest seed will go to the team with the most WCHA (conference) wins during the regular season.
- If two or more teams played a four-game series during the regular season and the teams have the same win-loss records for those series and the same number of WCHA wins, the team having the least number of goals scored against it in the four-game series shall have the higher rank. If two or more teams played a two-game series during the regular season, proceed to tie-breaker d).
- If two or more teams are still tied after applying the provisions of (a), (b) and (c), the team having the greatest "winning margin" during the regular season will have the higher rank. Winning margin = WCHA goals for during the regular season minus WCHA goals against.
- Games played against WCHA opponents in holiday tournaments will not be counted in the determinations.
- Shootout wins used during the regular season will not be counted in the determinations. Shootout games will be recorded as a tie in the determinations.
